Game Hunters Get More Game, **But More Of Them Die Doing It**

big game hunters apparently got more deer and turkeys last season than usual but at a greater toll to themselves, the Texas Game, Fish and Oyster Commis

Figures based on reports from four fifths of the state's 254 counties placed the probable deer take at slightly in excess of the total estimated kill of 36,403 for the preceding year. 


