# **Building Work Is** Up 16 Per Cent Gene S. Porter of Harris Coun- In Southwest Area

New construction activity in the outhwestern states during the Charles B. Hutchison of Dallas first quarter of 1950 was 16% above the first quarter 1949 levels, according to a report released today by Ray L. Miller, regional director, U. S. Dept. of Commerce at Dallas. Texas ranked third among the states, after California and New York, in the volume of new construction.

Commerce Department estimates show that new construction with Roger Q. Evans of Grayson a total value of \$533 million was put in place in Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma and Arkansas during Preston E. Smith of Lubbock the first three months of this year. More than 3/5 of the total Fred Red Harris of Dallas was in Texas. Private construction amounted to \$407 million and public construction was valued at \$126 million in the four-state area.

> Miller said. Construction activity has expanded more rapidly in this area than in most other parts of the country since the war. In 1939, these four states accounted for about 81/2 % of total new construction in the United States. 




