Bankline Oil Company's No. 2 Mrs. Briggs Owens, five miles northeast of Cisco, came in as an excellent well. Potential tests were due to be run this week. The well was drilled to 3.748 feet and plugged back to 3,344 feet in the Lake sand. Treated with hydrafrac, it kicked off when opened at noon Monday and flowed.

Oil men believed it would be as good as Bankline's No. 1 Owens. discovery well, which has a potential of about 500 barrels per day. Nearby, Bankline's No. 3 Mrs. Briggs Owens was drilling at 2,-075 feet early today.

In the same area, J. J. Lynn's No. 1 Keyes et al was testing in the Lake formation.

FIREMEN ANSWER CALL






