Brush Up On The Law Before Taking After Fish; Texas Has New Rules

As Texans brush up on tackle and on regulations for the 1950 fishing season, the comparatively new statewide fresh water fishing license law is brought back into focus.

The Executive Secretary pointed out Saturday that this act, passed by the 1949 Legislative re- place myriad and conflicting local fees.

The only license exemptions now are for: Persons fishing within their own county, provided they do not use artificial bait, and persons fishing within counties adjoining their home counties, provided they do not use either artificial bait or live bait. Live bait under the law means minnow or fish and artificial bait is described as any manufactured bait or imitation of a natural bait; Persons under 17 years of age; Persons holding commercial fishing licenses.

No license is required for salt water fishing for sport. Of course commercial fishermen in both fresh and salt water must have licenses. Salt water sports fishermen are not limited as to size or quality of fish.

The Executive Secretary reminded anglers that the daily limits are 15 large-mouth black bass, small-mouth black bass, spotted bass or any sub specie of the same, singly or in the aggregate. Not more than ten of the black bass shall be of greater length than 11 inches. The limit is 25 for white bass, 25 for catfish and 25 for crappie and white perch. No black bass less than seven inches in length may be taken.

Text Material Prepared By Cisco Youth Being Used At University

Author of a textbook on the subject of his university major is the record of a 22-year-old Cisco man.

The young man is Robert (Rod) Kamon, son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph Kamon, 809 West 13th St. And the textbook he has prepared to supplement study materials for students in petroleum engineering at the University of Texas is only one example of how he has utilized his time since graduation last spring.

Upon graduation, young Kamon joined his father in the Kamon Petroleum Exploration Company here as a practicing geologist and petroleum engineer.

After graduating with honors last spring, young Kamon immediately prepared a booklet on gas engineering, a subject on

which the University had little material. The work was completed three weeks after he finished and every one of the books were sold after five weeks.

Last week, a second edition of "Class Engineering and Some Fundamental Information for Petroleum Engineering 464" was prepared due to requests from students. The book is full of examples of difficult gas engineering problems. The second edition has an additional 10 pages and consists of five sections — Gas Behavior, Gas Measurement, Gas Wells, Estimation of Gas Reserves and Pipe Lines.

Due probably to his father's interest in petroleum, Robert has been interested in the subject since his high school days. In his own workshop, during the past

year he has built a magnetometer and a gravitometer, both used in locating oil structures, and now is working on a seismograph machine which will soon be finished.

In addition to these accomplishments, Robert has been active as a professional petroleum engineer. What is more, he is an active worker in the First Presbyterian Church and is assistant scoutmaster of Boy Scout Troop 191.

Robert graduated from high school with honors in 1944 at Arlington Heights, Fort Worth. Like his mother and father, Robert likes Cisco and plans to stay here. He believes there's a lot of oil still to be located in this area.

And he wants to have a part in locating it.

Basketball Tourney Planned This Week

Texas Is Pioneer In Simplifying Drivers License

AUSTIN, Feb. 10 — After years of study aimed toward better serving the motorists of this state, Texas has pioneered in improving the style and the procedure of the issuance of drivers licenses, according to Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Under direct supervision of A. F. Temple, chief of the department's Drivers License Division, the new license has been adopted, after extensive study, for greater ease of processing and with a view toward making the renewal of licenses less effort on the part of the motorist. Texas, so far as is known, is the first state to adopt the technique of notifying drivers when their licenses are about to expire.

Effective this week, the License Division will begin issuing the new style operator, commercial, and chauffeur permits to all applicants. Licenses now in effect will remain valid and will be replaced by the new form upon the next renewal by present holder.

Complete handling of the new type license will be effected by machines and the license itself will be mailed out in the form of a postcard which is so arranged that it will permit separation to allow for proper fitting into bill folds or card cases.

One of the more important features of the new procedure will be a recorded renewal copy of the original license which will be mailed to operators about a month prior to the expiration date of their license advising them that it is about to expire. This is expected to be a real benefit to the thousands of Texas drivers who habitually allow their licenses to expire because of neglect in checking the expiration date. The new license will also carry the actual date of expiration rather than the date of issuance as previously used.

Holders of the old type license which has been in use for several years will not be required to execute a form when seeking renewal. All that is necessary is to tear off the renewal stub, address etc., on same, and mail it in along with a money order in the proper amount.

Cost and validation periods of the license will remain the same; fifty cents for operators license for two years; one dollar for commercial license for one year; and three dollars for chauffeur's license for one year.

There was a possibility that the Decatur-Cisco game, scheduled in Decatur, might be played in Cisco. Davis offered the Indians a large cut of the gate receipts to move the game here.

If Cisco and Ranger are tied for the crown, a three-game play-off probably will be arranged to settle the issue.
