GAINS MADE IN RETAIL SALES IN TEXAS DURING PAST MONTH

AUSTIN, June 16 - Texas retail trade sales, estimated at \$445,387,000 in May were 7% above those for April and 11% greater than in May, 1949, the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research reported.

Durable goods sales rose 13% above April and 19% above May of last year. Nondurable goods sales increased 3% from April and 5% from May, 1949.

All types of durable goods stores registered sales increases in May from the previous month. Jewelry stores had the largest gain - 23%; followed by farm implement stores, 22%; furniture stores, 16%; motor vehicle stores and hardware stores, 13%; lumber and building material, 11%; and household and appliance establishments, 7%.

Except for a 9% decline in the household and appliance stores, all durable goods stores tallied increases over May 1949. Motor vehicle sales were up 26%; lumber and building material, 23%; farm implements, 16%; furniture, 16%; hardware, 13%; and jewelry, 11%.

Filling stations, up 12%, had the largest monthly nondurable goods group gain, followed by department stores, 8%; office, store, and school supplies, 7%; eating and drinking places, 4%; apparel and drug stores, 2%; and florist shops, 1%.

Compared with May of last year, increases were recorded in office, store, and school supplies, 21%; florist shops, 8%; department stores, 7%; apparel and general merchandising stores, 5%; eating and drinking places, 4%; food stores, 3%; and drug stores, 1%.

Warning Issued On Practice Of Ignoring Tickets

Traffic regulation violators who ignore tickets given them by policemen are liable to prosecution, Mayor G. C. Rosenthal reported today. He said that too many violators are ignoring the tickets given them.

"Our traffic regulations were designed in the interest of safety and to expedite the movement of traffic in an orderly manner," Mr. Rosenthal said. "And we can not continue to permit the increasing practice of overlooking those who ignore these summons."

Under traffic ordinances, violators can be taken into county court if necessary, Mr. Rosenthal added.

LEN ORR BEGINS SUMMER MINISTRY FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH HERE

A youthful 26-year-old sum- supply pastor of the First Presbyterian Church is Rev. Len Orr, second year student at the Presbyterian Theological seminary.

Orr was born and reared in California, where he attended high school and worked ship yards until he entered the Air Corps in 1943. His first Texas was for basic training at Shepherd Field Wichita, Kansas.

The young minister says that his first impression of Texas was not do to print since Shepherd Field was said to be the place in the world where a man could stand in mud up to his waist and still have sand in his face.

Before Len left the Lone Star, his impression of the state had radically changed, the reason being a young lady while taking air corps technical training at Texas Tech. Her name was Doris Jean Weiss, now known as "Dot" Orr, the young minister's wife and co-worker at the Presbyterian church.

It was not long after his return until the "girl of his dreams" whom he had met over two years before at Texas Tech, became Mrs. Len Orr. After their marriage in Lubbock on April 6, 1946, their honeymoon trip carried them to the mountains of Colorado.

In the fall, Len entered the College of the Ozarks, a Presbyterian denominational school at

Clarksville, Arkansas. In 1943, he graduated with a Bachelor of Arts degree.

Upon completion of college work, Rev. and Mrs. Orr moved to Austin where he entered the Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary. Of the seminary, the young minister says, "I have really learned to appreciate that place because it is a Biblical seminary sticking to the real fundamentals of the faith."

His first summer of work carried him to the Old Alabama Presbyterian Church at Sibley, Louisiana. This church was founded in 1854 by some pioneer Louisiana settlers who had moved to the area from Alabama.

After serving as guest minister in the pulpit of the Presbyterian church here during his last school year, Rev. Len Orr was chosen to serve as pastor of the local church during the summer months. Some members have already asked him to continue to serve the local church as pastor during his last year at the Austin seminary.

As for the future, the sandy haired, blue eyed preacher says, "I just want to be used by the Lord to do His will here or where ever I may be," and then with a smile, he adds, "This summer, I expect to do some fishing in the lakes around Cisco."

Rev. and Mrs. Orr now reside in the Presbyterian house at 303 West 4th. Their friends and neighbors will find a cordial welcome in the minister's home.
