In the beginning, the Federal government established the national census for the purpose of determining, on the basis of their relative populations, the number of representatives in Congress to which each of the United States was entitled. Even the first Census in 1790 went beyond the more counting of the number of inhab-

Information was also obtained on the number of white males 16 years old and over to measure the Nation's manpower for militia and industry. Information on the number of white boys under 16 years old, the number of white females, the number of other free persons, and the number of slaves also was taken. Subsequently the Census was expanded to obtain pertinent statistical information about the human and economic resources in greater and greater detail. Thus the modern Census program includes

Censuses of population, housng, and agriculture (including rrigation and drainage projects) every 10 years in the years ending in "O", with a mid-decennial agricultural census also in the years ending in "5."

Censuses of Business, Manufactures, and Mineral Industries every five years in the years ending in "4" and "9."

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
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
