

Wheat Yield Well Below Last Year Friona Wheat Growers of a normal year. Wheat harvest is under-

(FWG) manager Ron Smiley told the co-op stockholders Tuesday night that they estimated their elevators would receive only 25% of the wheat compared to last year.

Smiley said FWG handled about 2 million bushels last year and expect between 300,000 and 500,000 bushels

this year. Other area elevators echoed the same projections. One elevator manager said they were hoping for 20-25% of last year's crop but were

planning for only 10-15%. Yields reported have been 12-15 bushels per acre with a few in the 20-25 bushel yield. Irrigation farmers can expect 40-50 bushels per acre, depending on how they

way mainly for dryland acres. Due to the condition of this year's crop, elevator managers don't expect the harvest to last very long.

70 Yrs Ago-June 17, 1932 The city commission held a called meeting Monday night in the office of the secretary, with the mayor and both commissioners present, and discussed ways and means of collecting funds with which to meet payment for the water meters, which the city has been installing during the past few weeks. Water Superintendent, L.G. Sympson, reported that the entire city is now under meter with the exception of about ten places, and meters were at that time ordered to fill out this list.

60 Yrs Ago-June 12, 1942 The Friona Wheat Growers, Inc., is increasing its already large grain storage space by the addition of four bins now under construction, which will augment the space by an estimated 20,000 bushels. In addition to this, plans are made for another elevator, which will give another 60,000 bushel space. It is hoped that the 80,000 bushel addition will be ready for service by harvest, according to Guy Bennett, elevator manager.

50 Yrs Ago-June 12, 1952 City Marshall J.W. Roberts has been instructed by the city commission of Friona to educate local drivers on proper parking with observance of the noparking zones painted along the curbs in yellow paint. Both this and speeding regulations will be enforced here, with the marshall first reminding offenders by leaving 'courtesy' tickets on cars improperly parked along these zones or across alleys.

45 Yrs Ago-June 13, 1957 Friona School Board Monday night approved plans for new buildings for ten additional classrooms, offices, a grade school gymnasium, storage space and work rooms for teachers. July 2 was set as the date for contract letting. Bonds in the amount of \$350,000 were voted for Salas died Tuesday, June the building recently.

30 Yrs Ago-June 15, 1972 A devastating hail storm cut a swath about two miles wide across the Black Community last Saturday afternoon, destroying some crops and heavily damaging others. Up to three inches of rain was received during the downpour, which assaulted crops and buildings with golf ball-sized hailstones for the

better part of an hour. Farms of Wesley Barnett, Charles Bass, Ed Clark, Travis Stone, Bruce Parr, Tom Lewellen, Bill Carthel, Clyde Hays, Johnny Mars and other sustained heavy crop damage. At the Tom Lewellen place, a building being used to house an airplane and trailer house was blown down by the galelike wind which accompanied the storm, and extensively damaged the spray plane owned by Joe Lewellen, and the Lewellen's recently acquired trailer house.

25 Yrs Ago-June 19, 1977 The Friona City Council voted in a called session Friday to purchase an all-new containerized trash system for the city. A bid by the Pak-Mor company of San Antonio in the amount of \$80,834 was accepted by the council in a brief meeting. It hailed for 2-2 1/2 hours, from marble to golf-ball size, and came a flood of rain. Golf-ball sized hail was also reported southwest of Friona.

Lorraine Welch of Friona is Bailey's grandmother. Monte Welch Bailey of San Antonio is his mother. The citation from the U.S.


Navy read as follows: "For meritorious achievement while serving as Search and Rescue Crew aboard the Knightrider 13, on the night of August 2, 2001. Lieutenant Bailey, Lieutenant Farnsworth, Petty Officer Chapman and Petty Officer Muencharath performed their demanding duties in an

exemplary and highly professional manner. "During extremely hazardous conditions in the path of approaching Tropical Storm Pabuk, utilizing Night Vision Devices, the crew dislayed extraordinary airmanship and skill during all

facets of a daring airborne "Demonstrating exceptional flight crew coordination, they located the 100-foot U.S. Coast Guard Cutter, Galveston Island, 50 nautical miles off the coast of Guam and safely rescued a severely injured Taiwanese fishing

boat captain. "Positioning the HH-46D Seaknight helicopter over the stern of the wildly pitching and rolling vessel, Lt. Bailey skillfully hovered over a 12 by 12 foot area near a 40foot mast to extract Petty Officer Muenchrath, medical





Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home in Friona submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for submitting in this week's issue. This month we are featuring Charlsie Eubank.

I was born Janaury 5, 1907 in Greenville, Texas, Hall County, to Edd and Sara Courtney.

I had one brother. His name was William but we called him Bill. He learned to ride a bicycle, but I never did. I did learn to play the piano and spent a good deal of time playing it.

My parents had a farm. I loved to help work on the farm. We would raise a garden every year and we canned alot of fruit and vegetables.

We moved NW of Idalou, Texas, and that was when I met Gilbert Eubank. We were married on July 12, 1925 in Slaton, Texas. Gilbert said he didn't want any children, he wanted a house with a picket fence around it. We went on to have seven children: four boys and three girls.

The girls took piano lessons and I helped them learn to play. I played for church services and my own enjoyment.

Lower Your Investment Risk--Through Diversification

If you own just one or two investments, you probably spend a lot of time hoping fervently that they'll prosper. When they don't, it will be readily apparent to you--and to your portfolio's bottom line.

Unfortunately, it's almost impossible to pick investments that will always perform well. And that's why you need to diversify. By diversifying, you'll help yourself in several key ways. Here are a few to consider:

You can help diminish the effects of "bad news." When you distribute your investment dollars among a wide variety of financial assets--stocks, bonds, money market accounts, government securities, etc.--you can help reduce the risk of being hurt by some "bad news" that hits a particular asset or asset class. You can help increase your chances for success. At any given time, some types of financial assets will be doing well. You can help avoid some common investment mistakes. By following a diversification strategy, you may be able to avoid some widespread investment mistakes, such as chasing after "hot" stocks. If you don't concentrate on diversification, you may be more tempted to pursue those stocks whose price has gone up quickly. And yet, by the time you buy these stocks, they may already be cooling off. But if you're truly diversified, you may already have similar stocks in your portfolio, so you'll be far less likely to "chase performance"-which is almost always a bad idea.

If you're going to be diversified, though, you'll need to look at the full range of stocks: blue chips, international stocks, small-capitalization growth stocks, value stocks, etc.

When it comes to investing, it pays to be as broad-minded as possible. So, spread your dollars among a variety of suitable, high-quality investments. You should be pleased with the results.
