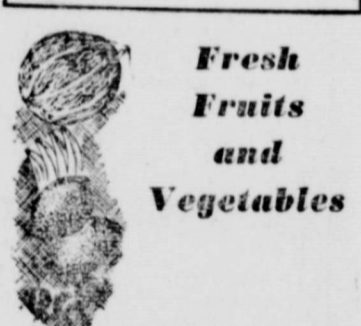

HEALTH TALKS

TOO MUCH SUNLIGHT TOO FAST IS NOT WHAT DOCTOR ORDERED

Rome wasn't built in a day but it did a heap of burning in one 24-hour period. There's a moral in that for summer tanners; you can't build a permanent tan on your hide in one day, but you can burn your hide.

Suntanning is a process of building up a skin pigment which protects the skin and its underlying areas from over-absorption of the harmful rays of the sun. But until the skin is tanned it is still susceptible to absorbing those harmful rays. So you are supposed to make haste slowly in tanning the skin, taking on just so much sun at a time until the protective pigment (tan) is acquired.

Certain creams, oils, ointments and lotions offer some protection but cannot be expected to prevent completely the effects of a prolonged exposure to the sun.

Some people cannot build up skin pigment at all. Blondes are more susceptible to sunburn than brunettes and each person's reaction varies. Sometimes the skin turns red immediately upon exposure to the sun and at other times it takes about 24 hours for reaction to set in. And even after all the burning, aches, and pains, there are some skins which might again become lily-white after the sunburn symptoms disappear.

The simplest treatment for mild sunburn is wet packs of strong, cool tea applied to the burning areas. This usually relieves the pain at once and may convert the burn into the desired tan. Compresses of cold milk or cream or caron oil may also help.

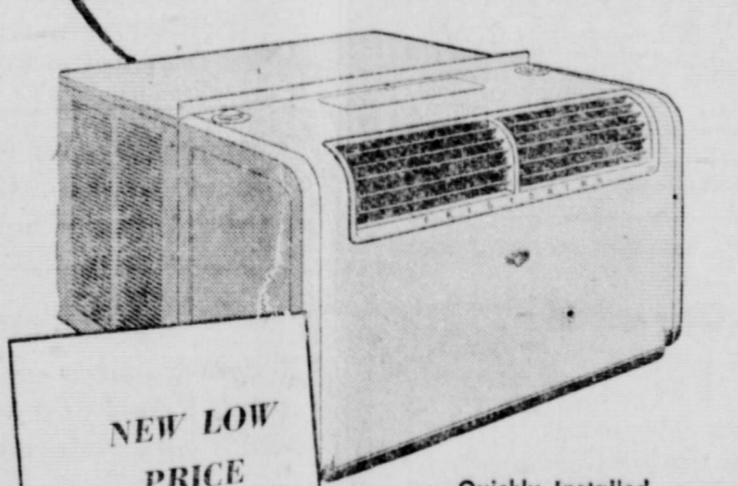

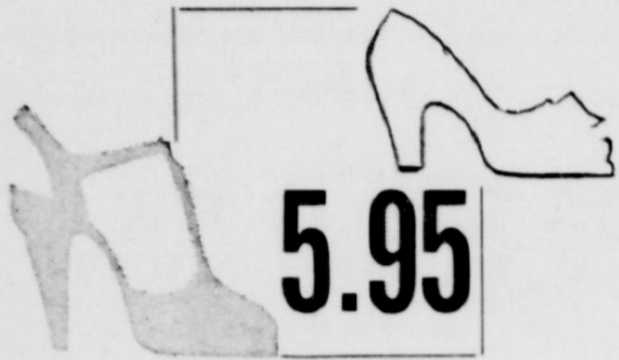
