Mosquito Spray Work Will Begin In Near Future

The City of Cisco will inaugurate its mosquito spraying program for the summer season in the immediate future, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today. All sections of the city will be sprayed regularly in a campaign against mosquitoes and other insects.

Mr. Rosenthal said that this year's program called for a new spraying compound that is expected to be more effective than that used in the past. He added that it was "a little more expensive, and if anybody wants to help us pay the bill their contributions will be welcome."

Methods Given To Avoid Danger From Lightning

How fishermen may reduce the lightning hazard when caught in electrical storms was described to the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission Saturday.

The observation was made after reports of several injuries and at least one Texas fatality during the current peak of the angling season.

Professor B. N. Gafford, chairman of the Electrical Engineering Department of the U. of Texas, urged fishermen to allow adequate time to reach substantial shore cover ahead of storms. If they fail, he suggested that they try the following:

- 1. Place a metal fishing pole vertically, fixing it to the side of the boat so that the handle end sticks into the water and the tip projects into the air above the heads of the occupants.
2. Lie down in the boat whether or not a makeshift lightning rod is affixed, so that the body is below the edges of the craft.

Professor Gafford explained that lightning is caused by electrical potential in the clouds being discharged into the earth or the closest object between the cloud and the earth. Therefore, fishermen on a river where the banks extend above the water might have comparative safety from the bolt. But anglers on a large body of water, where shore lines are distant, would be endangered.

The University authority said that persons on the land, caught outside in storms, might be safest by lying down in a low spot. If in a wooded area, they might well seek the largest open space between trees.

Professor Gafford ridiculed the old-fashioned theories about protection from lightning, such as keeping the rooms dark. He added laughingly, "When there's a storm, my good wife usually runs around the house snapping off the lights; and I follow closely in her footsteps turning them back on."

Gym Plans Will Be Ready Soon

President G. R. Nance of the board of trustees of the Cisco Independent School District reported today that architects expect to be ready to advertise for bids on a new gymnasium here in the near future.

The architects planned to run foundation requirement tests at the gym site this week to complete specifications.

The trustees are working on a program to erect a new gym to replace one destroyed by fire several weeks ago.

Growth of Warm Springs Service Given In Report

AUSTIN, May 23 — Rapid growth of the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation for Crippled Children and an increasing need for its services were cited here following a meeting of the foundation's development committee.

The meeting was called by Hulon W. Black, chairman, who is director of the University of Texas development board, and was held at his offices at the U. Other members of the foundation development committee are Max Starcke, general manager of the Lower Colorado River Authority at Austin; Lloyd Gregory, executive vice president of the Houston Post; Charles E. Simons, general manager of the Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Ass'n, and Walt Beckner, San Marcos newspaper publisher.

The development and longrange planning committee was asked by the foundation's governing board to make an extensive study of the possibilities of establishing the first reconstructive hospital built upon physical medicine and rehabilitation in Texas, Black announced. The committee also was asked to secure the services of competent hospital consultants to make a complete study of the organizational features of the foundation, to recommend any changes or additions to carry on the treatment program at the hospital.

It was pointed out to the development committee that Texas has adequate facilities for orthopedic surgery in all of its major centers, and that the treatment center at Gonzales in its present composition would provide the basis for an expanding treatment center in physical medicine that could be outstanding, not only in Texas, but in the U. S. At present the foundation is devoting its facilities to physical medicine and rehabilitation, with a doctor of physical medicine in charge. Concentrated at Gonzales now are 10 physical therapists, three occupational therapists, plus nursing services, equipment and physical plant. More than 400 in- and out-patients were treated there during the past year.

Warning Sounded As 'Poppy Day' Sale Date Nears

With the approach of VFW Buddy Poppy Day scheduled to be held in Cisco May 27, Commander Richard Donovan, VFW Post 3359, today issued a reminder to Cisco citizens to be on the alert for peddlers of "fake" poppies.

"Taking advantage of the nationwide publicity given the annual VFW Buddy Poppy sale," Donovan declared, "unscrupulous persons often foist upon the poppies, and then pocket the proceeds."

"The phrase, 'VFW Buddy Poppy,' is a trademark, registered in the U. S. Patent Office, and can be sold only by authorized sales people who donate the services free of charge to aid the vast veterans welfare program of the VFW."

"Any person," Donovan pointed out, "who attempts in any way to make use of the word 'Buddy' in connection with the sale of or the distribution of artificial flowers, is wilfully and deliberately violating the laws of the U. S. the rights and privileges already extended to the Veterans of Foreign Wars of the United States."

"All legitimate sellers of Buddy Poppies have cards, arm bands or caps to identify them as sales persons for the poppies made by disabled veterans, and distributed by the VFW. If anyone is in doubt when buying a Buddy Poppy on May 27, he should ask the seller to show his credentials."

The U. S. Patent Office has granted the VFW a patent on the term 'Buddy Poppy' because it was clearly demonstrated that all funds derived from the sale are used exclusively in aiding disabled and needy veterans and their dependants, or to bring timely assistance to the dependent survivors of veterans.

"The genuine Buddy Poppy," Donovan concluded, may be easily identified by a green paper tag attached to the stem, which bears the inscription, 'Made by disabled and needy veterans for the Veterans of Foreign Wars.'"

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PROGRESS IN RESEARCH -

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis reports that its extensive research program has yielded "promising leads which indicate that drugs, serums and vaccines against polio are all within the realm of possibility."

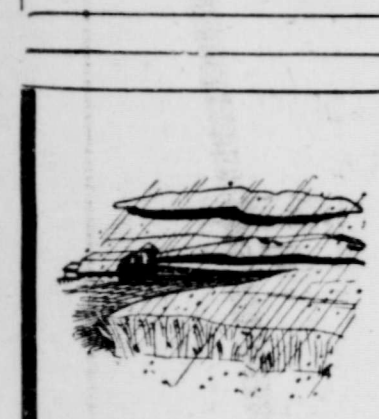
The information is contained in the organization's 12th Annual Report, which declares, "The problem now is to determine which of these will serve as a practical means of control."

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Although the report warns that "obstacles that lie ahead (in research) cannot be minimized," it gave this optimistic conclusion: "We have reached solid ground. We are traveling in the right direction and as rapidly as man's ingenuity will permit."

While gains were being made on the research front, the program of patient care in 1949 was barely able to meet financial demands, it was revealed. "Before the year was out," the report disclosed, "of the National Foundation's 2,822 Chapters, 1,089 had gone broke meeting the demands of the epidemic. Scattered over 45 states and one territory, they had received epidemic aid (from the national office) amounting to \$10,648,609 in this one year. An additional \$677,778 was spent by the national office in direct aid not specifically chargeable to individual chapters."

"And this was just emergency help - a total of \$11,326,387 added to \$16,000,000 spent directly from local chapter funds to care for patients in this one year."

The Polio Emergency Drive last September raised \$3,768,357, and the National Foundation balance at national headquarters at the end of 1949 was \$1,318,877, the report showed. Local treasuries of the National Foundation - based on reports from 85.6 per cent of the local chapters (2,415 of 2,822) received at national headquarters when the Annual Report went to press - showed a net chapter cash balance on December 31, 1949 of \$2,345,826. This was an average of about \$971 per chapter reporting, or hardly enough to pay costs of care for one average paralyzed polio patient.

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more than the headquarters' net share of the 1949 March of Dimes. Half of the funds raised each year remain with the local chapter for patient care, the other 50 per cent going to national headquarters for research, education and emergency epidemic aid.

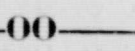
