CANCER RESEARCH DIRECTOR IS
AUTHOR OF MAGAZINE ARTICLE

HOUSTON, April 13.—Today's
tools, if properly applied, can
bring about a momentous im-
provement in the diagnosis and
treatment of cancer.

That is the opinion of Dr. Lee
Clark, Jr., director and surgeon-
in-chief of the University of Texas
M. D. Anderson Hospital for Can-
cer Research. He is the son of
Mrs. Randolph Lee Clark of Cis-
co.

Writing in Postgraduate Medi-
cine, a professional publication,
Dr. Clark declares the promise
for the future development of
adequate tools for early diagno-
sis and treatment is excellent,
but even more important is the
constant evaluation of methods in
common use which have promise
of great improvement.

"As intriguing as it is to specu-
late upon the possibilities to be
offered by research and clinical
investigation, we have a respon-

Hearing On Texas
Water Control Is
Extended One Way

"Water and its conservation
and control has become so im-
portant to the people of Texas
that the legislative committee,
known as the Texas Water Code
Committee, has been compelled
to extend its next regional meet-
ing in Houston over a two day
period," Senator Rogers Kelly,
committee chairman, announced
in Austin today.

"Public demand for the hear-
ings in East Texas caused the
committee to change its plan for
a one day meeting and instead
hold a two day meeting in Hous-
ton," Senator Kelly said.

The hearings will be held in
the Rice Hotel on April 24 and
25, and all interested persons and
organizations will be given an
opportunity to express them-
selves fully.

"Our committee has held hear-
ings in South Texas, in far West
Texas, and in Northwest Texas.
We will conclude our regional
hearings with the Houston ses-
sion," the senator added.

Many controversial issues have
been uncovered through these
regional parleys, according to
Senator Kelley. The riparian
owners have a somewhat differ-
ent point of view from the ap-
propriators. The farmers of the
High Plains oppose control of
underground waters by any
state agency. The municipalities
of West Texas want to preserve
the priority rights of appropri-
ation of water by cities and
towns. The irrigators think their
rights of appropriation should be
paramount to industrial users.

The "first in time, first in
right" doctrine of water approp-
riation has come in for consid-
erable criticism.

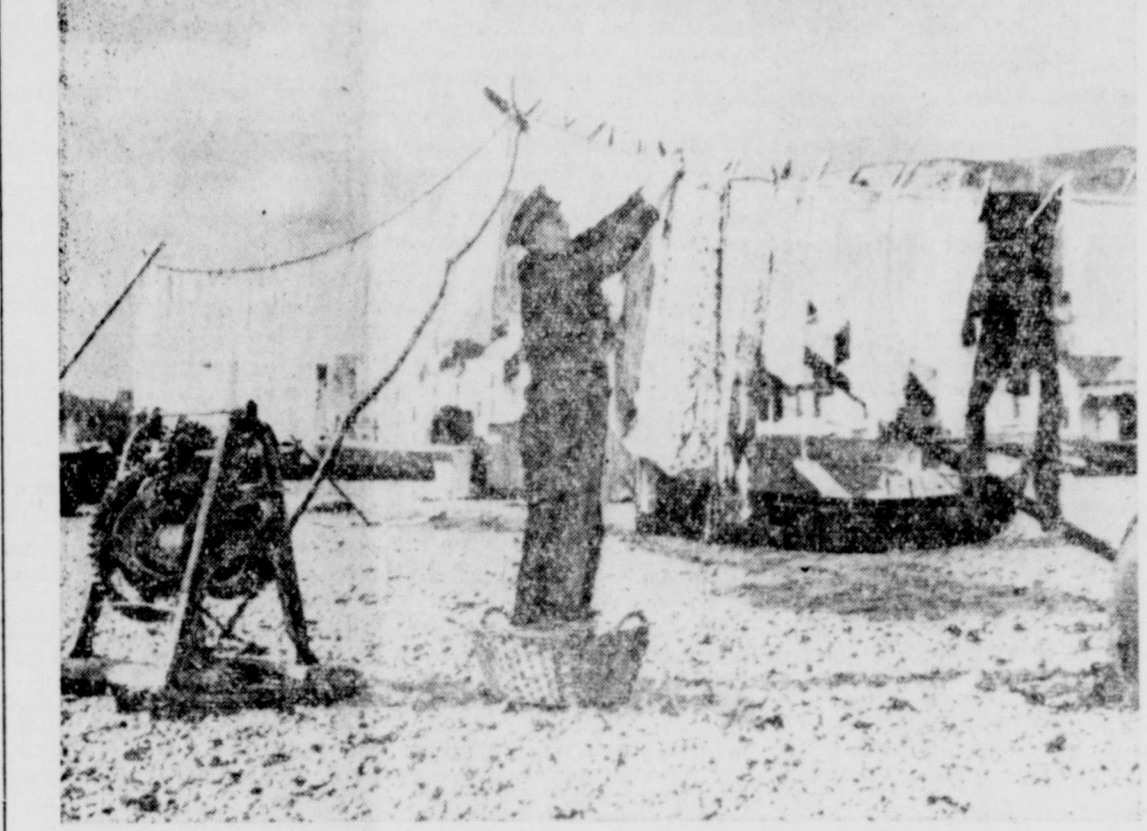

Dr. Cox Gives
Texas Newspapers
'Pat On The Back'

AUSTIN, April 13.—A highly
placed state official has given
Texas newspapers a pat on the
back.

State Health Officer George
W. Cox, veteran of more than 13
years as head of the State De-
partment of Health, called the
Texas press a "more potent force
in mass public education" and
said that his department invari-
ably turns in that direction as
the first means of reaching the
people with information on
health subjects.

"Texas newspapers and report-
ers have consistently shown an
awareness of public health prob-
lems and have given unstinting-
ly of much valuable space to
stories relating to public health,"
Cox said.

"I can define public health in
three words — mass public edu-
cation," the health officer said.
"Without newspaper cooperation
such education is literally an un-
obtainable ideal."

Pointing out the custom of
rural people to read their local
weekly or semi-weekly paper
thoroughly, Cox said he was
especially happy that these pa-
pers used state and local health
department releases.

"It is one of the most valuable
services a paper can render its
readership, but then maybe I'm
a bit prejudiced," he observed.

Radio is an especially valuable
outlet for information relating
to venereal diseases, Cox in-
dicated, because of the availabil-
ity of professionally prepared re-
cordings on the subject. More
than 100 Texas stations have
used the recordings during the
past year.

On the same theme, Dr. Cox
said well over 600,000 persons
have seen the Department pro-
duced motion picture short sub-
ject "What's The Disease?" in
which syphilis information is
presented.

Of an estimated 53.2 million
