Pearson to Run For Legislative Post in Primary

L. R. Pearson of Ranger, former member of the Texas Legislature, authorized The Press today to announce that he is a candidate for State Representative from the 107th Electoral District.

"My name has been filed by petition with the County Chairmen of Eastland and Callahan counties for a place on the ballot in the approaching Democratic primary as a candidate for Representative of the 107th Legislative District. This was done without my knowledge or consent."

"For this expression of confidence, I am truly grateful. I have concluded to let my name remain on the ballot and will appreciate any consideration my candidacy may be given. I have no easy political promises to make."

"The big problem, in my judgment, facing the 52nd Legislature, will be water, soil, and money, but the greatest of these is money. Runaway government spending, which has increased over 500% in the last 14 years, and threatens to increase even more, will be the No. 1 concern of the next Legislature. This money problem can be solved in only one of two ways—by eliminating useless and excessive appropriations or by levying new and additional taxes. I favor the former. I have yet to vote for a tax bill of any kind. I will strive to preserve this record."

COMPLETION WORK BEGINS ON TWO OIL PROSPECTS FOR AREA

Completion activities featured the oil news today from leases in the Cisco area.

Just east of town, electric logs were being run in the E. C. Johnston No. 1 Mahan-Edwards, which blew in with a roar early last week. It was regarded as the area's most important strike in several months.

Operators killed the gas pressure, estimated at more than 7,500,000 cubic feet daily, and drilled through the Ranger formation. The logs were being run today. Casing will be run to the bottom and cemented. After the pipe sets, the well will be completed through perforations in the casing.

Five miles east of Cisco, Bankline Oil Company's No. 2 Mrs. Briggs Owens was preparing to complete in the Lake Sand. Drilled to 3,748 feet — through the Duffer line — a test had a slight show, but operators decided to pass it up.

Pipe was to be run in the Lake Sand to a total depth of about 3,300 feet. A test indicated that this well probably will be as good as the discovery well, the No. 1 Owens.

In the same area, J. J. Lynn of Kansas City was drilling ahead in his No. 1 Keys et al, an offset to the northwest.

Northwest of Cisco in Callahan County, J. K. Wadley was drilling at 530 feet with cable tools in his No. 1 Isenhower, a Strawn sand test in Section 2995. Two Strawn wells were recently completed in that area to a depth of about 2,000 feet.

Nearly 2 Inches Of Rain Recorded

Nearly two inches of rain fell in downtown Cisco early Wednesday morning, according to the city hall gauge. The rain fell during a brief wind storm that struck the area about 4 a. m.

Less than half an inch fell at Lake Cisco and the area north of the city registered only a trace.

More rain fell to the south and east.

No damage was reported from the wind storm. A few electric lines were knocked down by falling limbs. West Texas Utilities Company officials reported.

War Trophies To Be Distributed

Additional war trophies from the Chemical Corps, Department of the Army, will be distributed to Texas museums, schools, and organizations, according to a letter received today by Governor Allan Shivers from the Chief of the Chemical Corps, Washington, D. C.

Baird Empire Is Stricken Fatally

Calvin Horace McQueen, a 42-year-old Baird Empire and ranch hand, was stricken with a heart attack in the midst of a softball game between Wooten Grocery and the Baird Legionnaires at Baird Stadium Tuesday night. McQueen died shortly after reaching the hospital.

Funeral arrangements were incomplete pending the arrival of relatives.

He was born Feb. 6, 1908, in Cottonwood, Eastland County, and moved to Baird while still a young boy. He had worked for seven years on the Dyer Ranch.

Survivors include the widow, the former Elvin McCarty of Baird; one son, Ocie B. McQueen and two daughters, Janice and Marqueta McQueen, all of Baird; two sisters, Mrs. Frankie Robbins of Scottsburg, Ind., and Mrs. Dona Bernard of Baird; one brother, Harold Hallaway of Baird, and a foster brother, Emmet Hutchinson of Baird.

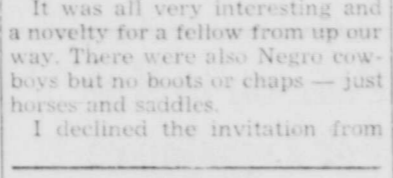

I declined the invitation from

my Negro boys who attend me at the sanitarium to be a guest at their baseball game and barbecue. I learned that the visitors here are always honored with this colored hospitality each year, but I thought as the boys were going in quite a spirited manner that I might have to find my way back on my own power. They are having a swell time anyway in this celebration.

FARMER OF THE WEEK...

Mrs. D. H. Whitten Makes Good As Manager Of Ranch

Mrs. D. H. Whitten, who lives just north of Lake Cisco on the Moran highway, leads in the operation of a 1700-acre ranch and the raising of her family's food and meat supply.

Mrs. Whitten is the widow of the late D. H. (David) Whitten, who was killed on Thanksgiving Day, 1947, when the automobile which he was driving collided with an oil truck on the old Canyon Road.

Although it was hard for Mrs. Whitten to understand why she must be left alone to rear their five children, she has faithfully carried on in a most magnificent way and says that she still has a lot to be thankful for.

The children are as follows: Wilma, 19 (now Mrs. E. L. Smith), Mary Nell, 15, who is attending the choral clinic at Cisco Junior College this week; Anna Jean, 10; David Earl, 8, and Billy Jack, 6.

The oldest daughter and her husband live just a few yards from the Whitten home. The son-in-law, E. L. Smith, is employed by the Lone Star Gas Company, and is a lot of help on the ranch, according to Mrs. Whitten.

Since the death of her husband, Mrs. Whitten says that she has had to cut down on the number of cattle on the 1700 acres. However at the present time the lady rancher and her children care for over 100 head of white face Herefords.

Each of her children has a riding horse. When called upon, they saddle up their horses and help their mother round up the cattle. Although Mrs. Whitten also enjoys riding, on most occasions she drives their pickup truck while the children ride the horses.

In addition to the cattle and horses, Mrs. Whitten takes care of the chickens that provide the family's daily egg supply. Each winter a number of hogs are fattened on the Whitten farm and come in handy in the way of hams, bacon, sausage, and chops during the year.

There is also a large family garden on the place. This year, Mrs. Whitten and her children planted corn, beans, peas, squash, peppers, cucumbers, okra, radishes, and carrots.

A visitor to the Whitten home is immediately impressed by the happy children who seem to love their mother dearly. The boys are like all other boys their age. At present they have started a horned toad collection and through research and investigation they have learned how to hypnotize the reptiles. They also frequently engage the horned frogs in races.

Each Lord's Day, Mrs. Whitten and children attend Sunday School and preaching at the First Baptist Church of Cisco, in which she is a class teacher for young women.

Mrs. Whitten was born and reared in Eastland County and has lived here almost all of her life, except for a few years spent in Wise County. She is the daughter of G. A. Earp of Rising Star. Her mother died when she was a child.

The attractive lady rancher does not look old enough to be a grandmother. However, she is mighty proud of her grandson, Johnny Mack Smith, who will soon be 7 months old.

In the near future Mrs. Whitten

hopes that the electric lines will come close enough for electric lights to replace the old gas lamps in the home. As for the years of the future, she says that her greatest desire is to rear her children in the right way and to provide them with an education.

Soften 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin in 1/2 cup cold water. Heat 1 can (1 1/2 cups) condensed mushroom soup over low flame to boiling point. Add gelatin, stir until dissolved. Combine 1/4 cup catsup, 1/4 tsp. Worcestershire sauce, 1 tsp. prepared mustard, 1/2 tsp. scraped onion, 1/2 cup celery and 1/4 cup green pepper, both chopped fine, 1 1/2 lbs. (4 cups) ground boiled or baked ham. Add gelatin-soup mixture. Stir to blend well. Fold in 1/2 cup mayonnaise. Add salt, pepper to taste. Cut 1 1/2 slices pineapple into wedges. Arrange around slices of loaf pan (8 1/2"x1 1/2"x4"). Spoon meat mixture into pan. Chill in gas refrigerator until firm. Turn into serving dish, garnish with 1 1/2 slices pineapple and parsley. 8 to 10 servings.

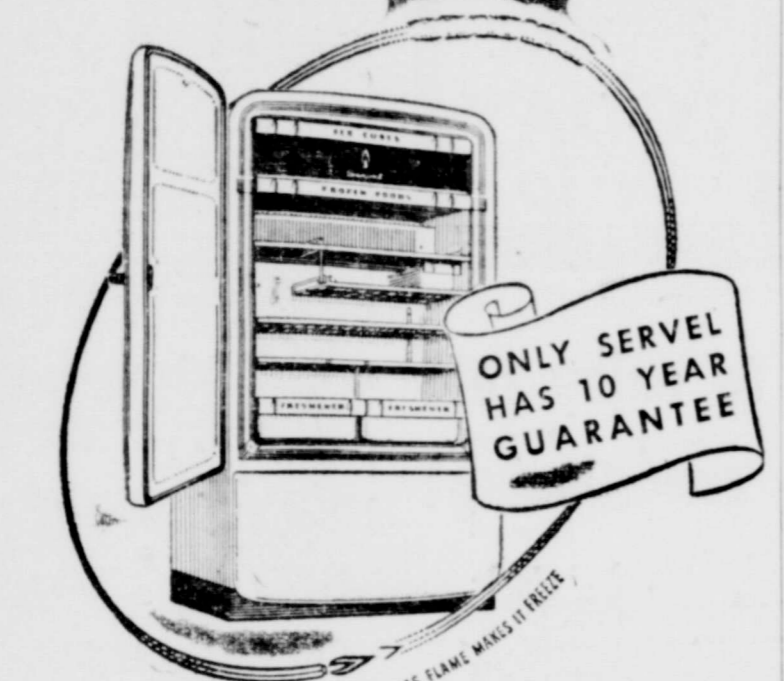
