In the Coastal Bend where cotton is up to a stand, some fields were

infested with thrips. In some upper coastal and a few northeast Texas counties, soil moisture was still sufficient for planting and germination of crops. Droughty conditions have con-

tinued to spread eastward and now cover the entire state with growth of green feed checked in all areas. Green feed was still adequate over most of the eastern half of the state, but dry feed was getting short and unpalatable on many western and extreme southern ranges. Supplemental feeding of cows and ewes was increasing where dry feed was short. Livestock were in generally good condition, but ome were beginning to shrink. The rains of yesterday and to-
