# Bright Buriness Outlook Scen By Lone Star Prexy

EASTLAND, Feb. 16 - Pres. D. A. Hulcy of Lone Star Gas used the experience of his firm as a yardstick to measure the outlook of general business in an address here Thursday night at the annual banquet of the Eastland Chamber of Com-

The veteran civic leader, who has just finished three years as president of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, was optimistic. He told some 200 persons that "the government and the people will never permit a recurrence of a depression like that of 1930."

Lone Star Gas Co., beginning an expansion program with the availability of steel in 1948, added 38,000 new customers in that year, he said. The new customer department took on 40,000 new names in 1949, and estimates for 1950 indicate that almost 40,000 nore will be added.

Hulcy said Lone Star has already spent \$80,000,000 in improvements.

The industrial decentralization movement promises much for the southwest, he said. He believed the 1950 census would open the eyes of the entire nation." People in the east are beginning to advise the younger generation to "Go to Texas," he

Hulcy cautioned business men to take more interest in the government, urging frequent letters to Congressmen "who will appreciate your views." He added that "too many of us are indifferent to the government."


