Employers Asked To Give Leave To Guard Men

All employers of members of Reserve components of the Armed Forces and of the National Guard were urged today by Secretary of Defense Louis Johnson to be liberal in granting special eaves of absence to participate in annual periods of military

Secretary Johnson pointed out the importance to national security of maintaining a well trained military reserve force, in a statement addressed to employers. He emphasized that a liberal policy in granting leaves of absence is fundamental.

Secretary Johnson's statement to employers was made at the request of Chairman Edwin H. Burgess of the Civilian Components Policy Board of the Department of Defense.

The secretary's statement fol-

"Last June, I appealed to you the employers of the United States, to assist in the building of our team for national defense by adopting liberal policies relative to granting leaves of absence to the employee members of the various civilian components of the Armed Forces in order that they might participate in the regular annual periods of training duty vith their units.

"This year it is even more important that we place maximum emphasis on the training of our ivilian components to augment our Regular Forces in the event of national emergency

"I heartily commend the many f you who have cooperated so villingly and urge that all employers take favorable action on requests by their employees for military leaves of absence, in order to increase the strength of our national defense and the security of our country."

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





In face of Board findings to the contrary, union leaders insist on 48 hours pay for 40 hours work. This would be an average increase of 31 cents an hour, or \$2.48 a day. So Union leaders have called a completely uninstified strike on 5 Western railroads, effective June 25.

On June 15, an Emergency Board appointed by President Truman under the terms of the Railway Labor Act recommended the railroads grant switchmen a 40-hour week and a wage increase of 18 cents an hour, or \$1.44 for an 8-hour day.

Despite the added financial burden involved, the railroads are ready to accept these recommendations, as they have always accepted Emergency Board recommendations on national issues.

But the leaders of the Switchmen's Union refuse to accept! They demand an average increase of 31 cents an hour or \$2.48 A DAY-although their present earnings are substantially higher than those of workers in other industries!

Board Says Demands Unjustified

In its report, the Board declared this demand unjustified by all the evidence presented. It also pointed out that it would give the switchmen an unfair pay advantage over other groups of railroad employes, and would add too great a burden to railroad costs.

Here is another case of a railroad union flouting the findings of an Emergency Board - another case of calling a crippling strike in an outrageous and reckless attempt to force demands which the Board clearly labels as unjustified!

Leaders of the Switchmen's Union are calling this strike in defiance of the Board -in defiance of the facts-and at the expense of the public!
