HERE'S AN OPPORTUNITY

(An Editorial)

There exists in Cisco a business opportunity which The Press considers attractive enough to warrant the closest investigation as a safe investment of anybody's funds.

We refer to the Teague Brick and Tile Company plant which recently closed down operations here. We believe its reopening by local persons and capital would be a good investment for the money needed to do the job.

The plant closed recently because the owners found the task of operating two brick plants, located some 300 miles apart, almost impossible. The problem of insufficient capital at the beginning would have worked itself out with good luck in operations.

Cisco civic leaders have been offered the opportunity of trying to interest local investors. Based on experience, operators of the plant have provided figures that apparently indicate that the plant would be a good investment.

The industrial committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce is currently studying the proposition. They are convinced that Cisco brick is good brick. To support this, they have letters from at least three men — two of them architects — who speak in glowing terms concerning Cisco brick.

Another encouraging factor, which might be considered, is a recent report by the University of Texas in which Cisco clay was analyzed and found to be entirely satisfactory for brick, tile, floor tile, and other clay products.

Anyone who wanted to take over the plant would have to furnish the management. Men to handle the various jobs of making brick and tile are readily available. Most of them are already in Cisco — ready and eager to return to jobs they have held.

If you are interested or if you know of anyone who might be interested, you can serve your community well by getting in touch with the Chamber of Commerce. All details concerning the plant are available to interested parties.

MORE THAN 1,000,000 'ROUGH' FISH TAKEN OUT OF LAKE CISCO

More than 1,000,000 fish—90% of them classed as "rough" fish—had been removed from Lake Cisco Saturday in a city-sponsored program to "bring back the good old fishing days."

Lake Custodian Ray Judia, who was directing the project, said the water in the upper forks was treated with rotenone Thursday and Friday and the dead fish were picked up in boats as they surfaced. Every effort was made to salvage bass, crappie and catfish by rushing them to fresh water.

Judia said at least 90% of the fish taken out were carp and shad. The largest carp taken out weighed 34 pounds. Hundreds of the carp weighed between 10 and 15 pounds, Judia said.

Only three large catfish were removed. They weighed about 35 pounds each.

FIVE PERSONS DIE IN STORM; DAMAGE TO PROPERTY HIGH

The Cisco area received three-tenths of an inch of rain with occasional light hail Friday night when a storm swept through Callahan County, west of here, to take five lives and injure several persons in Clyde and Baird.

Dead at Clyde were Mr. and Mrs. Bert Tabor and their daughter, Annie Mae. Mr. Tabor was the brother of M. M. Tabor of Cisco. Also killed in the storm were Steve Walker, 63, and his wife, 67, at their home three miles northwest of Baird.

The tornado, second in 13 years to strike the Clyde area, left considerable property damage in its wake. Four persons were injured at Clyde.

Rainfall north and west of Cisco was considerably heavier. A heavy rain was reported at Moran. Only a trace of rain was registered south of Cisco.

At Clyde, real estate men estimated that the property damage would be more than \$50,000. Insured losses were expected to run over \$20,000. Another \$50,000 loss was expected to result from heavy hail in the Eula-Clyde area.

Red Cross workers were due to arrive at Clyde from St. Louis Saturday afternoon to help prevent suffering from the storm. A Salvation Army mobile unit from Wichita Falls opened at Clyde and at Baird Saturday to serve rescue workers.

Witnesses said the storm struck about dark and the twister seemed to follow Highway 80 from Clyde to Baird.

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BLIND IN HIGH PLACES

The real meaning and message of the Hiss-Chambers case is its revelation of a "concealed enemy" in our midst, declare Ralph De Toledano and Victor Lasky in The Reader's Digest for May. That enemy is the presence in high places of men such as Hiss, who, respected by the American people and their own associates in government, secretly work for the Soviet Union.

DeToledano and Lasky covered the trials for Newsweek and the New York World-Telegram respectively. In the Digest's condensation of their recently published book, "Seeds of Treason," they tell a detailed story of the subversive activities of Alger Hiss and Whitaker Chambers from their first meeting in 1934 to the ultimate conviction of Hiss. The authors conclude that the testimony of the two trials uncovered only one tiny corner of the vast Soviet underworld. Hiss was one man, caught in a tragedy of arrogance and self-deception.

But there are those—and their name is legion—who in their innocent blindness have abetted him and his ilk in sowing the seeds of treason in the good American earth. The "strange reaction" of those who continued to support Hiss, even after his conviction, might be a subject for serious study by Dr. Carl Binger, the authors observe dryly. Binger is the psychiatrist who sought to prove Chambers mentally irresponsible. "Even as the last stories of the conviction and sentencing were appearing in the newspapers, a shouting began as Hiss' supporters retired to prepared positions," already planning an appeal to the higher courts. "Here was the chorus of the innocents; here the billowing skirts of know-nothing sentiment behind which the cynical and the perfidious can hide." This national innocence, this refusal to see the depth and extent of Communist spying which can thrive even in high government posts because it is not suspected, is the tragic lesson of the

Hiss-Chambers case, DeToledano and Lasky believe. In the face of this collective blindness, apparent even after Hiss had been brought to book, "the fates of Chambers and Hiss pale into insignificance. The real work ahead has barely begun."

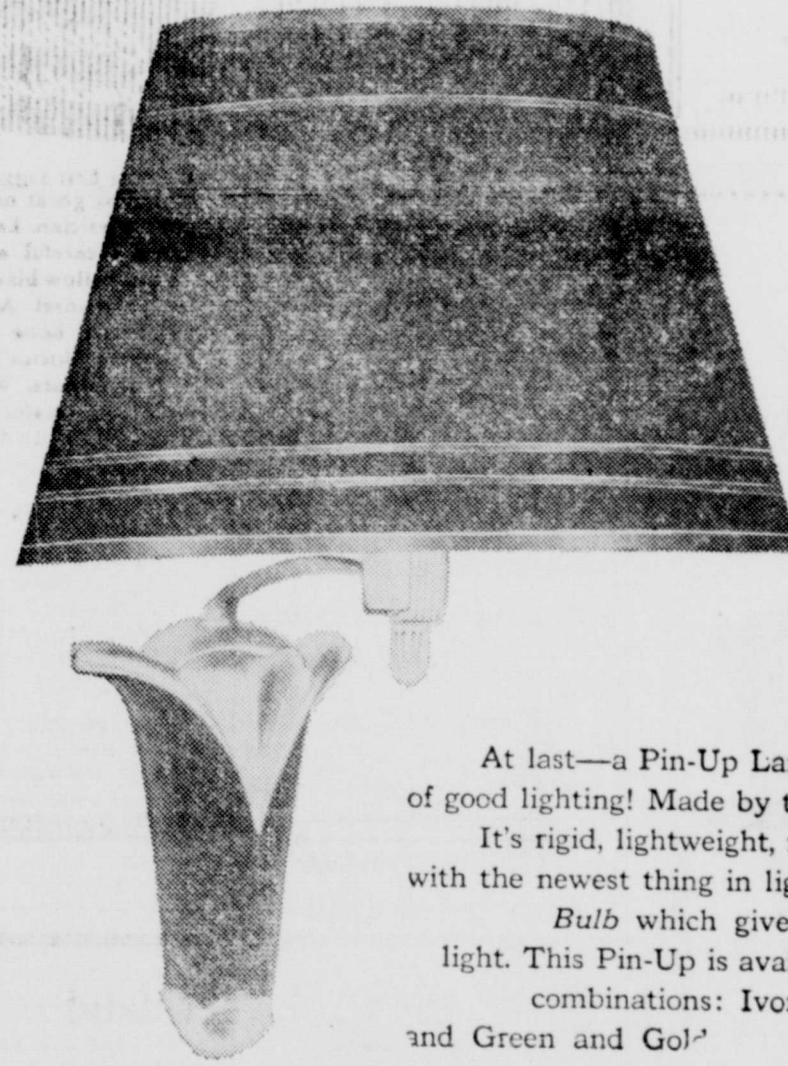

Peanut Planting Legislation Will Allow Oil Stocks

Recent legislation concerning the 1950 peanut acreage for all cooperatives has been condensed and released and the new farm bill provides the following conditions:

1. Allows the grower the privilege of planting peanuts in excess of his allotment for crushing into oil and meal.
2. For the purpose of price support you will be considered a co-

operator, if you did not exceed your 1947 picked and thrashed acreage; and you will be entitled to support prices on your allotted acreage. A penalty will not be required on excess peanuts produced by a cooperator which are delivered to, or marketed through, an agency or agencies designated by the Secretary of Agriculture.

3. If the Secretary of Agriculture determines that the supply of any type of peanuts are insufficient, excess peanuts may be sold by such designated agencies or used for purposes other than crushing; and any profits derived there from will be distributed

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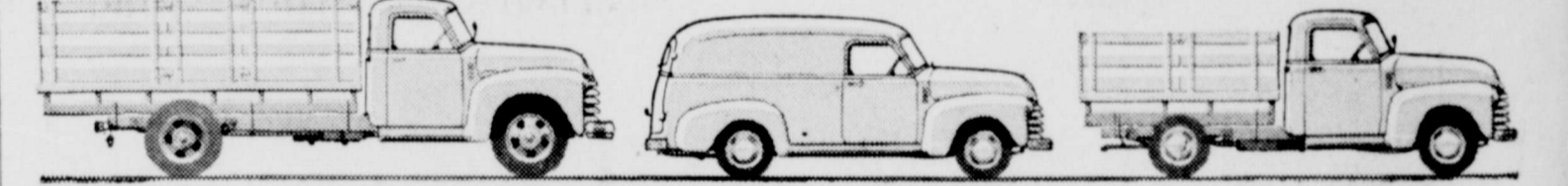
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
