



Reports here said the well was bottomed at 3,558 feet in the Ellenberger lime. Pipe was cemented to 3,527 feet. The well was treated with acid Friday and oil and gas were reported to have appeared in swabbing operations early Saturday morning.

No information was available on the quantity of oil and gas present. The well is located near Spencer's big peach orchard in that area





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
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
