HERE'S AN OPPORTUNITY

(An Editorial)

There exists in Cisco a business opportunity which The Press coniders attractive enough to warrant the closest investigation a safe investment of anybody's funds. It is attractive from the standpoints of potential returns on dollar investment and for its worth to

We refer to the Teague Brick and Tile Company plant which recently closed down operations here. We believe its reopening by local persons and capital would be a good investment for the money needed to do the job. Certainly, any plant that would utilize local labor, clay and gas would be good for the community.

The plant closed recently because the owners found the task of operating two brick plants, located some 300 miles apart, almost impossible. The problem of insufficient capital at the beginning would have worked itself out with good luck in operations. But lady luck was to be reckoned with. A storm wrecked buildings . . . lightning struck three times. Various unforeseen troubles came up - all contributing to the decision for the company to concentrate operations

Cisco civic leaders have been offered the opportunity of trying to interest local investors. Based on experience, operators of the plant have provided figures that apparently indicate that the plant would be a good investment. They estimate that sales could amount to some \$8,448 per month after deductions for sales commissions Against this income, they figure all overhead expenses at \$4,744 -

with a net expected profit of \$3,748 per month. Buildings, kilns and equipment at the plant can possibly be purchased at one-tenth their cost. According to the records, over \$100,000 has been spent on this plant. Local officials recently received from an independent source an estimate on building a brick plant. This source estimated the cost at \$232,990

The industrial committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce is currently studying the proposition. They are convinced that Cisco brick are good brick. To support this, they have letters from a least three men - two of them architects - who speak in glowing terms concerning Cisco brick. Both of the architects recently selected lisco brick for use in building their own homes

The committee has convincing evidence that there is and will coninue to be a ready market for Cisco brick and tile. The local plant's entire production was marketed at premium prices, and it was runing some 60 days behind sales schedules when it closed.

Another encouraging factor, which might be considered, is a re ent report by the University of Texas in which Cisco clay was an alyzed and found to be entirely satisfactory for brick, tile, floor tile, and other clay products. And the clay supply is bountiful. Moreover, the kilns are equipped for firing with natural gas - the cheapest method found for brick burning. And few sections of the country as more natural gas available than the Cisco area

Anyone who wanted to take over the plant would have to furnish the management. Men to handle the various jobs of making brick and tile are readily available. Most of them are already in Cisco ready and eager to return to jobs they have held.

Taking over this plant would not be anything like starting from the beginning. Most of the equipment is ready or can be reassembled easily. The "bugs" have been worked out of the mixing, drying and burning processes. In fact, the plant could be placed into production on short notice.
