Building of a water reservoir on the Colony Creek fork of the Upper Leon River as a water supply source for five cities in this area to cost \$6,432,000 was proposed by the Bureau of Reclamation at a meeting in Eastland Tuesday afternoon.

Cisco was represented at the meeting by Mayor G. C. Rosenthal and Manager B. A. Butler of the Chamber of Commerce.

Harry P. Burleigh, area enginer for the bureau, submitted the proposal at a special meeting sponsored by the Eastland County Water Supply District. The cities of Cisco, Ranger, Eastland, Gorman, and DeLeon would be supplied with water from the

Burleigh conducted a survey or the project on the request of he district. He told the session that the reservoir would contain 32,000 acre feet. He estimated four years would be needed to obtain federal funds and com-


