URBANA - CHAMPAIGN, Ill., March 23 — John J. Haynie, of Cisco, a student at the University of Illinois, is a member of the Sinfonietta, student - faculty musical organization of the U. of I. which played under the direction of Igor Stravinsky, noted composer, on March 21 in the University Auditorium.

First half of the concert was played by the Sinfonietta, 35-piece string orchestra, and the remainder of the program by the full symphony of 85 members. Only works by Stravinsky were included. The program was an event of the third annual festival of contemporary arts at the U. of I.

The concert was the second all-Stravinsky program to be conducted by the composer at the University. His first appearance here took place a year ago with Soulima Stravinsky, pianist, as soloist. The composer had never previously conducted a group of college musicians.

CENSUS BUREAU COMPLETES BIG MAILING JOB IN FARM SURVEY

the 1950 census of agriculture in Eastland County. A copy of the agriculture questionnaire has been delivered to every rural route boxholder together with a letter from the director of the census requesting that the farmer fill out the form and have it ready for the census taker when he calls at the farm in April. The United States Bureau of

the Census has completed a large mailing job in connection with during the 17th Decennial Census of the United States. The questionnaire to be used in the 1950 census of agriculture has been designed to be filled out quickly. The average farmer will answer less than 100 inquiries, most of which can be completed without reference to any records.

About half of the questions on the agriculture census apply to farms in all sections of the U. S. Of the inquiries regarding approximately 50 kinds of field crops, vegetables, and fruits, the average farmer will answer less than a dozen, since, generally, he will have produced only four or five different crops. For crops harvested in 1949, the farm operator will be asked to report the acreage, yield, and value of the crops sold or to be sold. Live stock inventories will be reported as of April 1, 1950, while inquiries as to production of stock and animal products refer to the 1949 calendar year.

To further simplify the questionnaire, a different version will be used for nearly every state, and the state questionnaire will list only the crops principally grown by the farmers in that state.

WORLD CAN'T AFFORD ANOTHER WAR, COL. LEE TELLS MEETING

"The world can not afford another war and the time has come when nations must settle their differences across the conference table," Col. Robert E. Lee told Rotarians at their noon luncheon Thursday at the Hotel Victor.

Col. Lee had just told his audience of the destructiveness of the Atom Bomb and the H-Bomb and described the horrors of a war with both sides or one side using the weapons.

He explained some of the principles of the Atom and the Hydrogen bombs and stated that the Atomic principle was not new and that all nations had the knowledge, since it was based on the Einstein theory. The problem was the control of the power for use as a weapon.

He talked of the possibilities of universal destruction in the use of Hydrogen power if it got out of control and explained the difficulty of harnessing the power. He stated that the Hydrogen bomb would not be possible without the Atom bomb because the Atom Bomb was the only known thing with heat and power enough to detonate the H-Bomb.

When asked his opinion on the flying disks, Col. Lee stated that the best conjecture was that it was a secret American experiment and a good one.

Col. Lee, who lives in Coleman,

is the owner of Lee Geophysical Service and one of the nation's leading scientists. He collaborates in Atomic and Hydrogen experiments with other leading scientists in the White Sands project and is on call by the War Department at all times. He appeared on the program at the invitation of Mayor G. C. Rosenthal, program chairman for the meeting.

Plans Completed For First Show In Rodeo Arena

Several score of registered livestock went on display today and approximately 200 horses are expected here early Saturday to assure record entries in all departments of the annual Eastland County Livestock Show. The event is being held today and Saturday.

The show grounds, located just east of Cisco on the Moran Highway, was crowded at noon today with early visitors and exhibitors indicating that a new record will also be set for attendance. Everything was ready for the first performance at 7:30 p. m. of the show in the new Roundup Club arena.

Judging of various classes of cattle, swine, sheep and goats was underway today and was to be completed early this afternoon. Palominos, Quarter Horse and Appaloosa divisions of the horse show will be judged beginning early Saturday, with performance and halter classes being a part of the afternoon program at the arena.

Tonight's arena show will include matched roping between Joe Fambro of Breckenridge and Horace Carter of Thurber. Other features will include jackpot calf roping, a ladies barrel race and other events.

More matched roping events, jackpot roping, children's events and other features will be held at the arena Saturday afternoon in addition to the halter and performance contests.

Some of the state's outstanding cutting horses will appear here in both tonight's and Saturday afternoon's arena programs.

Another highlight of Saturday's stock show program will be a parade at 1:30 p. m. Most of the show horses, several bands and numerous cars, trucks, and tractors will participate. Parade Marshal Mart Arnew reported that E. T. Thomas plans to enter 11 Shetland ponies, along with a cart in the parade.

Hog Mange Giving Farmers Trouble

A few people have reported that Hog Mange is giving them some trouble. A few say that the old method of using oil is not doing any good. A good insecticide to use is chlordane. One and one fourth pounds of 40 per cent wettable chlordane powder mixed in 25 gallons of water makes a good spray for mange control. This will also control lice. The entire animal must be covered with the spray especially on the underside of the body, flanks, armpits, and ears.

Two pounds of 12 per cent BHC in 25 gallons of water can also be used and gives a very good control.
