Tucker Will Run For Sheriff Of Eastland County

J. F. (Frank) Tucker, native resident of Eastland County, announced Saturday that he is a candidate for Sheriff of this County, subject to the Democratic primaries. In connection with his candidacy, Mr. Tucker issued the following statement:

To the voters of Eastland County

"I am a candidate for nomination as sheriff of our county in the coming Democratic primary this year. I am not personally known to all of you, and must take this method to tell about myself. I was born and raised on a farm about ten miles southwest of Cisco, where I now live. 'I will be 55 years old next May; am married, the father of 7 children, the two oldest having married and the remaining five are still at home with me and their mother."

"I have never been a candidate for any office before and don't know how to make a race, but I intend to meet as many of you as I can and will conduct my campaign as fairly and honestly as far as I know how, as I try to do in all my dealings with men. If I am elected as your sheriff, I will do my very best to be a good one to the best of my knowledge, always having in mind the courteous treatment due every one, and will show as little partiality as it is humanly possible for me to do, in the enforcement of all laws; yet be firm and untiring in my efforts to arrest persons accused of violating our laws and in enforcing the criminal statutes of Texas."

"I will regard it as a personal favor if those who are not acquainted with me will make inquiry of those of my community where I have resided for a lifetime as to what they think of my qualification for this office, and will appreciate any support you may give me in my candidacy for sheriff."

The evening services will begin at 7:30 p. m. in the fellowship hall and a special invitation was issued to everyone to attend. A social hour will follow the service.

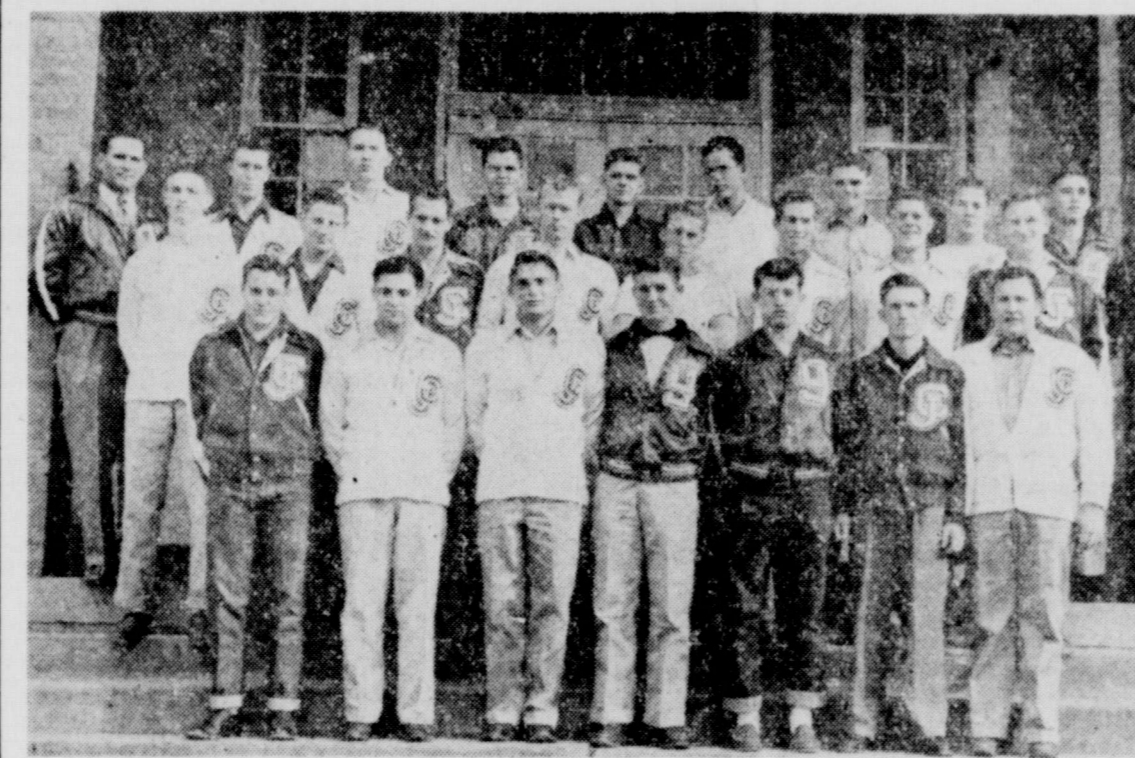
ODOM AND FIELDS WILL DIRECT 1950 CENSUS COUNT IN COUNTY

Appointment of Olin O. Odom and Esen Fields as directors of the 1950 federal census of Eastland County was announced here Saturday. The regular ten-year "nose count" will begin in the county on April 1 and is expected to be completed in about a month.

Odom will direct the census in the north half of the county, and Fields will be in charge of the south half and the rural areas. The dividing line between the two sectors is just south of Cisco. Odom's sector will include Cisco, Eastland, and Ranger, while Fields will be in charge in Rising Star, Gorman, Carbon, Desdemona and Scranton, and the rural areas.

Applications have been taken from 60 residents of the county for jobs as census enumerators. A total of 39 will be employed in the county, and they will be about evenly divided in the two sectors.

were somewhat brighter Saturday after Caddo tests showed strong gas pressure.

Three sections of the Caddo were acidized with 7,000 gallons of acid and a drill stem test Friday show gas at the rate of from one to two million cubic feet with oil stains. First casing perforations were at 3,000 feet, with others lower.

It was in the upper Caddo that Lone Star hoped for oil. Electric logs had indicated the best possibilities in this sector. Little gas pressure had shown on previous tests.

Lone Star expected to continue testing in the Caddo for several days, hopeful that oil will be recovered.

Two miles southeast of Cisco, the E. C. Johnston No. 1 Eppler still was in trouble Saturday. Efforts to cement a break in the casing, caused when tools became wedged recently in completion work, have been unsuccessful.

It was reported that mud and water fill the hole as fast as the bailers can clean it out. It was understood that work was shut down Saturday morning while officials determined the next step.

The well is an offset to Hickok Producing Company's recent Lake discovery. Johnston topped the Lake and cemented. Rotary equipment was skidded to drill in with cable tools. While drilling in, unexpected gas pressure wedged the tools. Rotary equipment was moved back to free the hole. The casing break followed.

Elsewhere in the area, Lone Star expected to spud in today in their No. 3 Calloway, 12 miles north of Cisco in the Caddo pool. Rigging was completed Friday.

Ramsey Well Is Feted; Drilling Will Continue

Drill stem tests were run late Friday on the McElroy Ranch Company's W. A. Ramsey No. 1, and indications were that the well could be completed as a good gasser in the bottom of the Caddo Lime. The hole was bottomed at 3,470 for the tests.

Previous tests in the upper Caddo showed a good quantity of gas and some distillate. Operators were confident that a well could be completed at that depth. The Caddo was reached at 3,195 feet and the first tests were made in the first 100 feet.

The permit calls for an Ellenburger test and the operators plan extensive tests of all prospective pay zones to the Ellenburger. Prospects to be explored were the Lake Sand, the Marble Falls, the upper and lower Ranger, and the Mississippian.

The well is located some six miles west of Cisco near the Eastland-Callahan County lines.

TEXAS' PART IN WATERFOWL PROGRAM WILL BE OUTLINED

AUSTIN, March 4 — The major part Texas plays in the overall waterfowl program will be pointedly indicated at San Francisco during the coming week. The executive secretary of the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commission will preside at the session devoted exclusively to ducks and geese at the 15th annual meeting of the North American Wildlife Conference in the California city. He will handle the panel of speakers, including the recognized leaders

in this field in the U. S. and Canada, and will also report on his own observations and those of his field staff. Aside from the protective benefits provided by the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission, the State of Texas is a natural factor in the welfare of millions of waterfowl. This is primarily because Texas has the longest coastline of states bordering on the famed gulf wintering areas for ducks and geese. The Lone Star State's contribution to waterfowl management is reflected when contrasted with that of the average inland state through which the flocks merely pass

during comparatively brief periods in the spring and fall. As the ducks and geese begin the long spring migration northward to summer nesting places, the men who help guide the policies affecting waterfowl management stand ready to discuss subjects bearing on the present state of the flocks, problems in waterfowl management, and on any new trends in breeding, migration, or wintering habits of the birds.

The executive secretary emphasized that the San Francisco annual conference will not make any conclusive decisions about the 1950 hunting regulations. Dates of the annual waterfowl shoot and the bag limits will be set in late summer on the basis of the present bird census but definitely on the basis of general breeding conditions and on reports from the northland nesting area. While the regulations will be set later for the bagging of birds that can be spared from the current flocks, the new waterfowl year approaches with duck and geese brood stocks theoretically in good condition. The mild fall weather during the 1949 shooting season helped thousands of ducks to upset the experts' bag estimates with the presumed result that barring an unforeseen setback, more birds will be available for 1950 propagation than had been anticipated.

It was pointed out by the executive secretary that many factors, basically weather, affect the annual hatch. For example, drought is a constant menace. In any event, whether the 1950 crop of goslings and ducklings is good, fair, or poor, the hunting pressure is certain to continue to an ever increasing degree. And that unmistakable fact will probably be paramount in the minds of the leaders at the San Francisco conference.

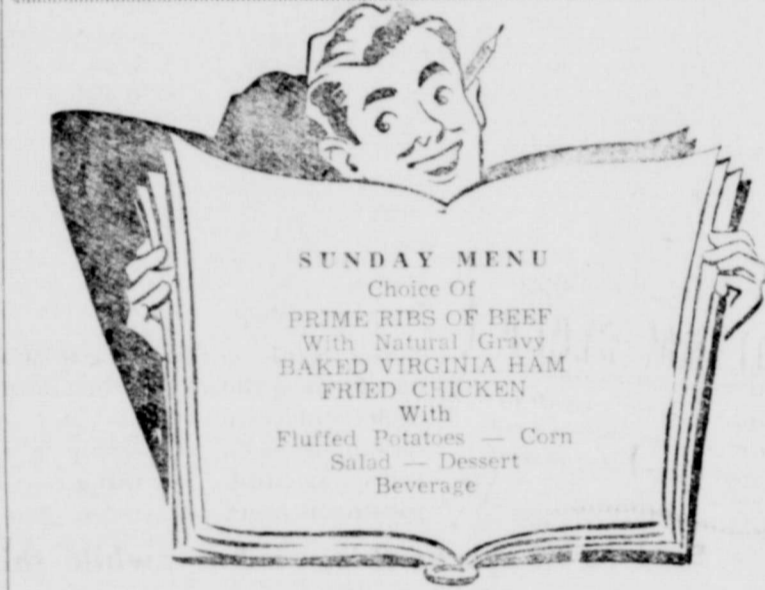

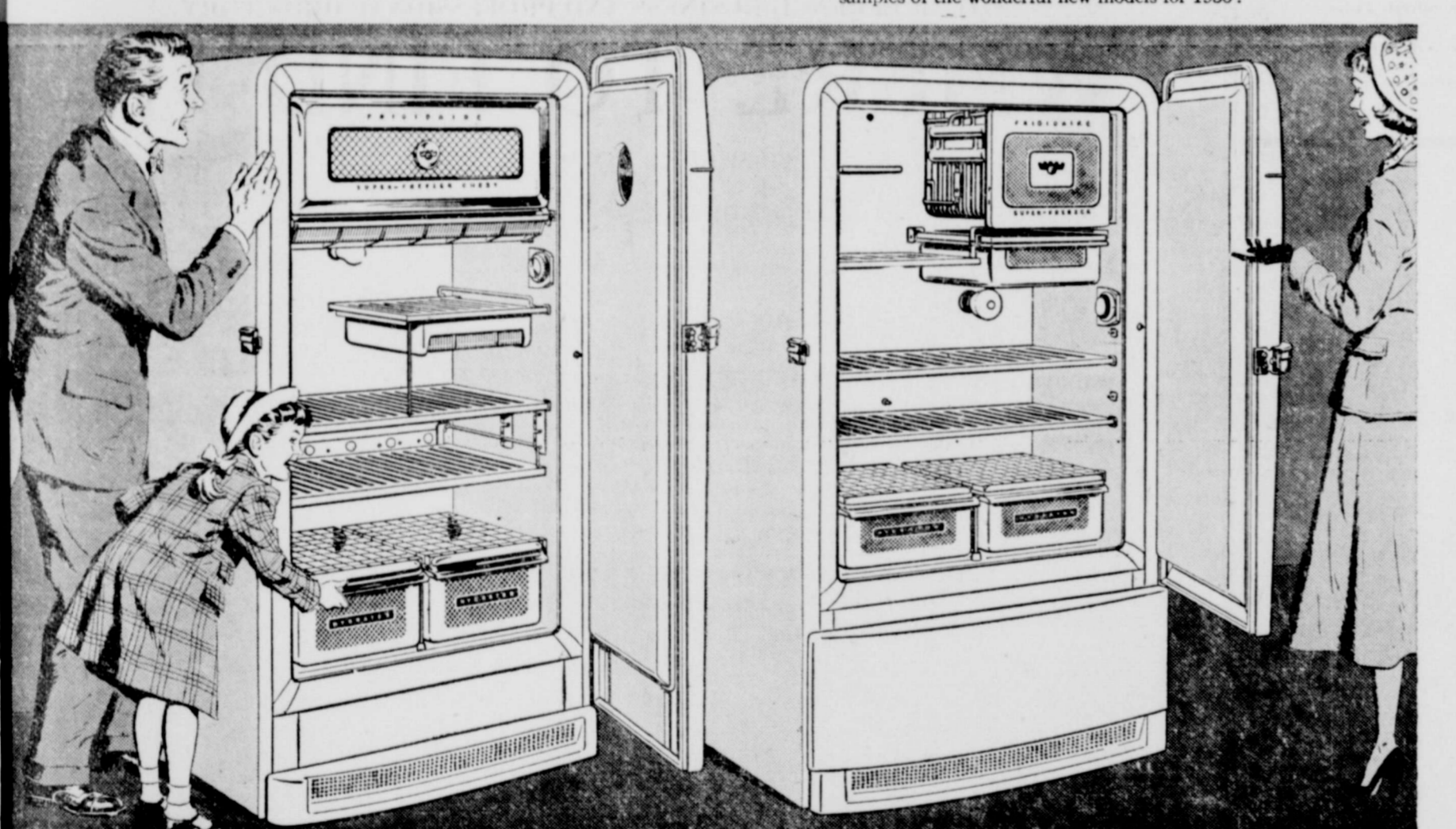

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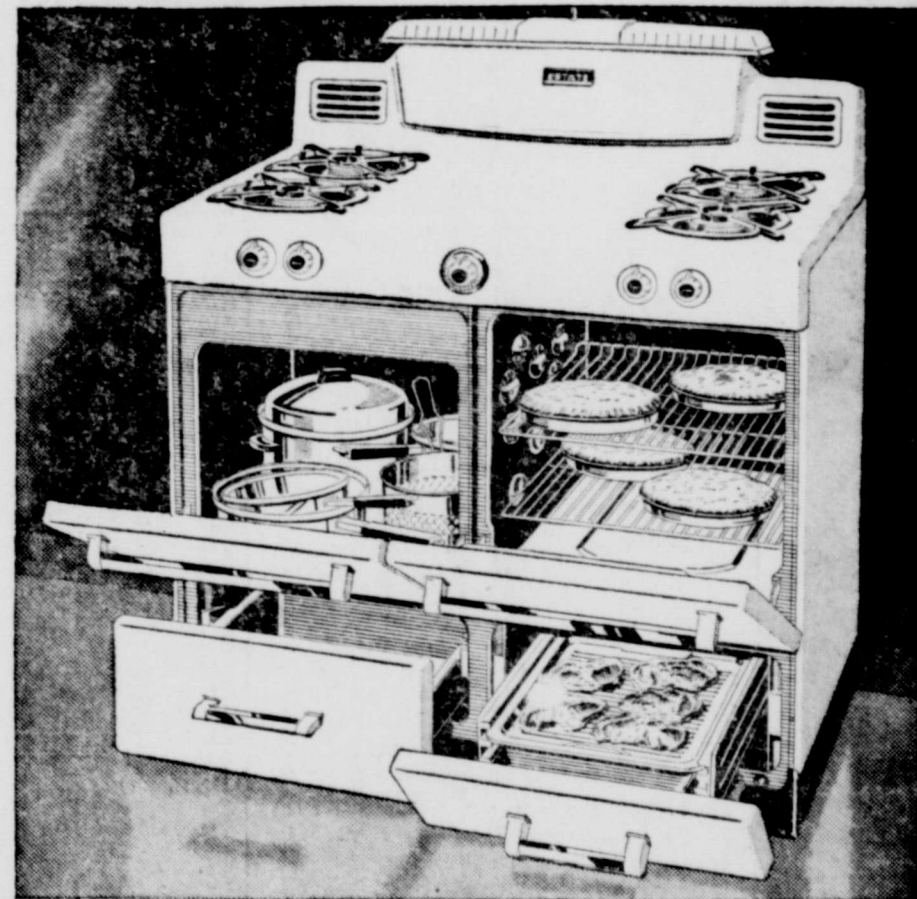
