SPEAKING OF vacant houses in the country, we're told that there is a back-to-the-farm trend in the East and Midwest. It's due to hit this section, too. And, in our opinion, it's a good deal. Farm life, often without a lot of city conveniences, has much to offer.

Ranger Man Given Prison Sentence

J. J. (Jack) McDowell of Ranger was sentenced to two years in the Texas Penitentiary in 91st District Court in Eastland today on charges in connection with passing worthless checks. He pleaded guilty in three cases. According to the indictment, the checks were passed in Ranger last October.

Dennison Well Cemented; Will Seek Completion

Lone Star Producing Co. set pipe in their J. W. Dennison No. 1, wildcat oil test five miles southwesterly of Cisco, late Thursday and will seek completion as a producer, it was reported today.

Pipe was cemented to 3,850 feet—through the Duffer formation and above the Ellenburger, where salt water had been encountered. Electric logs reportedly indicated possibilities in the Ranger and Caddo formations.

It will probably be Monday or Tuesday before further work is undertaken, giving the cement time to set.

Elsewhere in the area, the E. C. Johnston No. 1 Eppler was still rigging up with heavier equipment to try to loosen tools wedged in the hole. Trouble developed during completion work in the Lake Sand.

Grand Jury Will Get Case Of LA Nurse

District Attorney Elzo Beene said this week that he planned to present to a grand jury the case of Mrs. Margaret Nash, who told Los Angeles police recently that she killed a Ranger policeman 25 years ago.

Beene said the grand jury will convene Monday.

Mrs. Nash, 42-year-old nurse, "confessed" to Los Angeles officials she shot and killed Jimmie Daniels in Ranger 25 years ago.

Unified Armed Forces Day Plan Put In Motion

Unified Armed Forces Day observances scheduled for May 20 this year were put in motion last week for Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas, Oklahoma and New Mexico at a joint conference held at Brooks Air Force Base in San Antonio.

Representatives from Eighth Naval District Hq at New Orleans, and the Fourth Army Hq at Fort Sam Houston, Texas met with Major General Alden R. Crawford, Commanding General of the Twelfth Air Force.

General Crawford represented the Air Force and has been made the overall coordinator by the Department of Defense for all three services, Army, Navy, and Air Force, in five states.

It was agreed that where more than one had units in a city or community that one service would be the steering or coordinating service. The service thus designated would then be responsible for the overall plans in that particular area and the services there would appoint project officers to assist. In this manner all local resources, whether Army, Navy, or Air Force, would combine under one planning headquarters.

Selection of project officers is now in the process and detail planning will be under way within approximately ten days. Civilian and other organizations will be advised through their hometown newspapers and radio stations of local plans and who to contact in order to participate.

Presbyterian Educator To Speak Here Sunday

A Presbyterian educator nationally known as an outstanding youth worker will be guest speaker Sunday morning at the regular worship services of the First Presbyterian Church of Cisco.

He is the Rev. C. Ellis Nelson, professor of Religious Education at the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary and formerly Director of young people's work for Southern Presbyterians.

The Rev. Nelson has made two visits to Europe as a delegate to youth meetings, and in 1940 he helped establish an interdenominational youth program in Mexico.

His first trip to Europe was in 1939 when he went to Amsterdam as a delegate to the World Conference of Christian Youth. In 1947 he returned to attend the World Conference meeting

at Oslo. Also in he was an observer for the United Christian Movement in Prague and served as a delegate to the Youth Division of the World Council of Churches meeting in Lund, Sweden.

The Rev. Nelson is a native of Beaumont and was graduated from Austin College, Sherman, and Austin Seminary. He also attended Lamar College and Texas A&M. He received his master of arts degree in educational psychology from the University of Texas in 1940 and has been a prominent member of the Austin Seminary staff since September, 1948.

Ranger Triumphs By 2 Points In Initial Contest

The Cisco Junior College Wranglers will be seeking to even the series with Ranger Junior College at the Community gym tonight after dropping the first contest in the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference championship play-off in Ranger Thursday night by a 46-48 score.

The play-off became necessary when the two teams wound up the regular season in a tie for the top position. At a meeting in Eastland Tuesday it was decided to play the first game in Ranger Thursday and the second game in Cisco Friday. If the third game is needed it will probably be played Saturday night with the place to be decided later.

In the game Thursday night the Wranglers appeared to be over anxious and missed several shots that they would ordinarily make.

Little Doc Rainey was the outstanding player on the court for the Wranglers and won high point honors for the team with 13. Gunn was second with nine and Lee was in third place with eight.

It was a close affair from the start to the finish with neither team ever enjoying more than a six point lead. In the final two minutes Grigsby tossed one in to tie the count. With thirty seconds remaining Ranger made two points to go out in front and froze the ball until the whistle sounded the end of the game.

Coach Stormy Davis stated Friday morning that he would probably start Gunn and Hutchinson at forwards, Rainey and Travis at guards and Lee at center in the crucial game tonight.

"There will be some fires built before the game tonight," Davis said, "and fans will see a different brand of ball."

Bright Business Outlook Seen By Lone Star Prexy

EASTLAND, Feb. 16 — Pres. D. A. Hulcy of Lone Star Gas Co. used the experience of his firm as a yardstick to measure the outlook of general business in an address here Thursday night at the annual banquet of the Eastland Chamber of Commerce.

The veteran civic leader, who has just finished three years as president of the Dallas Chamber of Commerce, was optimistic. He told some 200 persons that "the government and the people will never permit a recurrence of a depression like that of 1930."

Lone Star Gas Co., beginning an expansion program with the availability of steel in 1948, added 38,000 new customers in that year, he said. The new customer department took on 40,000 new names in 1949, and estimates for 1950 indicate that almost 40,000 more will be added.

Hulcy said Lone Star has already spent \$80,000,000 in improvements.

The industrial decentralization movement promises much for the southwest, he said. He believed the 1950 census would "open the eyes of the entire nation." People in the east are beginning to advise the younger generation to "Go to Texas," he added.

Hulcy cautioned business men to take more interest in the government, urging frequent letters to Congressmen "who will appreciate your views." He added that "too many of us are indifferent to the government."

Quoting part of the Boy Scout oath, he urged more attention to "our growing boys and girls." He believed that stronger religious ties would contribute to solving world problems.

W. B. Pickets, manager of the Texas Electric Service Co. in Eastland, reviewed activities of the Chamber of Commerce during the past year. He pointed out that the city's water problem was a major project for the coming year.

Dr. W. K. Cowan was toastmaster. A musical program was provided by a men's quartet.

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OIL INDUSTRY SERVES NOTICE

The oil industry has served blunt notice on Congress that the Treasury Department is jeopardizing the welfare of the nation and the internal security of the U. S. by urging a reduction in the tax depletion allowance granted to the thousands of oil and gas producers in the country.

A group of industry spokesmen told the House Ways and Means Committee that any change in the present 27 1/2% depletion allowance will chase away the venture capital which is so important in maintaining the rate of new oil well discoveries necessary to meet present and future demands.

The oil men also declared that the Treasury Department proposal to slice the depletion allowance to 15% will drive many of the small producers out of business and in the long run will have a sharp impact on the economic life of the entire country.

Lieut. Gen. Ernest O. Thompson, of Austin, a member of the Texas Railroad Commission for 17 years, addressed the Committee as a "citizen soldier" and made a strong plea for retention

of the present tax provision. Emphasizing the role oil plays in war, he said:

"Oil is ammunition. In defense oil is a prime mover. The proposed saving here put forward by the Treasury Department of \$200 million by the government, by cutting depletion allowance from 27 1/2% down to 15% would, in my opinion, be poor economy.

"Why tamper with a system which has twice in a generation brought forth the drilling which is the only way to find oil, and has made oil available in such quantities that we have been able to win two wars? Men venture in risky drilling for the reward which follows success. Remove the rewards and our domestic supply in oil will shrivel and we will become dependent on foreign oil. Foreign oil, of course, will be denied us."

Gen. Thompson also made this statement to the committee: "We do not yet have enough ready reserve oil producing capacity for our national security, not half enough. Revenue, however badly needed, cannot be considered when our national security is at stake. Our very freedom is involved. Come war there

will be no time to drill wells. "To be useful for defense, gentlemen, the oil wells must have already been drilled. Reserves lying undrilled are of no value and there would be no time to drill them. The oil wells must have been already drilled, equipped, and ready to produce, hooked up and connected to the pipelines and to the refineries in sufficient quantities and of proper quality."

Also leading the fight against the Treasury's proposal were Russell B. Brown, co-chairman of the General Depletion Committee of the petroleum industry; Roland V. Rodman, president of Anderson-Prichard Corp., of Oklahoma City; B. A. Hardey, of Shreveport, an independent producer; and J. P. Jones, of Bradford, Penna., president of the National Stripper Well Assn. Brown stated that the "tax provisions under discussion by Congress were meant to produce certain results" and that they have been "met fully."

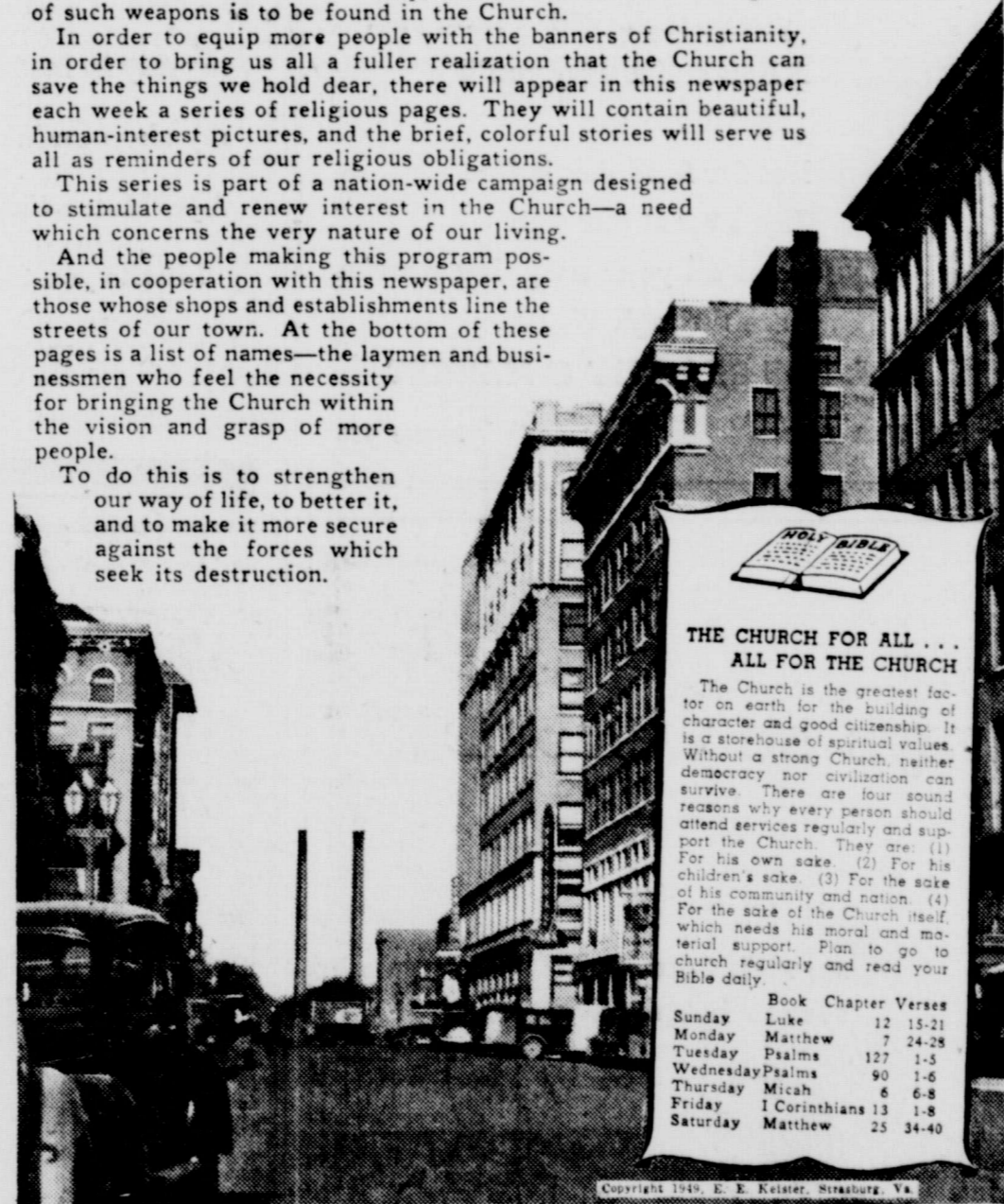

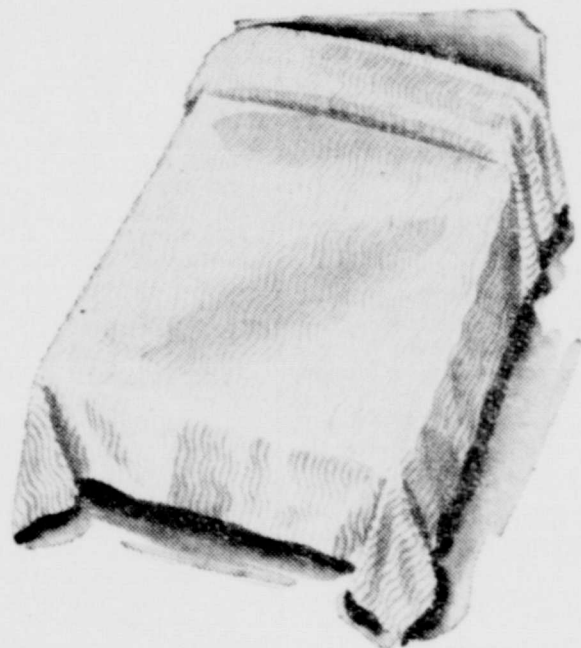

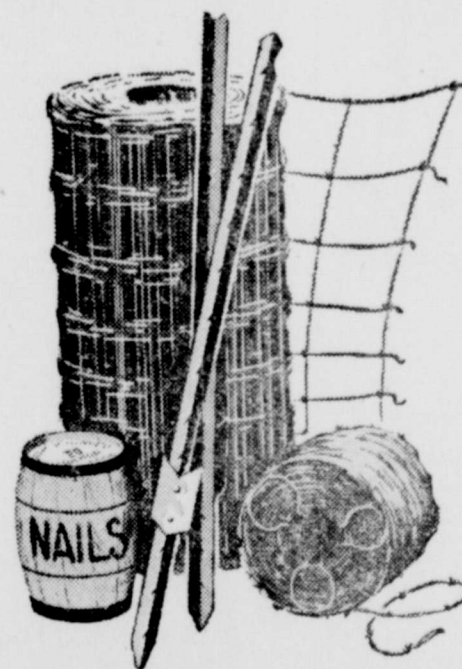
