The new dairy will be located approximately nine miles southeast of Friona. It will be a mile south of the "Blackburn corner," and west of the Farm to Market highway. It also is about seven miles south of Black.

The property is also known as the old Boggess place. It borders the Sam Mears

property. "It's beginning to come together. We have everything approved, and we hope to begin milking cows between November 1-15," Barnett said.

"Star Lites" by Bill Ellis IT ALMOST SLIPPED UP on me. As of June 1, Carol and I finished our 40th year of publishing newspapers in Parmer County. I guess you could call it "good timing." Having returned to this part of the country after

beginning my journalism career on the West Coast, it at first appeared useless after I had had a falling out with Larry Hall, then publisher of the Muleshoe Journal, which led to a parting of the ways.

While sitting in our rent house (which belonged to my uncle and aunt, Paul and Alice Whitecotton in the

Bailey County capital) we really hadn't begun to wonder yet about our future when the telephone rang.

It was W.H. Graham, Jr., who had formed a threenewspaper chain (Friona-Farwell-Bovina). "I have a job opening in Friona, and wondered if you might be interested," Graham told us. Divine providence?

The next day I drove to Friona to meet with Graham, and accepted the position as news editor of the Friona Star.

After about three days, Carol asked me "What do you think of Friona?" I answered "It isn't bad. It'll do 'till something better comes along." I guess it never did.

We did get some offers to move to larger places, but we enjoyed the hometown atmosphere here and decided to stay put.

Scarcely more than a year later, I became Managing Editor, after Graham exchanged his half-ownership of the Star to Joe Osborn for his half-interest in Plains Publishers.

The publishing business was keeping its press running well after dark, even in the summertime. The newfangled offset process gave community weeklies a bright, fresh look.

For several years, the newspapers produced at the Friona plant won the lion's share of awards all the way from the Panhandle Press to the Texas Press Assn. competition, until the rest of the world realized that Graham's notion, offset, was here to stay.

To further illustrate how our move to Parmer County was well-timed, in the fall of 1968, Osborn offered to sell the Star to Carol and me. We had saved up enough for a down

The long term news is not so positive, however, for the 21 employees of Hi-Pro Animal Health in Friona. Walco officials were in Friona this week discussing future options with current employees.

As of September 30, 2002, the Hi-Pro Animal Health administrative office will no longer be located in Friona. Employees that remain until September 30 are being offered an additional severance and

benefit package. The Hi-Pro operations will be transitioned to the Walco headquarters in Grapevine, Texas. Employees can apply for positions that may become available in other Walco stores.

Also, several Hi-Pro personnel will have the option of transferring to the Grapevine headquarters.

Officials emphasized that the Hi-Pro Animal Health store in Friona, and the other 11 Hi-Pro stores will remain open for business. For an unspecified period of time, the Hi-Pro stores will continue to operate under the Hi-Pro name. The Hi-Pro Animal Health operation evolved as Hi-Pro Feeds was being built in 1968. In calling on feedyards to provide feed, then Hi-Pro manager Ron Davenport found that a need for animal health products existed also. Hi-Pro entered the animal health market soon after and Hi-Pro Animal Health was founded in 1969. The feed mill and administration offices were destroyed in the June 2, 1995 tornado that smashed Friona. However, Friona Industries rebuilt the facility and the current office building, demonstrating a faith in the Friona area economy.

Hollman Charged In May Traffic Deaths

Francis Michael "Frank" Hollman, Jr., 45, of Friona was arrested last week in connection with a head-on collision May 11 that killed Amy Kilpatrick, 13, of Hereford, and her mother, Connie Ortiz, 39, of Friona.

They died on Highway 60 when their vehicle, driven by Kevin Ortiz, was hit head-on by Hollman near Summerfield in Deaf Smith County. DPS Troopers allege Hollman was driving east in the westbound lane and that alcohol was a factor in the fatal accident.


Friona police officers arrested Hollman Thursday, May 30, and took him to Deaf Smith County where he was charged with two counts of manslaughter, a second

degree felony. Bond was set at \$5,000 on each count.

A second degree felony carries a penalty of 2-20 years in jail and up to a \$10,000 fine. Sgt. Ben Urbanczyk of the Hereford DPS office, who is in charge of the DPS District Accident Team, said the case will be presented to the Deaf Smith County grand jury set to convene on June 20.

At press time, Hollman remained in jail in Deaf Smith County.

These past few years of graduation here at Friona have brought back so many memories of my "very special time."

High school for me was different from what local students experience. First of all, school in New England never started until after Labor Day (which has always been the first Monday of September).

I had already graduated from Notre Dame Parochial School in my hometown of North Adams, Mass. This was in mid-June of 1941.

That whole summer, my mother and I worked on filling my trunk, as I was already enrolled at Saint Anne's Academy in Marlborough, Mass., about 150 miles from home.

So, on Labor Day, 1941, my Mom and Dad and my only sibling, my brother Art, drove to Marlborough. My trunk had already been shipped ahead of time.

We were welcomed by the "Sisters," and I was shown where the refectory (dining room) was located. We went to chapel, and my parents visited with some of the nuns who had been their teachers years earlier. Then my folks went home.

the finest education, in both French and English classes, that anyone could possibly have.

1945 was my graduation year, always held in mid-June. Early that spring I was given the great honor of being "Bernadette" in an operetta which the school presented. It was presented entirely in French.

I practiced a lot, and late one night after a long rehearsal, I went up to my room and prepared for bed. My friends had made me a "pie bed." Texans may call this being "short sheeted." I was so exhausted, I slept on in the Pacific, and it was graduation time.

Every year the junior class would give a party for the senior class. This was about a week before our "Big Day." We had no prom--no sports banquets, etc., but what we did have was great fun!

Following a musical program, games, etc., a big cake was brought out for us with punch and ice cream.

Our class president went up to cut the cake, and the cake knife would not penetrate the cake! They had covered a big square card-board box with whipped soap flakes. When the real cake came out, it was delicious.

My friend, Ernestine, was the class valedictorian and I was the salutatorian. She gave her speech in French. Mine was in English.

My aunt (Mom's oldest sister), Sister Mary Corona, presented me my diploma. Mom, Dad and Art were seated right behind her.

What a moment! There was a lot of hugging and crying, and leaving for all parts of New England. I don't know why--maybe because of World War II through our four years of school, but we never got together again. That is sad, because we were a great class.

I did find one of my "pals" about two years ago, and for that I am grateful.

Registration forms are available to be picked up at the high school or junior high office, or from Coach Jeff Isom at 406 W. 14th.



V'Lesha Wilcox Diagnosed With Myasthenia Gravis

Next Tuesday, at Covenant Hospital in Lubbock, 16year-old V'Lesha Wilcox of Friona will continue her battle against a disease most of us have never heard of.

It is called Myasthenia Gravis (MG). It is an autoimmune neuromuscular disorder characterized by fluctuating weakness of voluntary muscle groups.

The symptoms, many of which V'Lesha has experienced, include double vision, slurred speech, problems chewing or swallowing, choking, trouble walking and feeling short of breath. VⁱLesha, daughter of Varla and Terry Wilcox, was a sophomore member on the Squaws varsity basketball team last year when her MG was discovered. She began to have vision problems and weakened muscles which kept



Ironically, June is designated as Myasthenia Gravis Awareness Month. The National Spokesperson for MGFA, Inc. is Suzanne Rogers.

Many know Ms. Rogers as: Maggie Horton on "Days of Our Lives", a character she has portrayed since 1973. She was diagnosed with MG in 1984 and was able to have her condition incorporated into the story line of the show, raising awareness to a world-wide market. We're sure the family would appreciate yor thoughts and prayers for a speedy recovery as V'Lesha has her operation Tuesday.

This was an all-girls school, and I'm sure most of them (us) had never left home before, because there was "A whole lot of crying going on!"

I was shown where my trunk would be (up in the attic). Incidentally, the trunk I was using had been my mother's when she was in boarding school, after her mother died. I made my bed and joined the crying.

I could go on and on, through each year of high school, which was actually wonderful--the four best years of my life.

The one major catastrophe during that time was the "Day of Infamy," at Pearl Harbor, December 7, 1941.

We were not too far away from Boston, a major "Navy Yard-seaport." In just a matter of days, our dormitory windows were covered with black-out curtains.

The school yards looked out over the Boston Post-Road, and it wasn't too long before the Army caravans were rumbling through.

However, the Sisters did their very best to keep our schooling on an "even keel."

But, this was supposed to be about my graduation. I will tell you that I received top of the bed.

By the way, the operetta was a tremendous success.

Our final exams were held in May, so the seniors had free time, to practice, play or rest. One lovely day, we walked to a place not far from school for a picnic lunch, held under the trees near a clear babbling brook.

One of my classmates, Ernestine Lemire (isn't that a nice French name!) and 1 asked our Sister if we could walk up the brook a "ways." She gave us permission. We found a spot where we took off our long black stockings and waded in the brook.

In a little while, we heard our names being called, so I grabbed some big green leaves to dry my feet. What a mess! The leaves turned out to be skunk cabbage, and that's what it smelled like! Of course all of us moved quickly out of that area. We never knew that there wasn't a real skunk.

About this time our president, Franklin Delano Roosevelt had died, during his fourth term. Harry S. Truman was sworn in as our new president.

The Germans had surrendered, and all attention was focused on winning the war

The first time I was able to go back to New England (1977), after having moved to California, my husband and I went to see

L'Academie Ste. Anne. It seems that all of the Catholic sisters had left New England, sometime in the 1960s. The City of Marlborough had bought the building, and turned it into a seniors' home.
