Most Rain In Area Since August, '03

The Friona/Bovina area, which has been locked in the jaws of a severe drought for the past two years, at least got its rain gauge used last weekend, when moisture in the amount of .57 inches was caught in the county's official gauge.

The late Friday/early Saturday weather system dropped .31 inches of moisture by 8 a.m. Saturday, mostly from gentle rain, which changed over to snow by daybreak. The snow amounted to about a half inch.

A light rain/mist fell most of the day on Saturday, adding .26 inch to the total, for .57 inch overall during the 24-hour period.

It was the most rainfall which the Friona gauge had recorded since August 29, 2003, when 1.13 inches were recorded. Needless to say, that was the last time the area got an inch of rain!

Weather folks predicted a snow for Wednesday, but at 8 a.m. that day, only a trace of snow had been received.

The temperatures for the week were mostly mild, except for a high reading of 39 on Sunday, January 18, and 37 on Tuesday, January 20. A high of 61 was recorded on Wednesday, January 15.

46 Years Later Sisters Climb To Brother Tim's Crash Site

(Jacquelyn and Deniese Magness grew up in Friona. In August, 2003, the sisters climbed a mountain in Las Vegas, Nevada, to the crash site where their brother Tim's Air Force plane crashed in 1957. The following account was received from Jacquelyn Magness Franklin who is now serving as a missionary in China. It is an elegant and poignant piece of Friona history. We thank Mrs. Franklin for sharing with our readers.)

My mom and dad came to Friona in 1929.

My dad, H.T. Magness (Tiny to those who knew him) owned the Phillips 66 Wholesale and operated it for several years across from the railroad tracks. He later bought land and was in real estate.

My mother, Mae Magness, worked along side him, was a substitute teacher and very active in the First Baptist Church and later Calvary Baptist (she was a charter member). She lived in Friona for 65 years.

We moved her to Tulsa, Oklahoma, when her health began to fail. She lived in Tulsa for 2 1/2 years before her death in 1997. My brother Tim, my sister Deniese, and I all graduated from Friona High School. Your articles in the "looking back" section of the paper have included many bitter-sweet memories over the years.

Mother and dad had a son, Max, who was killed in a car accident when he was seven months old. My brother Tim, was killed in a plane crash in 1957 while in the Air Force stationed in Las Vegas, Nevada.

Then in 1958, my dad was

killed in a plane crash 13 miles west of Friona while hunting coyotes that were killing sheep on a ranch he had with Pete Buske.

I was thrilled some time ago when Bill Ellis included an article among some of his sports stories about the basketball team going to state in 1960 of which I was a part.

My former husband, Jackie Hight, and I raised four children in Friona. Only one, Joel, graduated from Friona High before we moved. But all four have wonderful memories and friendships from their time in Friona. Joel and his family live in Glenpool, Oklahoma; Jyl and her son live in Nowata; Jay and her husband and two boys live with me in Catoosa since the death of my second husband in 1999.

My sister, Deniese Dillon, and her family also live in Tulsa. She and Jerry have the Dillon International Adoption Agency and have placed 5,000 children from seven countries in loving homes in America. They also help orphanages in those seven countries and assist in health issues the children face.

Our brother Tim Magness was a 1st Lieutenant in the Air Force stationed in Las Vegas. On a routine flight January 20, 1957, from California, his plane encountered a snowstorm and crashed 70 miles from Nellis Air Force Base. His widow was pregnant with their first child. Cliff Magness arrived in April, three months after his father's death. (More about Cliff Magness in the sidebar on this page.)

Over the years the family remembered bits and pieces about the news story but a report was never released by the Air Force to

Squaws Depth Will Be A Plus In District 5-2A Playoff Race

At the beginning of the season, Squaws Coach Richard North said he was afraid his team may not have enough depth this year. Beyond his five starters, North knew he had some talented girls, but they were not yet proven in varsity competition.

As it is working out, Coach North has rotated his younger players into the lineup and they have developed the bench help he hoped for. The Squaws season record is 17-5, with four losses by either one point

or in overtime. After victories over Floydada and Hale Center, Friona is on top of District 5-2A at 4-0 with their stiffest competition, Lockney, looming Friday night. Lockney's record is 15-11 but 4-0 in district also. The Friday game is at Lockney. The winner will have the district lead at 5-0.

The Squaws had little trouble handling the frisky Floydada Lady Winds last Friday. Led by 21 points from senior Ashley Smiley, the Squaws won 63-24. Mixed in the

scoring were five 3-point goals and 11 of 19 free throws for the Squaws. Katy Welch and R. J. Barrett had two 3-pointers and Brenda Murphree added one also.

Rounding out the scoring, Barrett had 12 points, Andrea Gerles 8, Trisha Winebrinner and Welch 6 each, Murphree and Shayli Reed 4, and V'Lessa Wilcox 2 points.

Tuesday, at the home gym, the Squaws again used the press, as they have done very effectively this year, to wear down the Hale Center Lady Owls 64-41. Led in the backcourt by junior point guard Andrea Gerles, junior wing Trisha Winebrinner, and senior wing V'Lessa Wilcox, the speedy Squaws have stifled most opponents with their full court defense this year, resulting in valuable turnovers.

Junior guard Katy Welch led scoring with 15 points including one 3-pointer. Winebrinner had 14, Smiley 12, Misty Adams 7, Shayli Reed 6, Barrett 3, Wilcox 2, and Haleigh Herbert one point. Reed had two 3-point goals and Adams one.

Seniors on this year's squad are Haleigh Herbert, Ashley Smiley, R.J. Barrett, and V'Lessa Wilcox. Andrea Gerles, Katy Welch, Brenda Murphree, Misty Adams, and Trisha Winebrinner are all juniors and Shayli Reed is a freshman. And, good news for Coach North, the Squaw JV team under Coach Ky Graham is sporting a strong 19-2 record and are also 4-0 in district play.

Looks like depth will not be as much of a concern for Coach North at least for the next couple of years.

The Bovina Junior Livestock Show will be held Saturday, January 24, beginning at 1 p.m. in the Bovina show barn.

County Voter Turnout 12%, Seliger In Runoff

There are 4,996 registered voters in Parmer County according to the Parmer County Clerk's office. In the District 31 state senate race Tuesday, 596 of them voted. That is not quite 12% (.119) of eligible voters turned out.

Of that 596 votes, 242 were cast for Kel Seliger, former Amarillo mayor, who has found himself in a runoff with Kirk Edwards of the Odessa area.

Here is a breakdown of voter turnout: 61 voted early; 283 in Friona; 98 in Bovina; 78 in Farwell; 36 at Oklahoma Lane; and 40 at Lazbuddle.

Here is a candidate breakdown by votes received in the county: Edwards 117; Elaine Miller 27; Lee Gibson 107; Jesse Quackenbush 27; Bob Barnes 31; Seliger 242; and Don Sparks 45.

Reports in the Amarillo Globe-News said that Keliger was the top vote-getter in the election but did not get more than 50% so the runoff will be with Edwards who placed second in the race.

The date for the February runoff election has not been set but will be held sometime later in February.

Does The Constitution Matter Anymore?

Some column ideas just hang around until you are forced to do something about it.

Some topics are popular, some aren't. This is one of those. The basic premise is this. I don't think politicians of today pay any attention to the United States Constitution.

I've heard some of them say it was written too long ago to apply to the 21st century. Since Ben and Thomas and George didn't know anything about computers, airplanes, and salad shooters back in 1776, how could they possibly know how the world should be governed today?

Here is the situation that bothers me and it is a touchy one so keep an open mind: the Federal

Government put a price on a human life after September 11, 2001. The deadline for collecting expired December 22, 2003.

A victims compensation fund was set up after 9-11 to stop victim's families from suing the already shaky airlines. Where does the constitution give that authority to the government?

According to an article in USA Today, the total paid out for deaths and injuries was \$1.5 billion. 2,531 claims had been filed as of December. Awards issued for death claims were 776 and the average money paid for a death claim was \$1.8 million.

The highest amount paid to a victim was \$6.9 million. The highest award for an injury was \$7.9

million.

Four airplanes hijacked, crashed into the Twin Towers, almost 3,000 die. Whose fault was it? Or should any person or entity be held accountable? And someone explain to me and others why the federal government should pay money to private citizens for the life of a loved one. Where is it in the constitution.

In the New York disaster there were bus boys and bond traders. There were minimum wage earners, millionaires, and illegal immigrants. So the government felt responsible and tried to figure out how much a bus boy's life was worth compared to a rich bond trader. The USA Today story said the fund has offered swift awards ranging from \$500 to \$7.9 million to more than 1,100 families.

Who qualifies for only a \$500 award. If I had a relative die in the buildings and the government offered me \$500, would I be offended? Damn right. But how do you prove a loved one would have been worth \$7.9 million if they had lived?

I don't believe it was the government's responsibility to pay money to the private citizens that died on 9-11. That is the unpopular position I mentioned. Any more than I think a gun manufacturer should be held responsible if some maniac kills you with their gun. Or an auto manufacturer is at fault if you wrap the vehicle around a tree and die in the crash.

The victims of the Oklahoma City bombing didn't get paid by the government for dying and it was on government property. Since 9-11 they have complained but it hasn't done them a lot of good. The enormity of the New York tragedy caused an emotional upheaval in America so that any donation or compensation or other action was accepted willy nilly because to do otherwise was viewed as un-American.

And here is the kicker: why were the people who died in the World Trade Center any more special than any other person who dies tragically. For example, why should a bond trader's family be paid \$7.9 million and the family of an American soldier that dies in combat get about \$10,000. The bond trader wasn't serving his country, the soldier was. But the government has the unique power to do whatever it wants and to place a price tag on a human life.

How about this: President George W. Bush ordered that caskets of dead American soldiers returned to the U. S. could not be shown on television when they arrive and are unloaded. Why? Seeing dead soldiers arrive on a daily basis is not good public rela-

tions for the Bush administration and the war on terror.

Daily casket shots could be bad for re-election and heaven knows that is the most important thing to all politicians. Where does Dubya get the power to do that? Not from the constitution, which grants freedom of the press.

If anyone can explain and justify why the government paid the 9-11 victims money, please send me a note or an email. But be brief. I have a short attention span. Don't try that old "promote the general welfare" argument. Politicians don't care about the constitution anymore and the Bushies don't care about smaller more efficient government anymore. The government is out of control.

Now I don't have to fret with this column anymore. Thank you!

Program for First-Generation Students Receives \$30,000 Grant

First generation, college-bound students will be the beneficiaries of a \$30,000 grant awarded to West Texas A&M University by the state's First Generation College Student (FGCS) Grant Program.

The money will be used to implement the University's College Success Initiative (CSI), a fully paid summer college preparatory program aimed at increasing the participation and success of first-generation students in college.

"West Texas A&M has a strong commitment to support the College Success Initiative," Dr. Troy Johnson, dean of enrollment management and CSI project director, said. "Our proposal is a highly cost-effective approach to increasing participation of first-generation students and paying those students' way to success."

The FGCS grant will enable the University to invite a cohort of 25 first-generation college students to

participate in an individually tailored summer program that covers room and board, books and supplies, personal expenses, tutoring and testing. Matching funds from WTAMU will cover the cost of tuition and fees for six semester credit hours for each participant.

Participating students will be chosen through an application process including factors such as student-goal statements and student commitment to enroll full-time at a Texas college or university the following fall semester.

The FGCS Grant Program was established in 2003 by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board as the result of a joint grant award from the U.S. Department of Labor to the Texas Workforce Commission, the Texas Education Agency and the Coordinating Board.

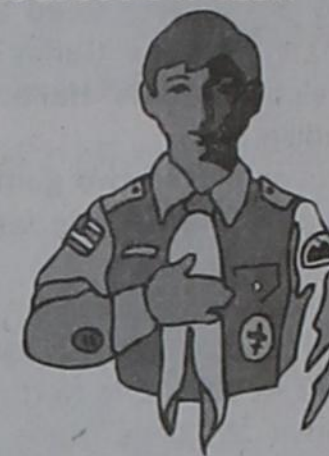

Rep. Randy Neugebauer Updates PCG Board At January Meeting

Friday, January 16, 2004 By Shawn Wade
A report on Washington legislative activities from 19th District Representative Randy Neugebauer highlighted Plains Cotton Growers January 14 Board of Directors meeting.

Neugebauer's report brought the PCG Board up to date on a number of key legislative topics that are at the top of Washington's "To-Do" list when Congress reconvenes this month. Among the unfinished items he noted as top priorities were the FY 2004 Omnibus Appropriations bill and the Energy bill.

Neugebauer highlighted his top agriculture priorities for the coming year including his desire to develop a permanent disaster assistance program that could eliminate the need for ad hoc Disaster Assistance bills in the future.

Neugebauer also reaffirmed his commitment to stay involved in the area of trade and continue to advocate the interests of cotton and other agriculture segments.

He said the key to making sure that future trade agreements don't arbitrarily sacrifice U.S. agriculture, and the programs that support it, is for Congress and industry to remain actively involved with the U.S. Trade Representatives office.

In other business the PCG Board voted to support initiation of a pilot program designed to utilize current Farm Service Agency resources to combat fraud and abuse within the federal crop insurance program.

The pilot program would require producers with crop insurance claims to obtain from the county FSA office a signed form documenting that the crop, prior to the loss, was farmed in a workmanlike manner before a final indemnity could be paid.

The Agricultural Risk Protection Act of 2000 called for a closer working relationship between the FSA and the Risk Management Agency in many areas including data collection and availability and program compliance.

Jim Conkwright, Manager of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, updated the PCG Board on statewide water issues that threaten to impact agriculture. He also announced that HPUWCD personnel were in the process of doing district wide soil moisture and depth to water surveys.

Conkwright highlighted several areas of concern and discussed a number of water related issues including rule of capture, water use and conservation, marketing and the role regional water districts would fulfill in the future.

PCG Board members also heard reports from the Cotton Board and the National Cotton Council and discussed State wide legislative issues that are expected to occupy PCG's attention in 2004.

PCG Executive Vice President Steve Verett said that over the next year PCG would be heavily involved in several issues at the State level. He noted water, education funding and tax reform as the top issues that will be discussed in Austin and around the state in 2004 leading up to the next regular Texas Legislative Session in 2005.

Pre-Plant Soil Moisture Survey Begins

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 and the U.S. Department of Agriculture-Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) will soon be gathering data for their annual joint pre-plant soil moisture survey.

Beginning January 12, USDA-NRCS Soil Scientist Gerald Crenwelge and High Plains Water District staff members Terry Bridges, Dewayne Hovey, and Scott Orr will gather data from about 200 permanently installed soil moisture monitoring sites within the Water District's 15-county service area.

Water District and USDA-NRCS staff use neutron moisture meters to gather data. Readings are taken at six-inch intervals throughout the five-foot soil profile by lowering the neutron probe into the access tube at the site. It takes about two weeks for personnel to gather data from the 200 sites.

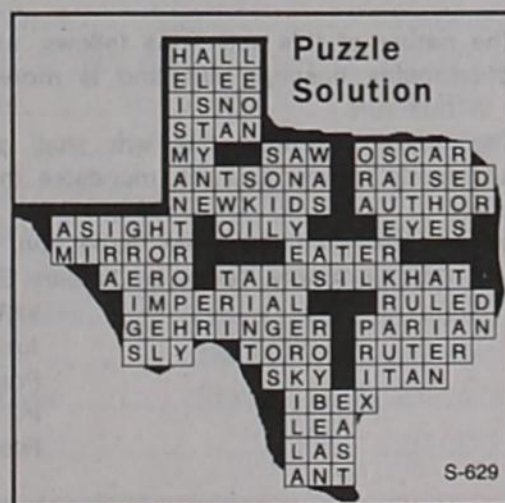
"The pre-plant soil moisture survey data is going to be extremely important to area farmers because it has been so dry this year in many parts of the Water District," said Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS soil scientist. "Soil moisture is expected to be low in the upper

part of the soil in many areas because of dry conditions. However, it will be interesting to see what the subsol moisture conditions will be."

The information will be sent to local news media and published in *The Cross Section*, the Water District's monthly newsletter.

"Once producers review this information and check the soil moisture in their own fields, they can then determine how much, if any, pre-plant irrigation is needed," Crenwelge said.

SW TX Panhandle Gets New Weather Warning Radio

As the spring severe weather season draws near, residents of the southwestern Texas Panhandle will be able to stay a step ahead of the storms by tuning in to a new NOAA Weather Radio (NWR) station—a 24-hour source of weather forecasts, watches, and warnings provided by the National Weather Service.

The new weather radio transmitter (WNG-657) was recently installed on the KNNK radio tower near Summerfield, a few miles southwest of Hereford. Broadcasting on a frequency of 162.500 Mhz directly from the National Weather Service Office in Lubbock, this weather radio reaches a large portion of Deaf Smith, Parmer, and Castro Counties, as well as portions of Randall, Oldham, Swisher, Bailey, Lamb, and Curry Counties.

"This new Weather Radio will be very beneficial to the communities that it reaches," said Ed Callanese, NWS Lubbock Warning Coordination Meteorologist. "Residents now have an extra source that can be used to receive critical advance warning information to protect their families."

NOAA Weather Radio is the "Voice of the National Weather Service". In recent years, the sound of the voice has changed. Automation, which allows NWS Forecast Offices to speed critical

weather information from advanced workstations directly to the growing number of transmitters, makes use of computer-synthesized voices. This new technology eliminates many of the delays inherent in the older systems and allows simultaneous broadcasts on multiple transmitters when necessary. It also makes better use of other new technologies, such as Specific Area Message Encoding (SAME), which allows listeners to program specially equipped NWR models to receive warning alarms for specific counties, and the Emergency Alert System (EAS), which brings critical warnings to commercial broadcasters faster than ever before.

Weather Radios come in many sizes, with a variety of functions

and costs. Some receivers can automatically sound an alarm and turn themselves on if a severe weather warning is broadcast. Some are SAME-equipped. Most receivers are either battery-operated portables or AC-powered desktop models with battery backup. Some scanners, HAM radios, CB radios, short wave receivers and AM/FM radios are also capable of receiving NOAA Weather Radio transmissions. Weather Radios can be purchased at most electronics stores.



High Plains Water District Board of Directors Cancels Pct. 3 & 4 Election Set for Feb. 7, 2004

In accordance with the Texas Election Code, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Board of Directors has declared all unopposed candidates in the February 7, 2004 election duly elected to their offices. As a result, the water district will not conduct the scheduled election in District Directors' Precincts Three and Four.

There were no contested positions as of the December 8 dead-

line to file an application for place on the ballot. No write-in candidates had registered for any office by the December 15 filing deadline.

"Political subdivisions can declare the results of an election without conducting it if there are no contested positions and no propositions on the ballot," said High Plains Water District Administrative Aide Carmon McCain. "In this instance, the election results were clear when the filing deadlines passed. This provision of the Texas Election Code saves both time and taxpayer money," he said.

District Director's Precinct Three Carroll Cook of Friona was elected to his first four-year term as Precinct Three District Director representing Bailey and Parmer Counties, and the portion of Castro County within the water district.

The newly elected Precinct Three County Committee members are as follows:

Bailey County: Gerald Shanks and Joe King of Muleshoe. The Board of Directors will appoint three County Committee members since there were no candidates for the offices.

Castro County: Jim Black of Hart; Ronnie Hoelting of Nazareth; and Donny Carpenter and Cary Jackson, both of Dimmitt. The Board will appoint a County Committee member.

Parmer County: Mitchell Wiseman and James R. Taylor of Friona; Kay Williams of Farwell; Don Bandy of Bovina; and Keith Hicks of Clays Corner.

"Since its creation in 1951, the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District has relied on a network of locally-elected officials to address water quality and quantity issues within its service area," said Manager Jim Conkwright. "We look forward to working with these newly elected officials in District Directors Precincts Three and Four."

Water District Measures Well Sites For Accuracy

High Plains Underground Water Conservation District officials remind landowners that accurate measurements are very important when selecting a proposed well well site.

A water well permit must be obtained from the water district if the proposed well is expected to produce more than 69.4 gallons of water per minute.

In making an application for a water well permit, a landowner must provide measurements from the proposed well site to two non-parallel section lines, quarter section lines, or labor lines. Also, the measured yards from the proposed well site to the three nearest wells within 440 yards must also be provided.

Wells must be drilled within 10 yards of the location specified by the landowner. If drilling occurs outside the specified location, then the well site would not be legal.

As a free service to landowners, district personnel will measure the distance from the proposed well site to section lines and nearby existing water wells. This will verify that the proposed well site complies with High Plains Water District well spacing requirements.

"We take measurements with a Topcon distance meter, which is more accurate than the measuring wheel or steel tape commonly used by landowners and producers," said Arnold Husky, water use division director. "We will check the location of the proposed water well site, take measurements, and validate that the well site is in compliance with Water District spacing requirements."

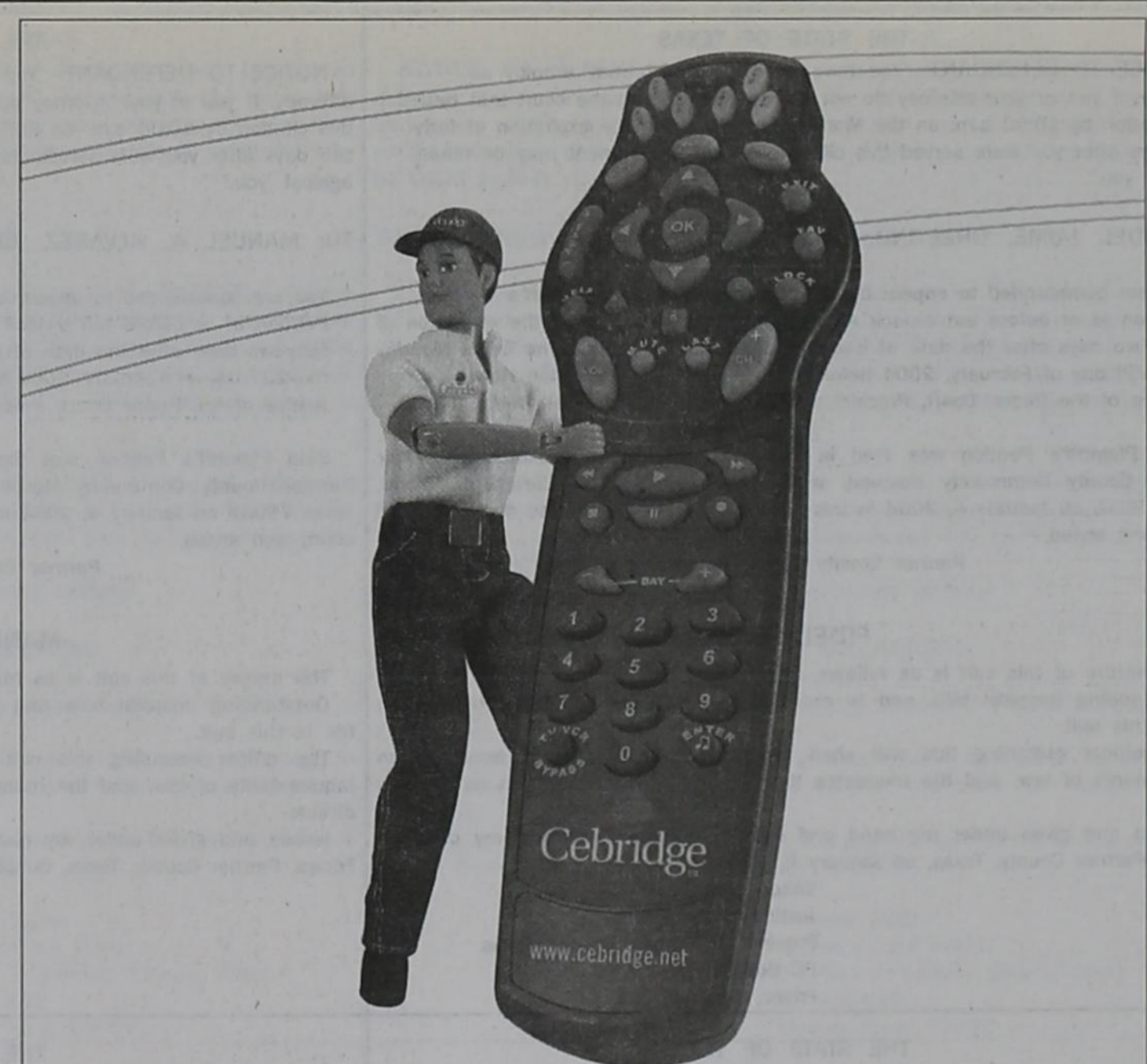
Husky added that measuring wheels roll over ridges and dips commonly found in fields. Topcon distance meters use laser technology to avoid inaccurate measurements caused by rough terrain.

Once the permit application is completed, three of five county committee members must recommend approval or denial of the permit to the district's Board of Directors. The board considers well permits at their regular monthly meetings. Once approved by the board, the landowner or agent can then proceed with drilling of the water well.

It is important to remember that obtaining signatures of three of five committee members in a county where a well is to be drilled does not constitute approval of the permit. Any drilling without

board approval of the permit may result in an invalid well site that must be abandoned.

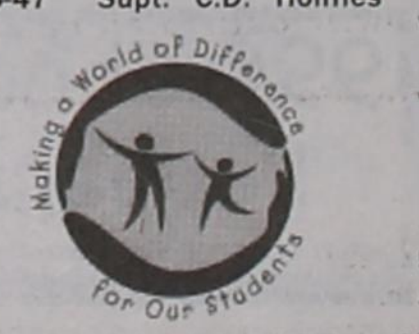

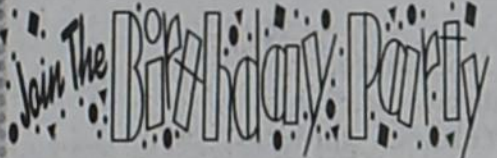
High scorer for Bovina was Chisom with 15 points and Martinez 8. This week sees games with Springlake-Earth and Sudan to complete the first half of district play.

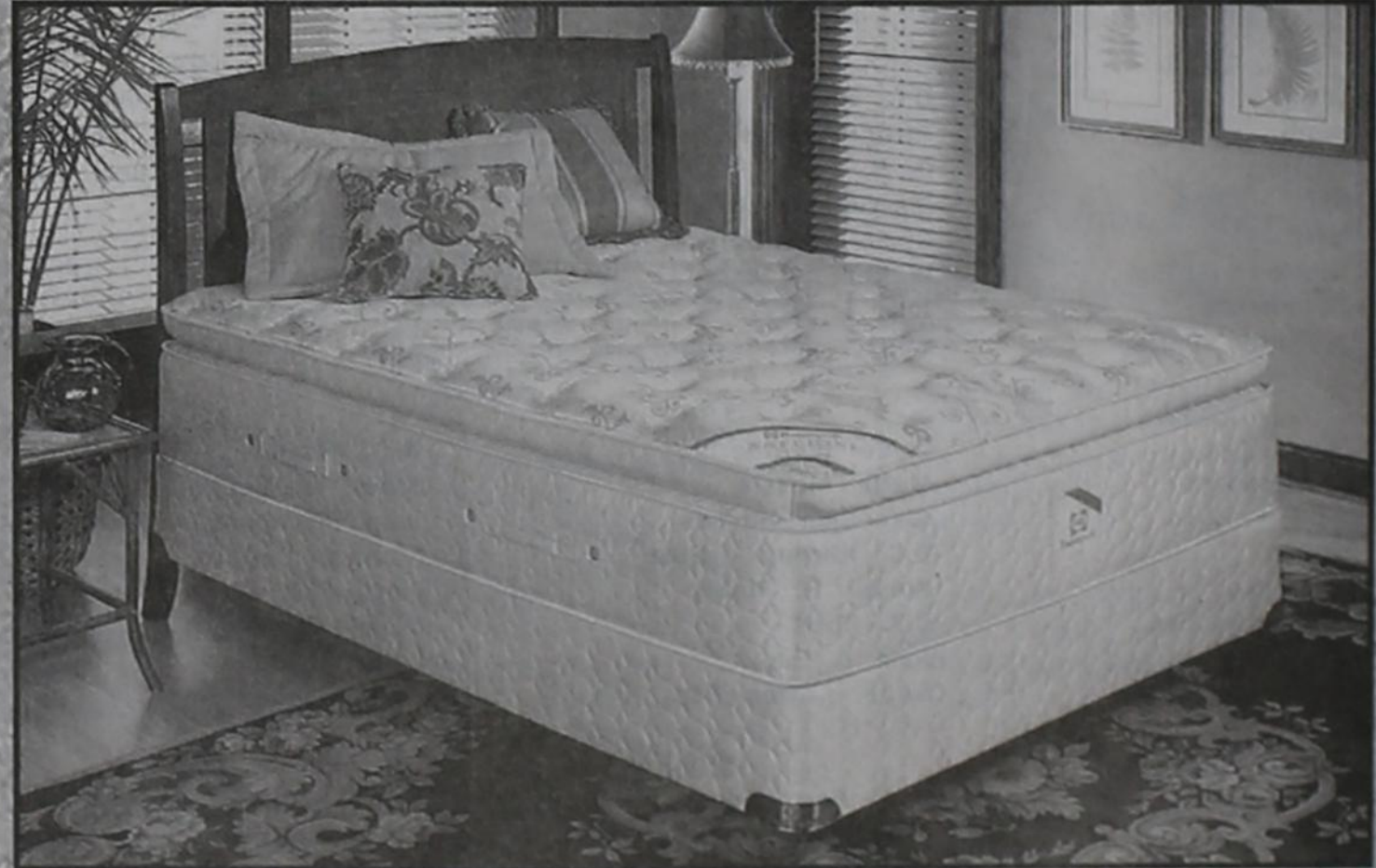

flect and ask questions. The mountain's elevation is 7900 feet. The crash occurred at 4800 feet. Part of the plane slid 50 feet down the mountain and that is where most of the wreckage still exists.

A large piece is wrapped around a Joshua tree. The tree showed signs of being burned but is still alive and blooming. Denise and I chose to put the memory marker at this site. We had an iron angel. We put messages in a plastic water bottle, placed it inside the angel, and wired it to the wreckage.

We continued our climb to the actual crash site and picked up several objects to bring home with us. Seat belts, parachute buckles, a window frame, pieces of windshield glass, and other pieces with serial numbers on them were collected.

We were truly blessed by being able to learn more about the crash and understand what happened all those years ago. Our brother was the co-pilot and we know from the report that the pilot did everything he could to climb over the mountain. Deniese and I know that on that fateful day Tim went right on climbing.

After our climb, we flew to Los Angeles where Cliff and his family and Marjore, Tim's widow, all live. We shared, laughed, and cried and thanked God for precious memories of this special person he placed in our lives. It was a time of closure for us as questions were answered and memories shared.

And now there is a new chapter in my life. I recently retired after 29 years of teaching (six of them in Friona). I taught in China during the summers of 2001 and 2002. I've always wanted to be a foreign missionary and now I'm getting to fulfill that dream.

I leave for China September 2 (2003), and will teach in the Suzhou Health School in the Jiangsu Province for the next two years. I'll be teaching English to students that are 16 to 21 years old. I was commissioned as an envoy (missionary) at the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship Assembly in Charlotte, North Carolina in June, 2003.

During a visit to Texas the first part of July, I stayed with Charlotte and Hal Ratcliff in Amarillo and visited with classmates Gwen Green Meairs and Lawana Houlette Moore. I came to Friona

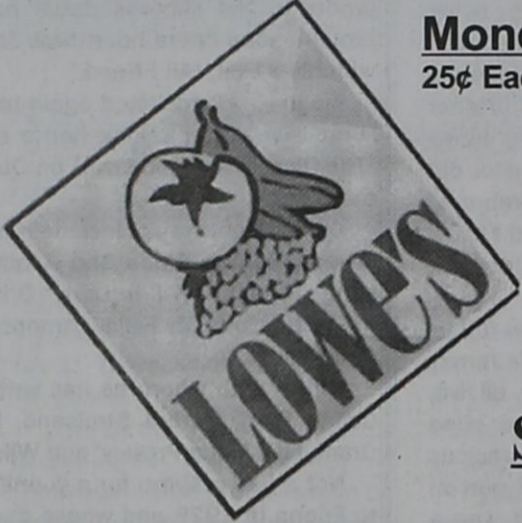
