Hart And Tucker Appear Elected In Primary

Tucker Has Lead Of 77 Votes With Four Boxes Out

John S. Hart held a commanding lead in the county judge's race and J. Frank Tucker appeared to be a narrow margin victor in the sheriff's race in the democratic second primary election in Eastland County Saturday.

Complete returns from 22 of the county's 26 voting boxes at 9 p. m. Saturday gave the results as follows:

Boxes to be heard from were Alameda, Soranton, Dothan, and Tudor. County officials said the votes from the four boxes totaled 120 in the first primary, and the general opinion was that the results would be unchanged.

Cisco cast 758 votes at the fire station and 250 at the East Ward School. This was compared with 1,173 and 304 on July 22.

In Cisco, John Hart led the ticket for county judge, receiving 604 votes to 374 for Judge Crossley. Mr. Tucker received 658 votes to Sheriff Williams' 348.

Eastland County Wheat Allotment Is Made Public

The Eastland County wheat allotment for the coming year will be some 700 acres larger than the preceding year, according to an announcement by the PMA this week. The new allotment has been set at 9,816 acres and the increase is a result of adjustments in individual farm allotments.

The county allotment is apportioned among farms within the county on a basis of tillable acres, crop rotation practices, type of soil and topography and the allotments are made to allow each grower a fair share of the needed crop. A small part of the allotment is available to farms on which wheat was not planted during the past three years.

Notes on individual allotments for the 1951 crop were being sent to growers throughout the county this week, it was reported. Any questions regarding the allotment should be directed to the county PMA Committee at the earliest opportunity.

Rocks Bearing Treaty Exhibited

AUSTIN, August 25 — Visitors to Texas Memorial Museum at the University of Texas will soon be able to see two rocks bearing records of an 1850 peace treaty between seven Indian tribes and the U. S. Government, Museum Director E. H. Sellards announced here today.

Donated by Guy E. Risien and Leon Longley of San Saba, the rocks are symbols of the Indians' and white men's attempt to settle grievances and end hostilities in Texas. Soldiers, commanded by Maj. H. W. Merrill, left Ft. Martin Scott at Fredericksburg and met representatives of the Indian tribes in San Saba County near Spring Creek, now known as Wallace Creek.

There the treaty was signed Dec. 10, 1850. Two rocks were engraved with the names of the tribes, and of Merrill and J. H. Rollins, representing the U. S. The treaty was published in San Antonio and the stones set up at the place of parley.

Lobos in Good Condition After 2 Weeks Work

The Cisco High School Lobos rounded out the first two weeks of training for the 1950 football season with no more serious injuries than a few cuts and bruises, according to Coaches Overall and Everett.

The entire squad was shaping up good in preparation for the first game with Nocoona on Sept. 8 and by the opening date the coaches hoped to have a smooth-working eleven to go on the field.

In scrimmage with Albany on Thursday, the team showed improvement over the first workout with the Shackelford County eleven the week before.

The coaches were spending more time trying to build up their reserve strength and a few of the boys up from the "B" team and Junior High were beginning to show more promise.

Part of County Quarantined In Anthrax Control

An area of between 12,000 and 15,000 acres of Eastland County ranch land north of Eastland and Ranger — the northeast part of the county — was under quarantine Saturday, after the death of three head of cattle had been due to anthrax.

The quarantine was ordered by the Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission to prevent spreading of the disease. E. V. Slover of Eastland is inspector for the commission in this region.

All livestock in the affected area have been vaccinated against anthrax. The quarantine was ordered for the ranches on which the cattle died and on adjoining ranches. The first case was reported on a ranch owned by Pete Kiener, one mile northeast of Ranger. Last week, two cows owned by G. W. Thorpe, who resides north of Eastland, died from the disease.

Dr. A. J. Lewis, Lubbock, veterinarian for the livestock agency, was in the county assisting Mr. Slover with the inoculation program. He said that anthrax proves fatal to livestock in almost 100% of the cases.

No connection was seen between the Eastland County cases and the recent outbreak of anthrax near Paris.

Mission Institute Is Being Held For Methodist Group

GEORGETOWN, August 23.—The fourth annual Missionary Institute of the Women's Society of Christian Service is currently in session of the campus of Southwestern University this week. The Central Texas Conference W. S. C. S. of the Methodist Church is using for their theme of study, "We Seek Him Together."

Approximately 160 women from over the central part of the state are enrolled in the various courses being offered such as "Toward a Christian Community," the "Near East," "A Christian's vocation," and "Corporate Worship."

The worth of the Mission School has been proven many fold by the increased interest and participation and growing number of prospective delegates. Since the first conference four years ago when the attendance was under 100, the enrollment has had to be restricted to 160 in order that adequate teaching facilities might be enjoyed by all.

This conference is the conclusion of seven held on the Southwestern campus during the past summer.

Oil Prospect Is Seen for Area South of Cisco

Prospects were reported as being bright Saturday for the completion of a flowing oil well in the area some 12 miles southeast of Cisco. The new prospect was Stefka and Chandler's No. 1 Bob Harper, a deep wildcat test.

Reports here said the well was bottomed at 3,558 feet in the Ellenberger lime. Pipe was cemented to 3,527 feet. The well was treated with acid Friday and oil and gas were reported to have appeared in swabbing operations early Saturday morning.

No information was available on the quantity of oil and gas present. The well is located near Spencer's big peach orchard in that area.

Latch at 3,448 Ft.

Just west of Cisco, McElroy Ranch Company's No. 1 Lela Latch was drilling at 3,448 feet at noon Saturday. The drill bit had just gone through the Caddo lime. While slight shows were reported in the Caddo, oil men doubted that completion in that formation would be possible.

Biggest hope apparently was for a good formation of the Lake Eastland sand to show up just under the Caddo at about 3,460 feet. The permit calls for an Ellenberger test.

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THE MESQUITE PROGRAM

Charles E. Fisher, one of Texas' outstanding scientists in the eradication and control of brush on farms and ranches, Sept. 1 will become superintendent of Texas agricultural experiment substation at Spur. He has been acting superintendent since the death July 26 of Ray E. Dickson, who had headed the Spur station work since 1914.

Director R. D. Lewis of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, said Dickson for several years had been training Fisher to become his successor.

After two years in soils work with the Main Station at College Station, Fisher went to Spur July 1, 1936, to assist with soil conservation work and agronomic investigations.

Early work done on mesquite under Fisher's supervision at the Spur station and on nearby Rolling Plains ranches was largely responsible for making this field unit the center of present mes-

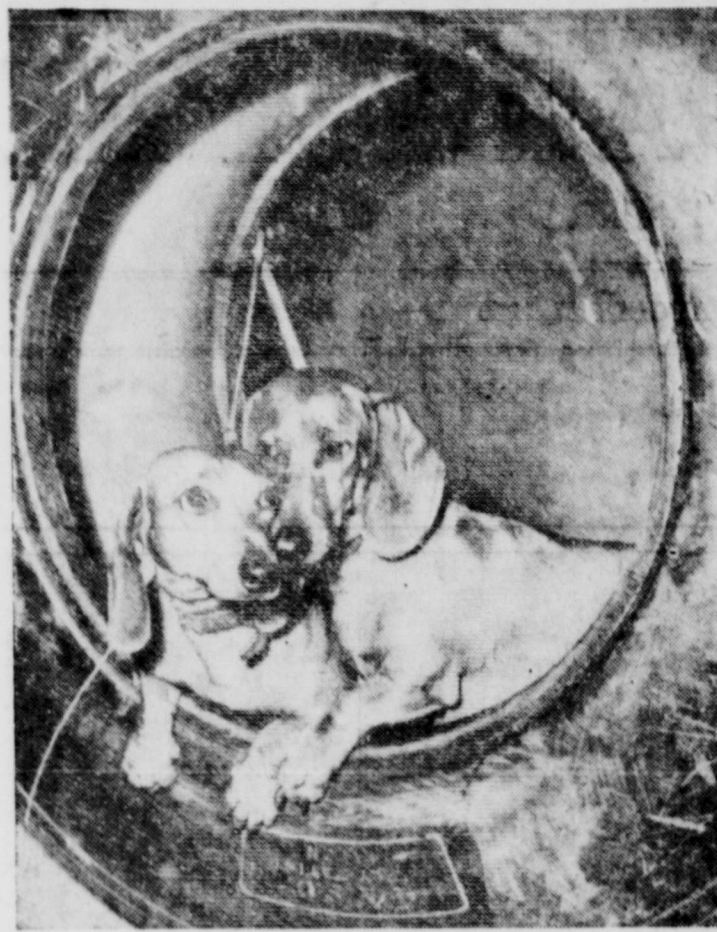
quite control studies, Lewis said. These studies are coordinated with the overall Texas brush control work conducted through the Department of Range and Forestry.

Mesquite is by far the most widespread brush in Texas. It occurs in varying degree of density on about 55 million of a total of 93.5 million acres of potential rangeland. Fisher already has obtained far-reaching results in the control of mesquite with formulations of the hormone-type chemicals, 2, 4-D and 2, 4, 5-T, Lewis said.

Fisher is the author or co-author of many reports on various phases of brush eradication, soil and water conservation, and cattle grazing and fattening investigations being conducted at Spur.

A native of Cuba, Kansas, Fisher graduated from Kansas State College in 1934, with major studies in agronomy and soils. He completed the requirements in 1936 for a master's degree in agronomy from the Texas A&M College.

All West Texas can hope that Fisher's work at Spur will point the way toward eradication of the mesquite, which threatens much valuable grass land. Further success in this program is a very important project in which every land owner should be genuinely interested.

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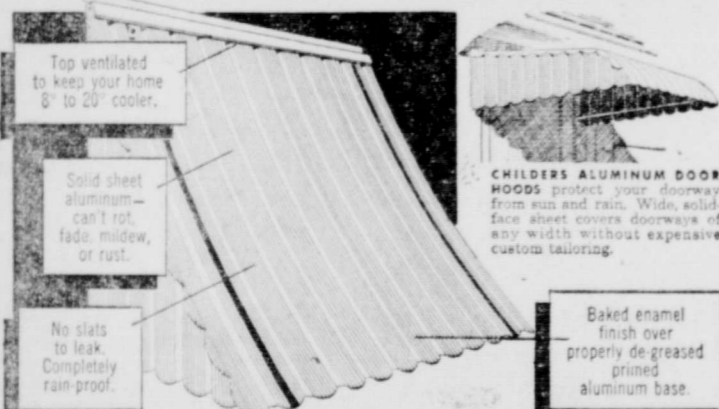
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
