'NATIONAL SECURITY' IS THEME OF SPEECH AT LEGION MEETING

National security was defined as "a state of organized readiness to meet any external aggression through complete mobilization of public opinion, trained men, provided weapons, food supplies and essential industries" by E. L. Jackson, Naval veteran and former post commander, at a meeting of Cisco Legionnaires and Auxiliary members here Monday night. Jackson cautioned that "a sound defense structure that will satisfy the requirements of organized readiness will be expensive and will involve a comparable degree of personal sacrifice." He noted that the future outlook is one of heavy responsibilities for every citizen.

Mr. LeFevre operated a flour mill in Cisco when he came here from Portales, New Mexico in 1933. He was born in Guernsey, Channel Is., England, May 12, 1885 and spent much of his boyhood there. He was married to Miss Mary N. Wallace in Woodson on December 12, 1912.

THREE SCHOOL TRUSTEES AGREE TO RUN AGAIN IN APRIL POLL

G. R. Nance, Homer Ferguson and W. C. Hogue, members of the Board of Trustees of the Cisco Independent School District, have agreed for their names to be submitted for re-election, it was announced today.

The annual school election will be held on Saturday, April 1 addressed to the patrons of the Cisco Independent School District, the three men issued the following statement:

"The terms of the undersigned trustees of the Cisco Independent School District expire this year. At the request of other members of the board and many citizens we are again offering our names for election.

"We do so for the following reasons: 1. 'The financial set-up of our school system is now in process of reorganization. Much has been accomplished during the past three years in solving the serious situation left by the depression.

"The bonds have been refunded including past due interest. A schedule of payments has been set up which makes it possible for the schools to meet the debt obligations promptly.

"The problem is not yet completely solved, however, due to recent legislation; and other members of the board have asked us to remain with them during this period of adjustment, if it is the will of the people. We have agreed to do so, if the voters desire.

2. 'The statewide reorganization of the school system known as the Gilmer-Aiken plan — has created some hard problems in our local organization. These problems require time and a thorough understanding of the workings of the system.

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“THOSE HIDDEN TAXES”

In an editorial called “Those Hidden Taxes,” the New York Herald Tribune observes, “The citizen who grins and bears it each week when he takes note of deductions from his take home pay, or who gulps when he makes the quarterly payments on his income tax, has perhaps mercifully been spared a consciousness of the hidden taxes which fall upon him every day.”

The federal government is the biggest tax eater by far. It takes 71 cents of each tax dollar, while the state takes 15c and the local units 14c. By contrast, in 1932, the federal government took but 22%, and in 1939, but 39%.

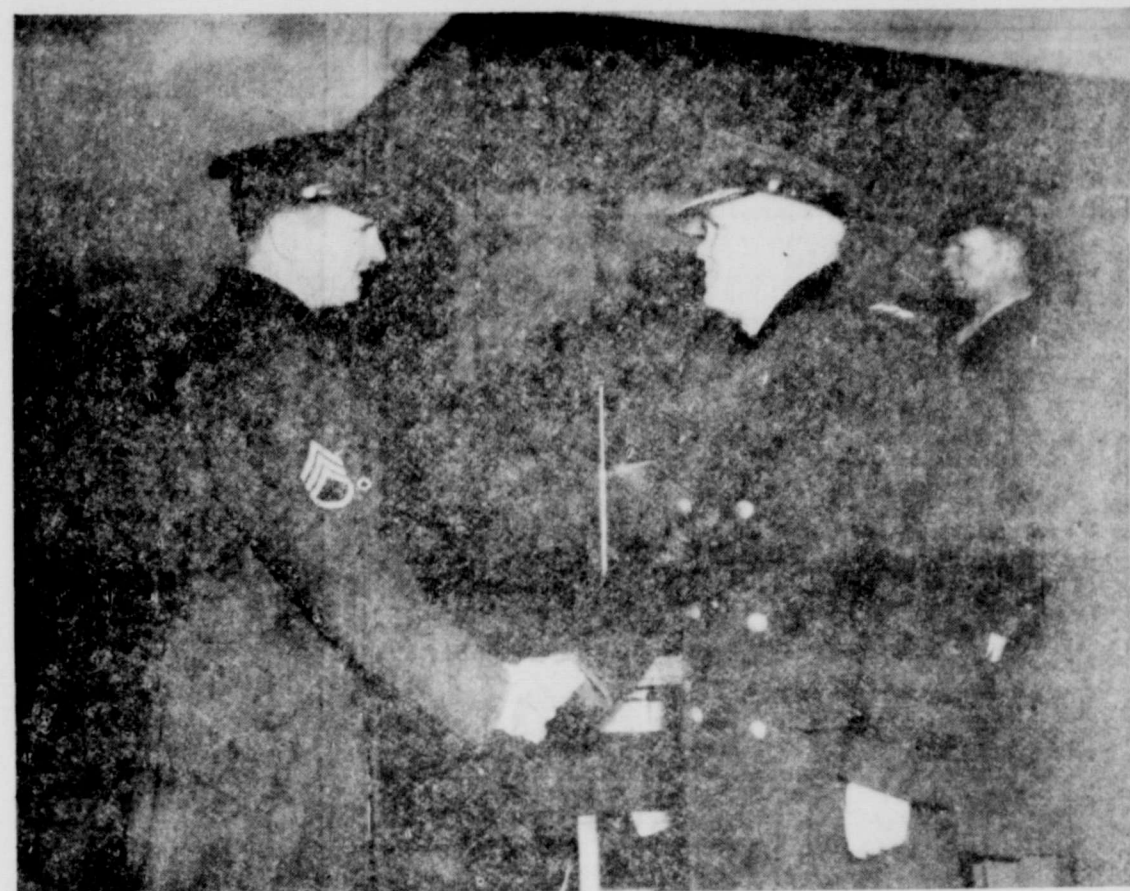
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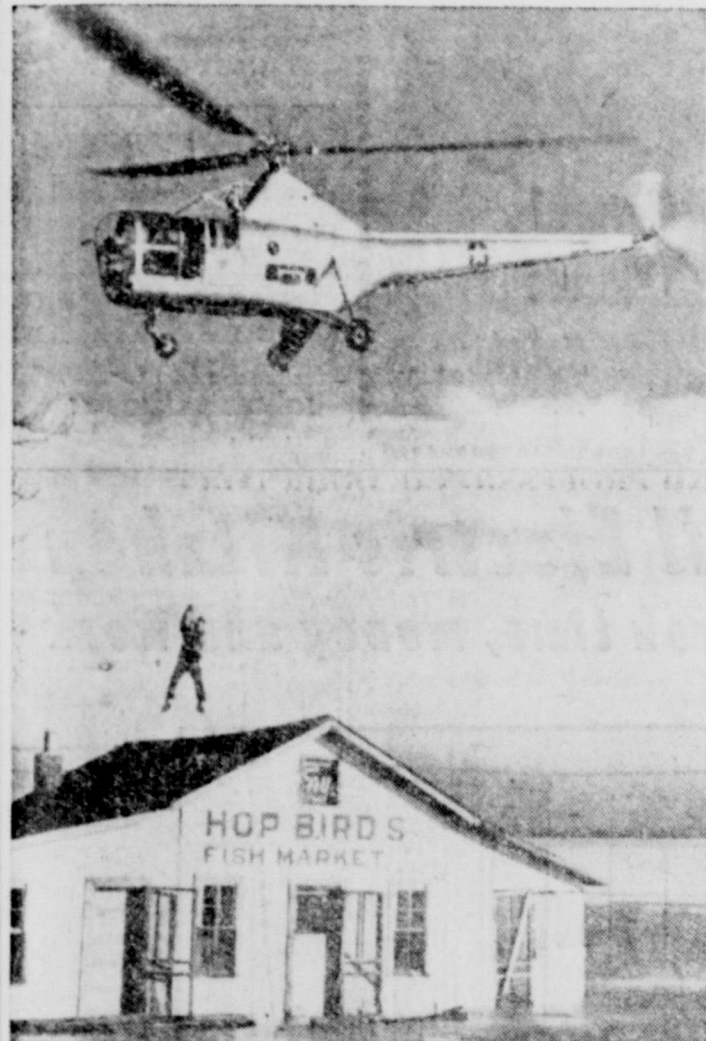

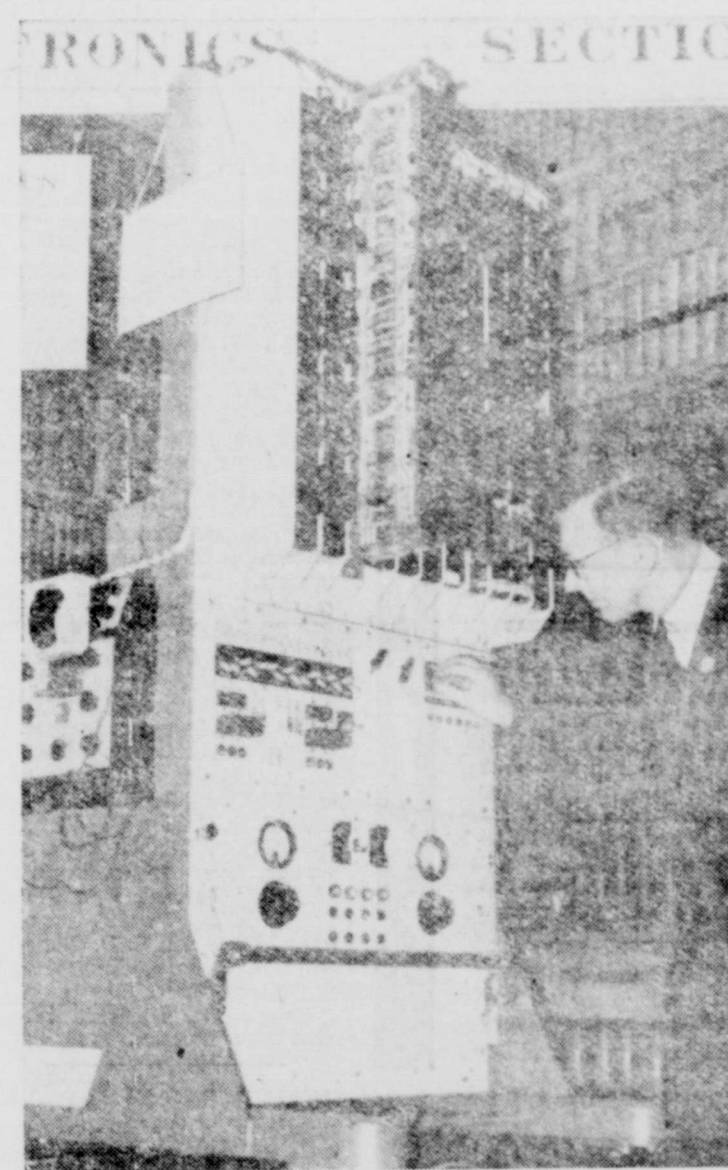

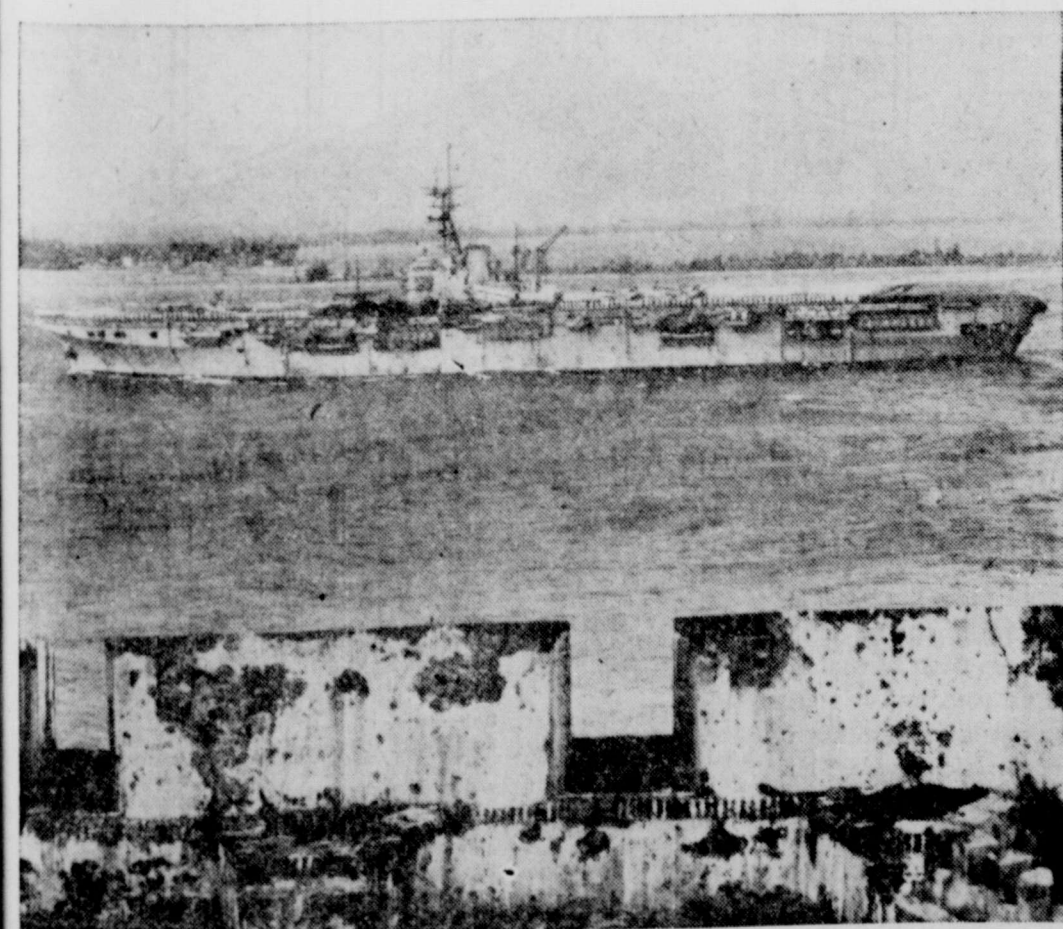

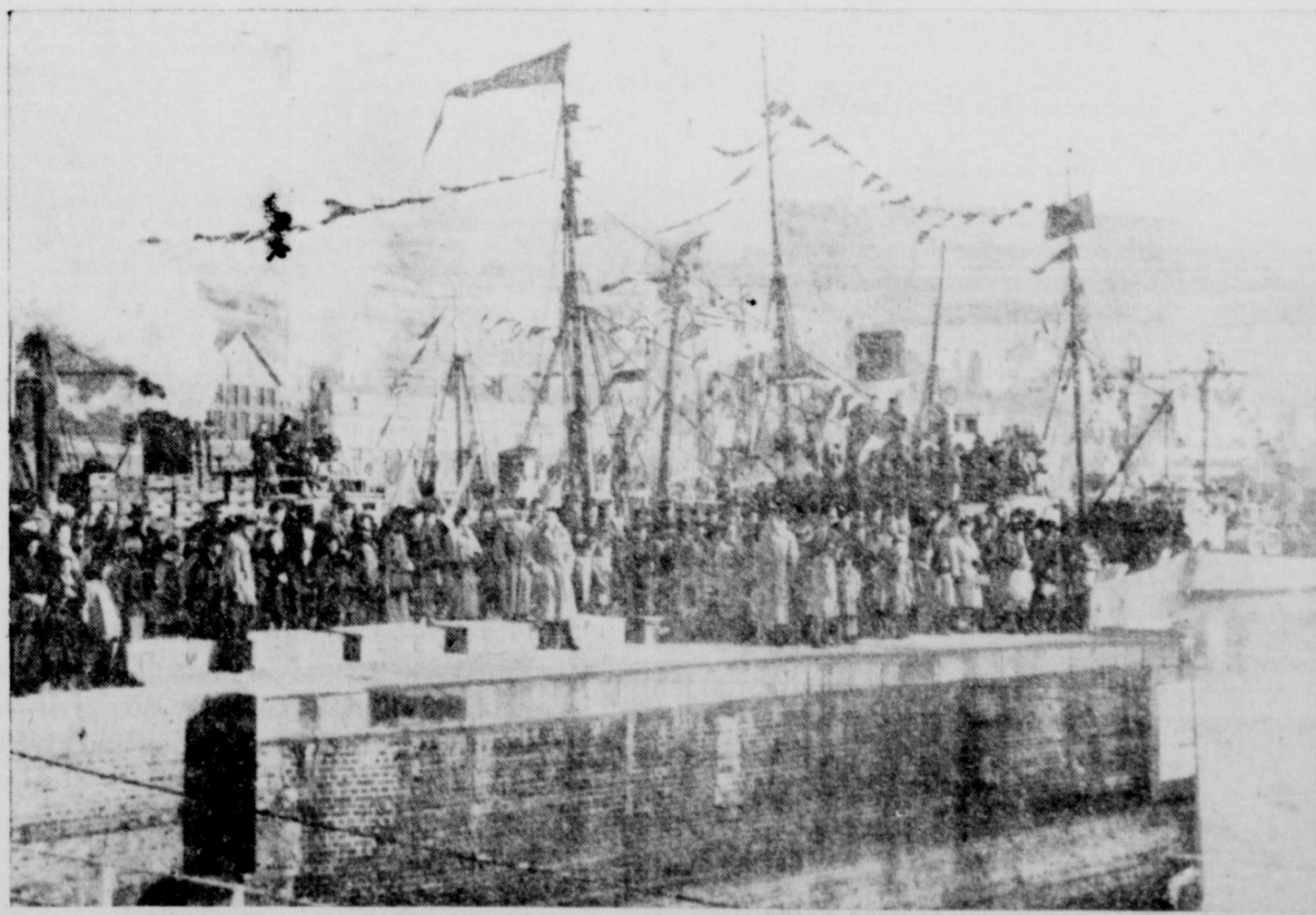
