Oil men were optimistic Saturday that Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 S. B. Mize, second Lake test in the area five miles east of Cisco, would be completed as a flowing oil well.

The hole was opened Friday afternoon after the Lake sand had been given the hydraulic treatment and oil began flowing with good pressure almost immediately. After flowing steadily for 3 hours into pits, mud began appearing with the oil.

The well was shut and the tubing was to be pulled Saturday to clean out the mud before running a potential test. No estimate was given on the hourly flow.

The Mize well offsets Bankline's discovery well, the No. 1 Mrs. Briggs Owens, which was completed as a flowing well of some 50 barrels per hour capacity.

Another offset, the No. 2 Mrs. Owens, set surface pipe Saturday and made preparations to drill ahead. Choate Drilling Company of Cisco has the drilling contract.

Some 15 miles northwest of Cisco, a well was being completed Saturday in the Caddo lime and was described as by far the best Caddo well ever drilled in Callahan County. It is the McElroy-Herring No. 1 Booth, located in the northwest one fourth of Section 3193, TE&L Survey.

The Booth well is a mile north of McElroy-Herring's No. 1 McCollum, near Pueblo, completed last week in the Strawn sand as a flowing well.

No figures were available for the Booth well, but reports said that it flowed naturally for several hours after being treated with acid. It was shut in to await installation of equipment.

Country Club Makes Final Plans For Golf Tournament

Any non-member who pays the tournament entry fee and qualifies will be entitled to play all week without payment of greens fees.

Qualifying for the championship and first flights will be held on Friday. The Calcutta pool and barbecue, an annual feature, will be held Friday night after all qualifying scores are posted. The pairings for play will be arranged in time for the tournament proper to begin early Saturday.

Secretary W. C. McDaniel said that tickets were ready for the barbecue and Calcutta pool. Tickets were mailed to clubs in the neighboring cities. More than 100 golfers are expected to take part in the tourney.

It was announced that out-of-town golfers can play qualifying rounds on their home courses for all flights except the championship and first, which must be played here. It was decided that starting times for all matches will be posted and that any player who is more than 15 minutes late must forfeit his match.

Prizes, which will include some \$500 worth of golf equipment, have been received and are on display at the club.

Fifty Men Now On Payroll As Firm Begins Operations

A new business for Cisco, which gives promise of adding a great deal to the community in payroll advantages, was formed here recently when I. J. (Sach) Henson resigned his position as connection foreman with Humble Pipe Line Company after 28 years service to begin the Henson Construction Company.

The new company, which was begun on June 1, has grown rapidly until Saturday there were 50 men on the payroll with a daily payroll of some \$900. Mr. Henson is operating five trucks, a dozer, a ditching machine, three pickup trucks and five welding machines from temporary headquarters at 1110 Avenue D. At the present time, he is working on five separate contracts for the Humble company and has sufficient work ahead to assure the future of his contracting business.

Henson came to Cisco in 1922 and went to work with Humble in a gang and played on the Humble baseball team, one of the strongest semi-pro teams in Texas at that time. He has been with the company from that time, with the exception of three years when he played professional baseball as a pitcher with Waco in the Texas League. His rise to the connection foreman's job was steady.

He was married to Bobbie LaRue in Cisco in 1924. Mr. and Mrs. Henson have two daughters and two grand daughters. One daughter, Mrs. Gloria Benton, lives in Denton with her husband and two daughters. A younger daughter, Bozze, lives with her parents here. The family plans to move from Humbletown into Cisco as soon as they can purchase a home.

Mr. Henson announced as his future plans the establishment of permanent offices in the A-G Motor Company building and the employment of several key employees on a permanent basis. Also included in future planning is the establishment of headquarters, shops and storage warehouses on a four acre tract owned by him near Humbletown. It plans continue to develop as they have so far, Henson sees the regular employment of from 150 to 200 men.

He stated that his work was not confined to the Humble company and that he was open for pipe line construction work with all companies and in any locality.

Mr. Hanson expressed his appreciation to the Humble company "for its kindness, both while an employee and during the short time in business." He said that the company was one of the finest in the world to work for, both as to pay and employee advantages, and that only an opportunity such as this would cause him to leave the Humble. He also thanked his friends for their assistance and well wishes.

NEW JOB HUNTERS

Four out of every five job-hungry June College graduates will be employed by October 1, though many will have to hunt harder and longer, than did the class of '49. This is an average of the estimates of placement officials reporting in a survey of 123 colleges and universities made by an insurance company.

Actually 1950 will be a good year for the job-seeking college graduate — not as good as 1949, but much better than was considered normal in pre-war years, the report says, analyzing final returns in the survey. In spite of another record "crop" of seniors, 61 schools, or nearly half of those covered in the survey, estimate that from 90 to 100 per cent of their available June graduates will be employed by October 1; another 34, or more than one-fourth, expect from present indications that 70 per cent of their graduates will have jobs by autumn.

Placement officials report as many or more large concerns represented on college campuses this spring, but taking on fewer new members per firm; a sharp increase, however, has been noted at many schools in the number of smaller concerns seeking college graduates this year.

Four out of every five schools in the survey — 82 — report

that starting salaries are as high this year as in 1949 — a few find the average slightly higher. Most of the 26 schools which show lower average salaries this year than last state that the drop is very slight; that the large employers are generally maintaining the same salary levels as in '49, but that some of the smaller companies are paying a little less.

Initial salaries for business school and liberal arts seniors generally range from \$175 to \$275 a month; for engineering and other sciences, \$225 to \$350. A few outstanding seniors get higher offers, of course, ranging up to \$400 a month for outstanding advanced-degree men, the survey finds.

While a few schools and individuals reached their peak of senior enrollments in 1949, most campuses have considerably longer cap-and-gown parades this year, with more graduates seeking jobs. At the same time

almost half of the schools covered, or 53, report employment demand as less than a year ago, although many find it down only slightly. Another group of about a fifth, or 25 schools, find their number of employment calls a little greater than in '49, while over a third — 43 — find demand approximately the same as a year ago. The overall result is sharper competition for jobs than last year, the survey report says.

Out of 112 schools which reported midyear or spring quarter graduating classes, just over half — 57 schools — reported 90 to 100 per cent of their earlier 1950 class of job-seekers to be now employed; another 32, or over a fourth, report from 75 to 90 per cent have located employment by now.

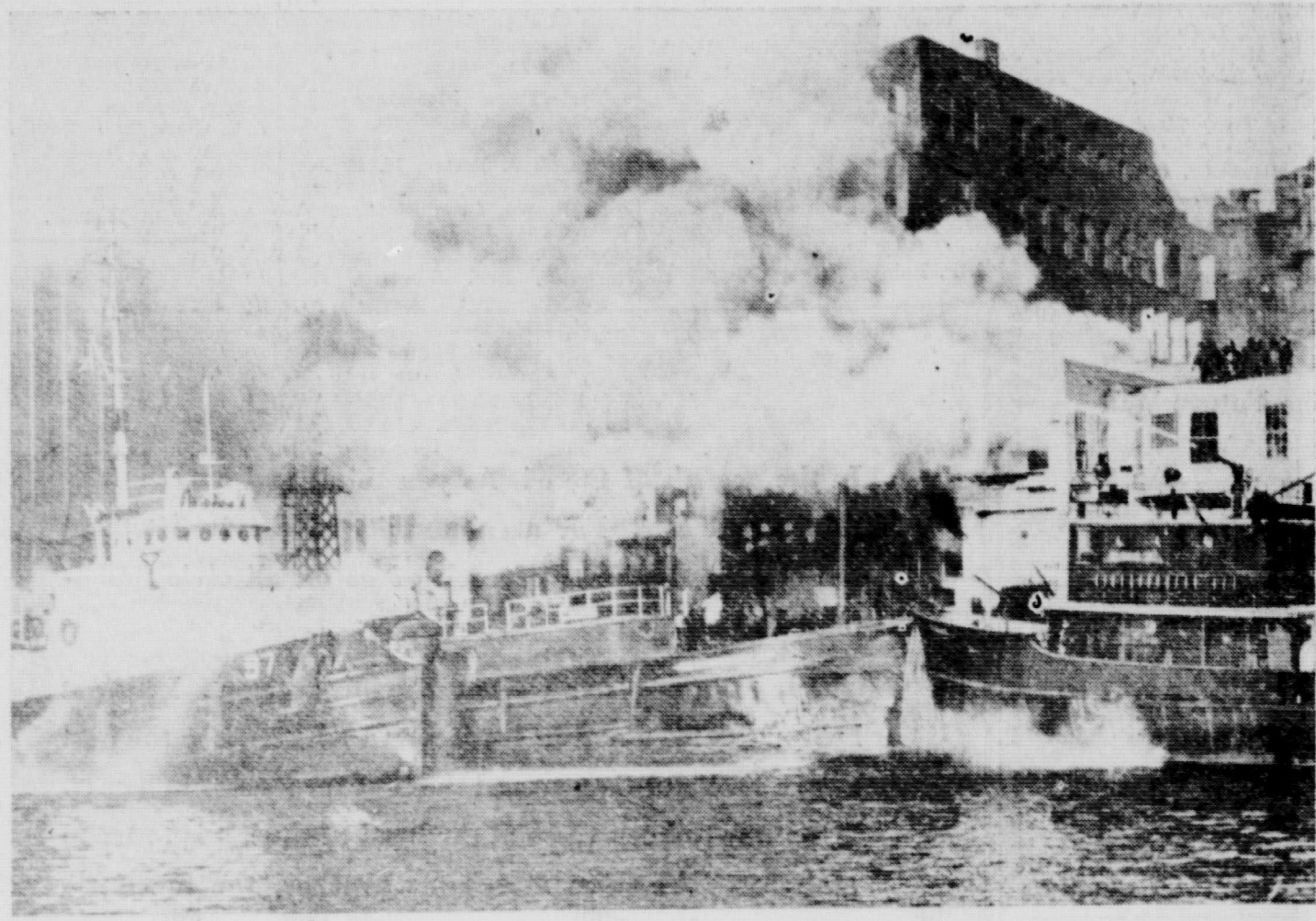
