

## Farm Census To **Reveal Changes** In Land Ownership

One of the interesting findings of the 1950 Census of Agriculture, to be taken in April, will reveal the change in the number of smal farms in Eastland County.

This number is the largest since the 570,831 farms enumerated in the 1935 Census Agriculture during the "back the land" movement in the pression years. Between 1930 : 1935, there was an increase 212,327 farms under 10 acres ize, but during the last five years of this decade the number of these farms declined by 64,429, or the Eastland County Livestock 11.2 percent

During World Warr II farms 7.4 percent from 506,402 in 1940 594,561 in 1945. In this period, he number of farms under 3 aces in size almost trebled from 35,977 in 1940 to 98,966 in 1945 while the number between 3 and acres in size increased from 470,425 to 495,595.

The increase in number of farms under 10 acres between the ears 1940 and 1945 was noticeable in all sections of the county Farms under 10 acres in size in creased 23 percent in the South is compared with a 9 percent increase in the North.




