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NATURE'S DEODORANT

A boon to millions who are handicapped by halitosis or B. O. is a newly discovered use of chlorophyll, ancient chemical of nature that makes grass green and gives trees their verdure.

The ability of chlorophyll to stop unpleasant odors was a chance discovery. Doctors experimenting with the substance as a healer of wounds found that it would sometimes close injuries that had resisted sulfa, penicillin and other medicines.

Further experiments have confirmed this result and have extended chlorophyll treatment to the wider fields of halitosis and B. O. Twelve college girls, all embarrassed by B. O. despite fre-

quent bathing, volunteered as human guinea pigs for Dr. F. Howard Westcott. One morning each girl took a pill of Westcott's specially prepared chlorophyll, and at intervals during the day appeared for an underarm test with an oscilloscope, an instrument that precisely measures the intensity of any odor.

Gas Has Got It!

This spicy Barbecue Sauce is pre-cooked, refrigerated, used when wanted for spare ribs, beef or chicken. Melt 2 tbsps. butter or margarine, add 1 med. chopped onion, 1 chopped clove garlic. Cook until tender but not brown. Add 1/2 cup chopped celery with leaves, 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, 1 No. 2 can tomatoes, 1 6-oz. can tomato paste, 1 bay leaf, 3 tbsps. brown sugar, 2 tbsps. dry mustard, 1/2 cup vinegar, 1/2 tsp. cloves, 1/2 tsp. all-spice, 2 slices lemon, 1 1/2 tps. salt, 1 tsp. Tabasco. Simmer over low flame 30 mins. Let stand until cool. Strain if you wish. Yield: 2 1/2 cups. Swab meat or fowl with sauce, serve the balance hot in bowls.

My name has been filed by petition with the County Chairmen of Eastland and Callahan Counties for a place on the official ballot in the approaching Democratic primary as a candidate for Representative of the 107th Legislative District. This was done without my knowledge or consent.

For this expression of confidence I am truly grateful. I have concluded to let my name remain on the ballot, and will appreciate any consideration my candidacy may be given. I have no easy political promises to make. They are usually of little or no value. I represented the 107th District in the 49th and 50th sessions and my record in the Legislature reflects my philosophy of State affairs.

The big problems, in my judgment, facing the 52nd Legislature will be water, soil and money, but the greatest of these is money. Runaway government spending, which has increased over 500% in the last 14 years, and threatens to increase even more, will be the No. 1 concern of the next Legislature. This money problem can be solved in only one of two ways — by eliminating useless and excessive appropriations or by levying new and additional taxes. I favor the former. I have yet to vote for a tax bill of any kind. I will strive to preserve this record.

The present level of State spending, according to the Comptroller, will create an annual deficit of \$76 million in the State General Fund. I will strive to balance the budget and prevent this deficit by rigid economy, instead of by new additional taxes. However, if it develops that taxes are "must" legislation and additional revenue is absolutely necessary to operate the State government efficiently, I will not sidestep the responsibility, however painful. If new taxes must come, I would favor placing the new levies on present sources which are now escaping taxes. However, I will not support a general sales tax or State income tax.

Also, redistricting, following the new census, is a constitutional mandate. If elected, I will support it.

On other issues coming before the 52nd Legislature, I will vote for what I consider the best interest of my State and District.
