School Days To Begin Soon For Census Enumerators In District

School days are approaching for about 150,000 adult Americans who will participate in more than 5,500 classes to be conducted throughout the country during March in preparation for the 17th Decennial Census of the United States opening on April 1.

District Supervisor Donald F. Fulver of the Abilene district of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce, stated Saturday that the school for Enumerators will be conducted March 27 through March 31 at ten locations in the local Census district. These locations will include:

Baird Court House, Callahan County.

Veteran's School, Comanche County.

Recreation Hall, Stephenville, Erath County.

Eastland Court House, Eastland County.

Blue Bonnet Hotel, Both Fisher and Nolan Counties.

Methodist Church Basement, Hamilton, Hamilton County.

County Court House, Anson, Jones County and Shackelford County.

Texas Employment Commission Office, Mineral Wells, Palo Pinto County.

Burch Hotel, Breckenridge, Stephens County.

Old Post Office Bldg., Abilene, Taylor County.

During the last week in March, about 8,300 crew leaders, under supervision of the Census district supervisors and their assistants, will conduct training classes at about 5,000 locations for the 140,000 Census enumerators.

The last week of March will mark the climax of the training program which was inaugurated in Washington at Census headquarters in December with the training of about 30 chief instructors for the schools now under way in the three cities of Washington, St. Louis and San Francisco.

Census district offices to the number of 457 have been established in the 48 states, and the Territories of Alaska, Hawaii, and Puerto Rico. In general, these district Census offices cover individual Congressional districts, although in some cases where estimated work loads made it necessary, some Congressional districts have been divided into two Census districts.

Tuberculosis Questions & Answers

The date and place have been decided upon for the mass x-ray survey, according to Mrs. Ben Kendall, president of the P-TA, and every person in Cisco over the age of 15 has been urged to visit the units at the West Texas Utilities Co. office on one of the following dates: March 30, 31, April 3 or 4.

The following questions and answers are given on the survey for the benefit of persons who may wish to become familiar with the operation of the chest x-ray program:

Q. What is the Cisco Mass X-Ray Survey?

A. It is an all-out attack on tuberculosis by asking every person 15 years of age or older to have a chest x-ray taken.

Q. What will it cost?

A. It's free. There will be no charge for the x-ray nor will anyone be asked to contribute money.

The Hardin-Simmons University male quartet will furnish the musical part of the program.

C. Q. How will the program be conducted?

A. Two x-ray machines will be used.

Q. Who is conducting the program?

A. The citizens of Cisco and Eastland County are uniting with the Texas State Department of Health and Eastland County Medical Society. The West Ward P-TA has played an important part in the survey.

Q. Why are not children under 15 years of age x-rayed?

A. Although no age group is entirely free from tuberculosis, there are relatively few children who have the disease. It is desirable, therefore, to concentrate x-ray efforts in the adult group.

A. Must I remove clothing when I have my chest x-rayed?

A. No. Only outer coats and jackets.

Q. What do I do when I go for my chest x-ray?

A. First, you give your name and address to a clerk. This information is needed to identify your x-ray and in order that your report can be mailed to you. Next you step up to the machine, and with the help of the technician, take your position. You will be told: "Take a deep breath — hold it." That is all.


