Citizens Group Agrees Imports **Economy Threat**

AUSTIN, Feb. 23. - Representatives of every segment of the Texas economy, meeting Wednesday in Austin at the request of Railroad Commissioner William J. Murray, Jr., to consider the problem of petroleum imports, lost no time in reaching unanimous agreement that oil imports are excessive and injuring the economy of both Texas and the Nation. In his welcoming address to the 50 Texans, headed by E. J. Mc-Curdy of Fort Worth and Dr. T.
S. Painter, president of The University of Texas, Commission Bill Murray stressed the point that the oil import problem has ceased to be one affecting only one industry. The time has arrived, he said when citizens of all walks he said, when citizens of all walks of Texas Life must make known their feelings on a matter which is undermining not only the independent segment of the oil in dustry but the jobs of many thousands of Texans and income of the State Government.

As citizens of the State first affected, Murray said, an obligation clearly exists to do every thing possible to seek a fair and permanent solution.





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
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
