Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported Saturday that during the eight months the parking meters had been in use up to March 26 they had taken in a total of \$7,583.82.

Of that amount \$3,538.19 had been paid to the meter company on the purchase price of the meters and \$4,045.63 had been placed in the general fund of the city to be used in street repair, insecticide purchases and other needed incidentals.

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
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


