Cancer Projects Given To Texas From Fund Drive

Twenty cancer control projects in Texas — tumor clinics, information centers, and professional service groups — have just received appropriations totaling \$118,123.73, from funds raised in the Texas Cancer Crusade.

Budgets for the 20 projects have been approved by the Committee on Projects and Allocations of Funds of the American Cancer Society, Texas Division, and recipients of the funds are being notified this week by state headquarters of the Society in Houston.

"The Society's biggest test has been to figure out how to make the \$390,000 raised so far in the Texas Cancer Crusade line up with budget needs amounting to \$500,000," Dr. William F. Mengert of Dallas, committee chairman, said. "One fourth of all Cancer Society funds goes into research into causes and possible cures of the disease. Money is constantly needed, too, for various services to cancer patients. Since early diagnosis is imperative for recovery from cancer, cancer education for the public and for doctors takes an increasing amount each year. All in all, our budget committees are hard pressed to make the necessary cuts."

"Members of this committee view it as a healthy sign of progress and future planning that requests outstrip available funds, but they're quick to admit that it's not easy to apply the pruning knife to so many projects vitally needed to effectively combat cancer in our state," Dr. Mengert concluded.

Optometrist, Dr. W. I. Gormley, speaking and asking for the privilege of sounding his fog horn to let your readers know that he has been absent from your City almost two weeks. Not that anybody missed me, or cares, but I like the ONE freedom of North America — free speech.

Leaving Cisco about one p. m. Saturday, June 17, traveling via train, I arrived at Springfield, Mo., at 3 a. m. Sunday, June 18. Preferring not to disturb the peaceful slumbers of my kin at Springfield at this early hour, I tarried at the Station until about five thirty. This two and a half hours was delightfully spent in conversation with New Friends in waiting for outgoing trains.

At five thirty I called a taxi and hurried out to 717 Belmont Street, the home of my Aunt, ninety year old widow of my mother's brother, Taylor Hunt, who has preceded her back to the Spirit Realm some twenty years ago. I found her and her visiting progeny sleeping peacefully, but nary a wink of sleep did they get after I arrived.

After a hurried breakfast and the most pressing reminiscence, I was pressed into service helping

her five living children — Gus, Lt. Col. in U. S. Army; Norma, now Mrs. Andy Worley, Registered Nurse of Grand Junction, Colo.; Aude, Merchant in a small town near Springfield; Pearl, bachelor girl School Teacher of Tulsa, Oklahoma; Grace, now Mrs. Homer Smith of Mt. Vernon, Mo., and all-round co-Executive of their varied private enterprises, prepare the picnic grounds in Phelps Park for an elaborate entertainment honoring their mother, Mrs. T. H. Hunt, who was ninety years old June 14.

We went to the park at seven and worked like Trojans till about eleven preparing tables and seats. The Birthday Dinner was scheduled to be served at 1 p. m. The crowd began to arrive soon after eleven, and by one o'clock, some hundred and fifty feet of tables were loaded with the most varied and tempting food. I forgot my waistline and indulged to the limit of my capacity.

I met so many of the teen-age gang of my acquaintances of yesterday, and they beamed such delight at seeing me again, and I was so thrilled at seeing them again, that I will have to give the occasion a very prominent place in the hall of my memory, to be recalled as a delightful experience in future years when browsing the meadows of reminiscence.

Chiding my cousin, Norma D. Hunt Worley, about not having any children she asked — Do you

remember Winnie Edge? Being answered in the affirmative she said, find her, she can show enough posterity for both of us. I found her and she trotted out her progeny to the third generation — eight sons and daughters, and I believe, every one of them grandparents. She was justly proud, not an embeccle or runt among them. I crowned her Queen of my former acquaintances.

My ninety year old young Aunt Alice asked me what was the most impelling thing that brought me to her party. I told her it was the luxury of memory. I remembered the many times she had climbed the stairs cold nights when I would be visiting them in my youth to see that we kids had not kicked the cover off, and to put on an extra quilt if the weather had turned colder. That was just too much of a Good Samaritan act to be forgotten, or to be considered lightly.

Leaving Springfield I journeyed to Kansas City, Mo., to visit my sister, Melinda, her husband, W. G. Rogers, who is sick nigh unto death, and their children and

grandchildren. Also, the children and grandchildren of my brother Ben who returned to the Spirit Realm five years ago, and a cousin, Henry Polk Lowenstein, whom I had not seen since Christmas, 1902, and whose wife and children I had never met. Thus endeth my sojourn away from Cisco, and I have returned to continue my bare-existence living. Because, I still do, and will CONTINUE TO REFUSE to sell my birthright for a "mess of pottage."

Miss Mary Gray of Albuquerque is doing the preaching for the meeting. Good crowds were reported for services this week.

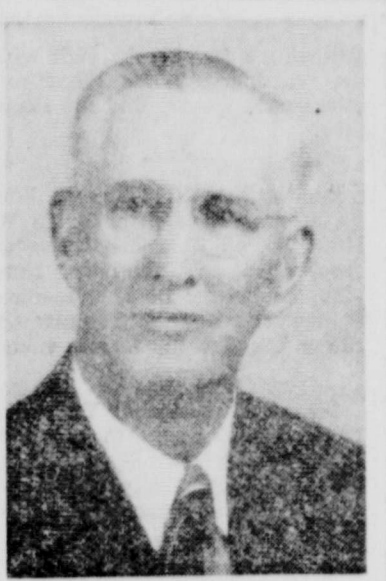

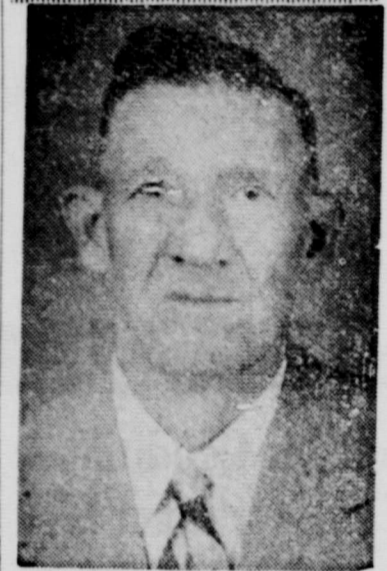
