TEXAS IS TAKING LEADING PART IN NATION'S FIGHT ON CANCER

HOUSTON, April 21 — The American Cancer Society, Texas Division, today reminded Texans that the state is taking a leading part in the nationwide fight to conquer cancer.

Texas has 25 cancer diagnostic and treatment clinics. There are 13 cancer hospitals in the United States, one of them a part of the University of Texas — M. D. Anderson Hospital for Cancer Research in Houston.

Texas has 10 full time cancer information centers, operated by county units of the American Cancer Society. These are located at El Paso, Amarillo, San Angelo, Fort Worth, Dallas, Texarkana, Austin, San Antonio, Houston, and Galveston.

Through contributions to the annual Texas Cancer Crusade, the state supplies more than \$100,000 a year to the national cancer research program. Several Texas scientists are participating in this program.

Through the combined funds of the American Cancer Society and the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs, a young Texas Negro completed a health education scholarship and is now teaching cancer facts to members of his race in the state.

Officials Have Many Uses For Census Figures

Officials of the nation's 3,000 counties and its thousands of cities and towns have more than a casual interest in the forthcoming 17th Decennial Census of the United States in April. While they usually are more than ordinarily aware of local conditions, the county and municipal officials need definite statistical information of the kind developed from a complete Census to confirm their estimates and to provide a base against which to measure programs to meet indicated future requirements.

In the beginning, the Federal government established the national census for the purpose of determining, on the basis of their relative populations, the number of representatives in Congress to which each of the United States was entitled. Even the first Census in 1790 went beyond the mere counting of the number of inhabitants.

Information was also obtained on the number of white males 16 years old and over to measure the Nation's manpower for militia and industry. Information on the number of white boys under 16 years old, the number of white females, the number of other free persons, and the number of slaves also was taken. Subsequently the Census was expanded to obtain pertinent statistical information about the human and economic resources in greater and greater detail. Thus the modern Census program includes:

Censuses of population, housing, and agriculture (including irrigation and drainage projects) every 10 years in the years ending in "0", with a mid-decennial agricultural census also in the years ending in "5".

Hickok Completes Well; Bankline To Determine Future

The E. C. Johnston company was moving in equipment today to drill on well an to begin operations on another to feature oil development activities in the Cisco area.

Cable tools were being moved in for completion work on Johnstons No. 1 Daniels, located a mile and a half east of Cisco. The Daniels was drilling to 3,357 feet to the Lake Sand and pipe was cemented at that depth.

The plug was expected to be drilled Monday. The hole went some eight feet into the Lake before cementing.

Rotary equipment was being moved in to begin drilling the No. 1 C. C. Mahan-Edwards, with location 30 feet from the hole that was plugged recently after trouble developed during completion work. Drilling was to begin as soon as equipment is rigged.

Elsewhere in the area, Hickok Producing Company announced completion of their No. 3 - A Wright and Harrell, north outpost to production, five miles northeast of Cisco. The production was from the Lake Sand at 3,464 - 3,508 feet.

Pumping equipment has been installed and the well made 47 barrels in a 24-hour potential test. Location is in Section 74, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Five miles east of Cisco, Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 Mrs. Briggs Owens was shut in awaiting the arrival of company officials for a decision as to completion. The well was described as a small Duffer producer. Some oil men believe that it would be a better well in the Lake Sand where a drill stem test had indicated good possibilities. A decision was expected this week-end.

Lone Star Producing Company's No. 1 J. W. Denison, five miles southwest of Cisco, will be equipped with a pump next week to determine its potential. Concrete was poured this week preparatory to installing pumping equipment. The well had flowed small amounts of oil in heads during tests. It is bottomed in the Caddo lime.

'ARTIFICIAL' HEIFERS TO HAVE SPECIAL CLASS AT DAIRY SHOW

Heifer calves from artificial bred cows will have a special class at the annual Eastland County Dairy Show at Fireman's Field in Eastland April 28. A. Z. Myrick, Cisco, said in announcing plans for the show.

Myrick is president of the dairy association that sponsors the annual show.

No bulls will be shown. There will be five classes of females: Holsteins, Jerseys, and Guernseys will have separate classes, Myrick said.

R. E. Burleson, dairy specialist of the Texas A&M College Extension Service, will place the animals on a classification basis, wherein each animal competes against the ideal dairy type instead of against each other.

M. D. Fox, Eastland vocational agriculture teacher, will have charge of the boys and adults judging contest. The first ten winners in each contest will receive cash awards.

Travis Wheat, Eastland, farm representative of the Texas Electric Service Company, is chairman of the shows.

COLLEGE STATION, April 21 —Muster Day, April 21, will be observed throughout the world by former students of Texas A & M College and on the campus by students and staff.

The 47th observance of the day will find thousands on the Aggie campus. Practically every town and city in Texas will hold muster day ceremonies.

The April 21 Muster began at the college in 1903 when the student body voted to observe in some solemn and official way the courage and spirit of the troops under General Sam Houston who defeated a larger force of Mexicans under Santa Anna at San Jacinto, 114 years ago. The students agreed that tribute would be paid to fellow A&M men who die during the year preceding the Muster and the traditional "roll call of the absent" is one of the stirring moments of the program.

This year, 40 states will have one or more musters. There will be programs in 14 foreign countries.

NEW TEXAS MASONIC GRAND LODGE



This magnificent building at Waco is Texas' new Masonic Memorial Grand Lodge Temple. The imposing \$2,000,000 structure has been erected on the most beautiful Masonic Grand Lodge in the United States. Covering almost a city block, it houses a 3,700-seat auditorium, library and a museum, and serves as headquarters for the governing bodies of Texas' 192,000 Masons in 902 lodges. Elaborate dedicatory ceremonies were among the most impressive in the history of the masonry. 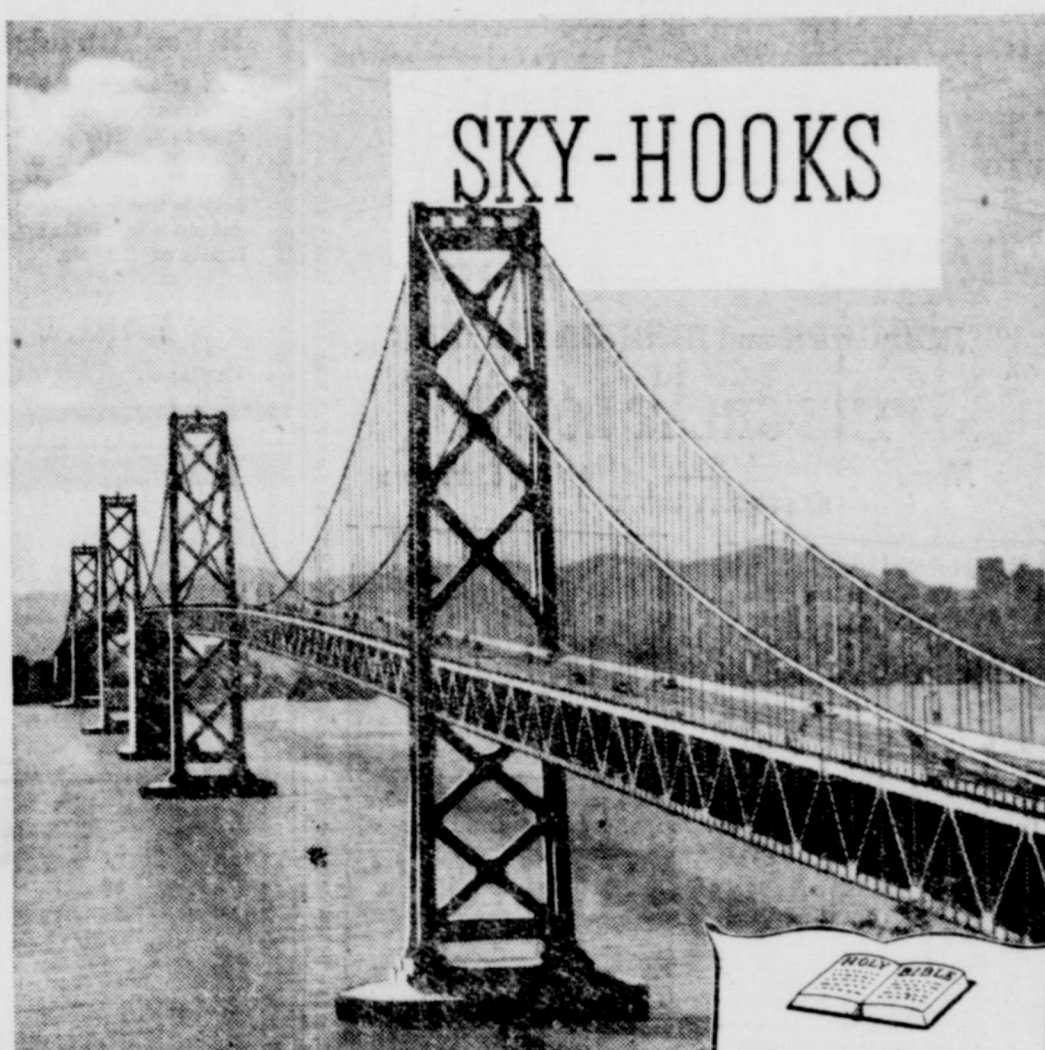
