Social Security Man To Be Here To Help Public

E. Glen McNatt, Field Representative of the Abilene office of the Social Security Administration, will be at the Chamber of Commerce in Cisco at 2 p. m. on Thursday, August 24th. Persons wishing assistance with retirement claims or death claims under the Social Security Act, or needing information about their social security accounts, should call at that time for necessary help and information. "Every day a number of persons needlessly write letters to the Abilene office for applications for social security cards," stated McNatt. "These persons evidently do not know that an application blank can be obtained right from their home post office. The post offices, as a service to the people, carry these blanks and are ready and willing to hand them out to all who ask for them." Texas Employment Commission offices in this area also have the forms. By obtaining this applications at the post office, the individual can save himself wasted effort and loss of time, since there is no need to write a letter asking for one. Upon receipt of the completed application, the social security Administration will issue a social security card. Doing this will save the person 2 or 3 days in getting his card, and it may also save time in getting started on a new job. All completed blanks should be mailed to the Social Security Administration, Abilene, Texas.

Specialist Tells Of Big Potential Possible In Plan

A weekly cash potential of \$5,000 to \$7,000 is available to the poultrymen of the Cisco area through the production of top quality eggs speckled at a Chamber of Commerce egg production and marketing school pointed out here Friday afternoon. F. M. Stockton, assistant poultry and marketing specialist of Texas A. & M. college, was in charge of the school, which was held on the roof garden of the Victor Hotel. He was assisted by County Agent J. M. Cooper, with Manager B. A. Butler of the Chamber of Commerce in charge of arrangements. Pointing out that only 24 counties in Texas are producing Grade "A", Stockton said that top quality eggs are worth from \$2 to \$3.50 per case more than ordinary eggs. He said that Texas now produces more eggs than the state consumes; yet imports many carloads each year from Wisconsin and other northern states. The imported eggs are of the top grade.

Stockton gave background information on the work of other communities in egg production. At Dublin, top eggs are produced and purchased by a large grocery chain. A similar setup is working well in the Houston area. He covered methods of handling, storing, gathering, packing and selecting eggs for the market. Russell Glenn, who recently purchased the Cisco Ice Company and who distributes milk throughout West Texas, was present and addressed the meeting. He told the poultrymen that his company now is selling some 100 cases of eggs weekly -- eggs imported from Wisconsin -- and that they would like to buy 500 cases per week in the Cisco area for sale through his milk distribution system. Glenn added that his plans are to buy, grade, pack and pay for the eggs here. He said his market outlet was sufficient for any volume they could obtain. Grover Cleveland, farmer and rancher who lives northwest of Cisco, told the meeting that his 400 hens now are producing grade "A" eggs. He emphasized that what the poultrymen of the area have needed is a stable market.

Carl (Skeet) Wilson, Lake Cisco road poultryman, joined others in praising the efforts of the Chamber of Commerce to make available a dependable egg market. He believed the project would be of lasting and material benefit to area poultrymen. Manager Butler of the Chamber of Commerce told the meeting that Cisco business and civic leaders will do everything possible to make the egg project a reality. He said that Mr. Stockton or other egg specialists would return later for similar schools in the various communities surrounding Cisco.

The sale of 500 cases of eggs would put between \$6,000 and \$7,000 into the pockets of local poultrymen every week. Butler pointed out. "This would be a great benefit to the entire community in that it would make new business for various merchants as well as pay poultrymen a profit. "You can be sure that we will do everything possible to make this proposition a reality."

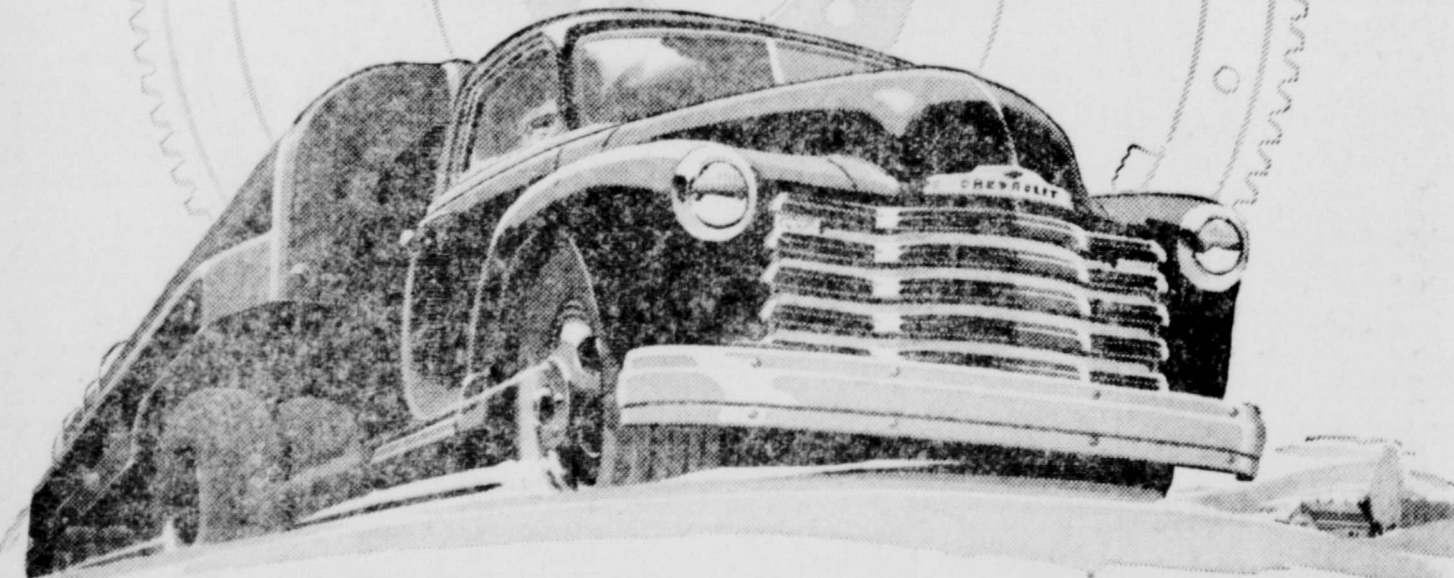
