Parking Meters Discussed In Statement By Mayor Rosenthal

Now that an election has been held to vote on the question of retaining or removing the parking meters in Cisco, a few pertinent facts may be in line for consideration. Mayor G. C. Rosenthal said in a statement Saturday. First of all, the erroneous impression that has been accepted is that the meters have caused sales to fall off and some were going to other towns. By reading the news throughout the country it will be found that this is altogether an error.

We had meters installed at a time when business was reaching normal level after a flurry of war-time conditions, and also considered was a short time when drilling in the Kleiner Pool brought extra payrolls to town. And now that business has reached its present level, the meters are not the cause. As previously stated the income from meters as well as the space available to shop has proved very advantageous in approximately three years when the meters became property of the city the income will be used in im-

H-U A CAPPELLA CHOIR WILL GIVE CONCERT HERE FEB. 27

The Hardin-Simmons University A Cappella Choir, one of the few choral organizations in Texas to sing exclusively without accompaniment, will give a concert at Cisco Community Gym on February 27, under the auspices of Cisco Junior College. This is one of several concert appearances which the choir will make this semester. It is directed by Euell Porter.



EWELL PORTER, director of the choir, will sing selections which date from the devout church music of Palestrina, Bach, and Billings, up to lyrics by Jerome Kern. Modern folk

songs will also be heard, and several concert editions of Noble Cain's Negro spirituals will be rendered.

The Hardin-Simmons A Cappella Choir, organized at the beginning of the fall semester, is under the direction of Euell Porter, recently appointed head of the voice department at H-SU. Under Porter's direction, the 50 member group has rehearsed daily since its organization approximately one month ago. The choir is a true cappella choir. No instruments are used, even to secure initial pitches.

There is an equal number of male and female voices, making a better blend of voices and tone.

New-style uniforms will be worn by the choir. Men will be wearing cassock robes of wine colored gabardine. Girls will be dressed in wine gabardine skirts with silver satin surplices.

Included in the choir are not only students who are majoring in music, but students from almost every department of the university. All members of the choir will not be taken to the Baptist convention.

To add variety to the sacred and secular song program, the choir includes a male quartet—Bob Smith, Bryan, first tenor, Jimmy Loden, Freeport, second tenor; Charles Downey, Bryan, baritone; and Maurice Alfred, Huntsville, bass.

A girls' trio, which sings both sacred and popular numbers, is made up of Lena Sue Chilton, Lamesa, first soprano; Lillian Ballenger, Council Bluffs, Iowa, second soprano; and Barbara Brown, Midland, alto.

The Ranger Junior College Rangers were in undisputed possession of the Basketball championship of the Western Zone of the Texas Junior College Athletic Conference by virtue of their 39-33 victory over the Cisco Junior College Wranglers at Community Gym Friday night.

The game was the second of the play-off series which resulted as the two teams were tied for the honors at the end of the regular title chase. Ranger won the first of the games in Ranger Thursday night by a 48-46 score.

The largest crowd ever gathered at the local gym to witness a basketball game was on hand to see an inspired Ranger team crush the hopes of the over-anxious Wranglers. The locals were never able to get going and even though they out scored their rivals in the last half they were unable to overcome the 21-9 lead

It was the sharp shooting of Ranger's Harper that spelled the difference in the game. The stony faced forward who hails from Seymour accounted for 18 of his teams 39 points before he went out via the foul route late in the game.

It was a rough and tumble affair from start to finish though comparatively few fouls were called. The fact that the Wranglers made only nine field goals attested to the fact that they were off form for the evening. Doc Rainey was high point player for the Wranglers with eight points. Booger Emerson was in second place with six and Gunn trailed with five. No Wrangler made more than two field goals.

Coach Davis used almost every man on the squad in an effort to stem the tide and face play-off into the full 3 games. As a result of the Friday game the Wranglers finished the season in possession of second place.

Garden Club's Major Project Is Beautification Of Highway

As one of its major projects for the year, in order to become affiliated as a standard garden club, the Cisco Garden Club has launched a highway beautification campaign designed to add to the scenic beauty of the new section of U. S. Highway 80 beginning at the residential section of the city and extending to the Eastland-Callahan County line.

Club members donated some 2,000 Iris tubers which were planted at culverts on the highway by the Highway Department in Eastland. Ewing Baker of the Highway Department accepted the flowers and was responsible for having them set out. Also planted along the route were some 25 plum trees donated by Mrs. J. V. Heyser. In addition, the Highway Department has set out Redbud trees along the right-of-way and is working with the Garden Club in getting them set out in the city limits on both sides of West 8th.

The club also purchased some 100 watermelon red Crepe Myrtle and sold them to home owners in the city as a part of their program to beautify the town. They have taken orders for some 150 Redbud trees and expect that many more to be planted in the city.

Cisco's low-cost housing project was a step nearer completion Saturday with the announcement that President Truman has signed and approved a loan of \$28,000 for use in preliminary work.

The Cisco Housing Authority whose application recently was approved with recommendation that 70 housing units be built here, has begun a survey in connection with the project. Forms incident to final approval were filled out by the authority during the past week.

News of the President's approval was given local officials in telegrams from Senator Lyndon Johnson and the federal housing administrator. A check for the \$28,000 for use in preliminary work is expected in Cisco in ten days or two weeks.

College Bus Runs Into Road Ditch

Several students received minor scratches and bruises Friday afternoon when a Cisco Junior College bus ran into a ditch on the Base Line Road a mile past the old Lee farm south of Cisco. One student, Lou Ann Jackson, was treated at Graham Hospital.

Driver France Bond of near Carbon said the mishap occurred when the steering mechanism failed. President O. L. Stamey of the college, investigating the accident, said it was unavoidable.

Yarger, champion twirler, and his royal partner, Miss Norma King. The following year brought to the throne Garnet Hart and his queen, Miss Kay Phillips.

In 1940 the Lobo crown went to Coy Warren, famous Cisco Grid star, and he chose as his queen, Miss Alice Louise Slicker, yell leader at CHS. This partnership became a permanent one. They attended the University of Texas where he majored in petroleum engineering, they were later married.

A striking parallel was the royal choice the following year. Bob Latson and Miss Ruby Kent were crowned at Chesley Field as the ninth rulers of the Lobo Kingdom. Now, Mr. and Mrs. Latson, they are the parents of one child. Bob is now affiliated with his father here in Latson Construction Co.

In 1942 the royal diadem was presented to Kenneth Huffman who chose as his queen Miss Gloria Graham. Miss Graham, noted for her exceptional musical talent, was awarded a fellowship at the Juilliard School of Music, later studied violin in France for a year, and is now a violinist with the Dallas Symphony Orchestra. Last year, she became Mrs. Lawden Stroud, Jr. The following year Raymond

Thomas, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Thomas, was in the royal limelight along with his queen, Miss Doris Jamison. Doris is now employed in Fort Worth and Raymond is enrolled at the University of Texas with a degree in Architectural Design as his goal.

Succeeding Raymond was Homer (Spec) Tompkins, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. H. Tompkins, and at present a student at Texas Christian University. So goes the history of the Lobo royalty. And it's easy to see why the ambition of every high school boy is to be King Lobo. It may be "king for a night", but it's a symbol of popularity that usually is good for a lifetime.
