Show Your Card Or You Stand To Lose Big Money

"No one likes to lose money, and yet when a worker fails to show his employer his social security card he may lose thousands of dollars," stated Ralph T. Fisher, manager of the Abilene social security field office. "You see, the reporting by the employer of the worker's correct name and number, exactly as shown on his card, is the key to the worker's wage account in the records of the Social Security Administration," Fisher said.

The importance of this wage account is apparent when the worker realizes that the benefits he can expect when he stops work at 65 or later, or the benefits that might be paid his family in case he dies, are based on the wages to his credit in his social security account. When the account is incomplete, it may mean a difference in the amount of the benefit or it may mean that no benefits can be paid.

Many workers make it a point to check their social security account periodically, and the Social Security Administration recommends that this be done at least every four years. A special post card form is available which any worker may use to request a statement of his account. The representative from the Abilene social security office who will be in Cisco on Thursday, March 30, at 2 p. m., at the post office, will be glad to furnish these post cards to all wishing them, as well as answer any inquiries on the insurance program.

Mr. and Mrs. D'Spain are members of the local First Christian church.

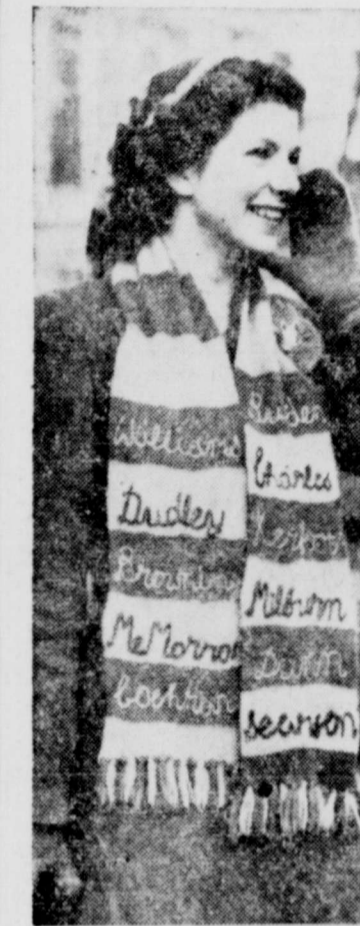

Business Needs Information Of Coming Census

Business men throughout the country are vitally interested in the information on income which will be collected during the 17th Decennial Census of the U. S. in April. These data will provide market surveyors with precise information on the relative buying power of various sections of the country. Advertising campaigns, sales quotas, bank financing of old and new enterprises and similar economic programs will depend on the income information collected in the census.

In the 1950 census the amount of income from three sources — wages or salary, own business, and sources other than earnings — will be reported for a sample of one in five persons 14 years old and over and one family in five. The reason for obtaining these data on a sample basis is that it would be too costly to attempt to get the income information from everybody in the U. S.

Information on the income of men and women living in urban and rural areas, and working at various jobs will be tabulated by the Census Bureau for the nation, for regions, for states, and for metropolitan areas. Family income tabulations will also be made along similar lines and will include also statistics for each county and each urban place.

It is expected that the income figures obtained in the census will reflect some of the momentous economic changes which have taken place in the U. S. in the past 10 years. An indication of the magnitude of some of these changes is revealed by estimates from a recent special Census Bureau survey which showed that the income of wage-earner families has more than doubled since the last census.

Schools within a radius of 200 miles of Abilene are expected to send their seniors for the day of entertainment and education.

Visitors will be conducted on tours through the various departments and schools of the University and will be given the opportunity to view exhibits prepared by the campus organizations and units. Dormitories will also be opened to visitors during the day.

THE DIVORCE RATE

About 1,200,000 persons were involved in divorces granted in the U. S. in 1948. The total includes 313,000 children of broken marriages who were under 21 years of age when their parents were divorced.

Divorce in families in which there are children is more common than is generally realized, observe the statisticians. Of the 421,000 absolute divorces granted, 42% were to couples with children. The more children there are in a family, the less likelihood of divorce, the study shows.

with one child, the rate was 11.6; with two children, 7.6; with three, 6.5; and with four or more, 4.6 per thousand — less than one third of the rate in homes of no children.

While some unsuccessful marriages may not be broken until the children have grown up, the number is less than is popularly believed, observe the statisticians. This is borne out by the small difference in the rate between the two groups at the later years of marriage.
