FIRST BAPTISTS NAME PULPIT GROUP; REVIVAL MEETING ENDS

Members of the First Baptist Church had elected a pulpit committee today to select a successor for Rev. Otis Strickland, whose resignation became effective with the closing of the annual summer revival meeting Sunday night.

Rev. Strickland submitted his resignation to accept a position as president of Decatur Baptist College, the oldest junior college in the nation and the only junior college supported by the Southern Baptist Convention.

Chairman F. E. Shepard of the church's board of deacons was named chairman of the pulpit committee. Members of the body are Wesley Smith, Leo F. Keelan, Jay Richardson and M. F. Underwood.

The revival meeting, which closed Sunday night, was termed by church leaders as successful from all standpoints. Mr. Strickland, here some four years, led preaching services twice daily with Rev. Joe Trussell, Houston, directing the singing.

Results of the meeting were 22 additions by baptism, 12 by letter, 10 rededications, 1 volunteer for special service, and two conversions without baptism.

Rev. and Mrs. Strickland were presented with a combination radio and record player and a floor lamp as a going-away present. Mr. Strickland's Sunday School Class presented him with luggage Sunday morning.

Mr. Strickland went to Decatur today to make arrangements to move his family and household to that city this week.

Until a new pastor is selected, Rev. Charles Jones, assistant pastor and music director, will occupy the pulpit and direct the work of the church.

Bankline Brings In No. 6 Owens; No. 5 At 2,598

A potential test was being run today on Bankline Oil Company's No. 6 Briggs Owens in the new Lake sand pool five miles north-east of Cisco. The well was treated with hydrafrac over the weekend and was being completed today.

Although no figures were available it was understood that the No. 6 would be a good flowing well.

Nearby, Crossman and Savage No. 1 Perdue was being cleaned out for casing perforation and the hydrafrac treatment. Earlier tests had indicated prospects for another outstanding well for the new field.

In the same area, Bankline Oil Company's No. 5 Owens was drilling at 2,598 feet today. The pay horizon is about 3,300 feet in the area.

Just west of Cisco, the McElroy Ranch Company No. 1 Lela Latch was drilling at 3,730 feet today. According to reports, a gas show was picked up in the Lake Sand. It was understood that in the vicinity of the Lake Sand, a porous formation was encountered and operations were shut-down for a time due to loss of drilling mud.

The Latch is due to test the Ellenberger lime, schedule for around 4,000 feet.

The Gay Philosopher

Dear Gay Philosopher:

Just recently my father, Lee Lieske, had the Cisco Daily Press sent to us here in the Panama Canal Zone. I can truly say that I have never enjoyed the home town paper so much. There are always bits of news about friends and neighbors which we enjoy. The papers arrive once a week by boat. They are usually ten days or two weeks old when we get them, but nevertheless, they are always welcome.

Before coming to Panama, I expected to find a very hot climate, but was surprised to find a moderately warm climate, with wonderfully cool nights. We have no winter or fall or spring here at all. But we do have summer all the time. July the Fourth and Christmas are the same temperature. In fact, parts of our living quarters have no windows — just the screens.

We live 20 miles from the Pacific Ocean and 30 miles from the Atlantic — high in the hills completely surrounded by thick, dense jungle. There are wild animals of all kinds living in these jungles, such as monkeys, tapirs, deer, jaguar, sloths, panthers, alligators, anteaters, snakes and others.

Quit often large boa constrictors are killed in the nearby area. Only this morning, a very poisonous coral snake was killed a few blocks from our living quarters.

Looking out from our living room windows, we have one of the most beautiful scenes one could find any place. We call it our "million dollar" view. About 30 yards from our front door, the yard suddenly drops 20 or 30 feet to the Chagres River, spreading out for miles like a huge lake, then across the river are mountains covered with the usual lush, thick, green jungle.

The trees are always full of beautiful birds of all descriptions. There are many, many parakeets and they certainly can make a lot of noise when they all get together in the late evening.

Just now, we are having our rainy season. It has been raining every afternoon, and some mornings, since about May 1, and will continue to rain until mid-December. Then we have our dry season, which I think is wonderful. The trade winds blow all during dry season and the moon seems bigger and brighter than at any other time. It is then that the flowers begin to bloom. Almost every tree becomes a mass of gorgeous blossoms of all colors. The shrubs and smaller plants also bloom at this time, which makes a very pretty sight indeed.

I could go on and on telling about all the interesting things which we have seen in Panama and the Canal Zone, especially the canal.

It is very interesting to watch the ships going through the canal. An average of 20 ships a day transit the canal. There are three sets of locks within the canal; they are used for raising or lowering the ships to certain water levels, depending on the direction in which the ship is traveling. It takes approximately eight hours for a ship to pass through the entire canal.

This is truly the crossroads of the world, for ships from practically every country transit the Panama Canal.

Our three children have certainly thrived in this tropical climate and are very healthy. They are out of doors all the time and can go swimming the year round.

In spite of this being a very interesting place to see and live, we prefer to live in the states. The U. S. government controls everything in the Canal Zone, and, although it is well supervised and efficiently run, it is not as nice as having your own stores, homes, businesses, family doctors, etc.

So thanks for giving me a bit of space in your column. I hope this will be of some interest to you.

Doctors at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene reported that the boy received burns about the face, chest and arms.

The accident occurred about 3:45 p. m. Monday when the boys father accidentally tossed a bucket of flaming gasoline on his body while attempting to prime a staid car Clad in a sun suit, the tot had been playing about the Westel Garage, 1009 Oak St., when he received the injuries.

Physicians stated that although 30 per cent of the child's body was covered with burns, they still had hopes for his recovery.

NO LONGER A POLICE ACTION

As everyone realizes by now the conflict in Korea is no longer a police action. It is war and according to those charged with the responsibility of conducting it, a major effort in terms of men will be required of the United States and her allies to win. At present the planners estimate we will need 10 to 15 fighting divisions, 150,000 or more troops, a year's time and masses of war material. Moreover, in the background is the incalculable threat of Russian inspired aggression breaking out elsewhere.

In the meantime domestic problems gather momentum along with mobilization. The old story of rising prices and wages is going through its paces. Living cost on June 15 — just before the war in Korea — on the basis of the U. S. Bureau of Labor Statistics consumer price index, stood at 170.2 per cent of the 1935-39 level. By the middle of July those costs were at about 172 in the index. Now, after still more increases, they are at the highest level in history. Inflation is no longer a spectre. It is a reality. The fact that it was in evitable does not lessen its threat to the American system and the freedom of the people. The costly necessities of military defense piled on top of an incredibly extravagant peacetime governmental structure are hitting hard

where it hurts most — in the household pocketbook. The currency in that pocketbook is losing its value. Pressure is rising for Congress to do something. But even among the best informed there is basis disagreement as to the best course to follow. Bernard Baruch, who in his eighteenth year has become known as America's elder statesman and who has been the respected advisor to presidents and congresses for more than a quarter of a century, believes only by immediate imposition of all cut controls with taxes "higher than a cat's back" can the war effort be effective and the future liberty of the people secured. Before a congressional committee he demanded: "An overall ceiling across the entire economy, over all prices, wages, rent, fees and so on, with high enough taxes to prevent profiteering and to pay all defense costs, and an all-embracing, effective system of priorities."

vastly different views. Henry Hazlitt, leading economist and commentator writes: "The Administration's real duty now is not to start dictating prices and wages but to halt its own inflationary policies. It must ruthlessly slash needless non-military expenditures. Senator Byrd, in an itemized statement, has estimated that the whole appropriation of \$10,500,000,000 that the President requested could be taken out of the present nonmilitary budget. . . . The government must stop holding prices of food-stuffs artificially; it must stop financing an inflationary housing boom; it must stop subsidizing an inflationary export boom. It must stop its inflationary government bond-pegging policy; it must stop its inflationary low-interest rates. . . . If such steps are taken we need not fear inflation, and we will get the all-out production that only free markets and a free economy can provide."

Regardless of whom you may agree with, one thing should be kept in mind — the first responsibility of every American citizen is the perpetuation of individual liberty and our representative form of government. The primary objective must always remain ahead of personal comfort and security, for the civilians, as well as for the troops in the front lines.

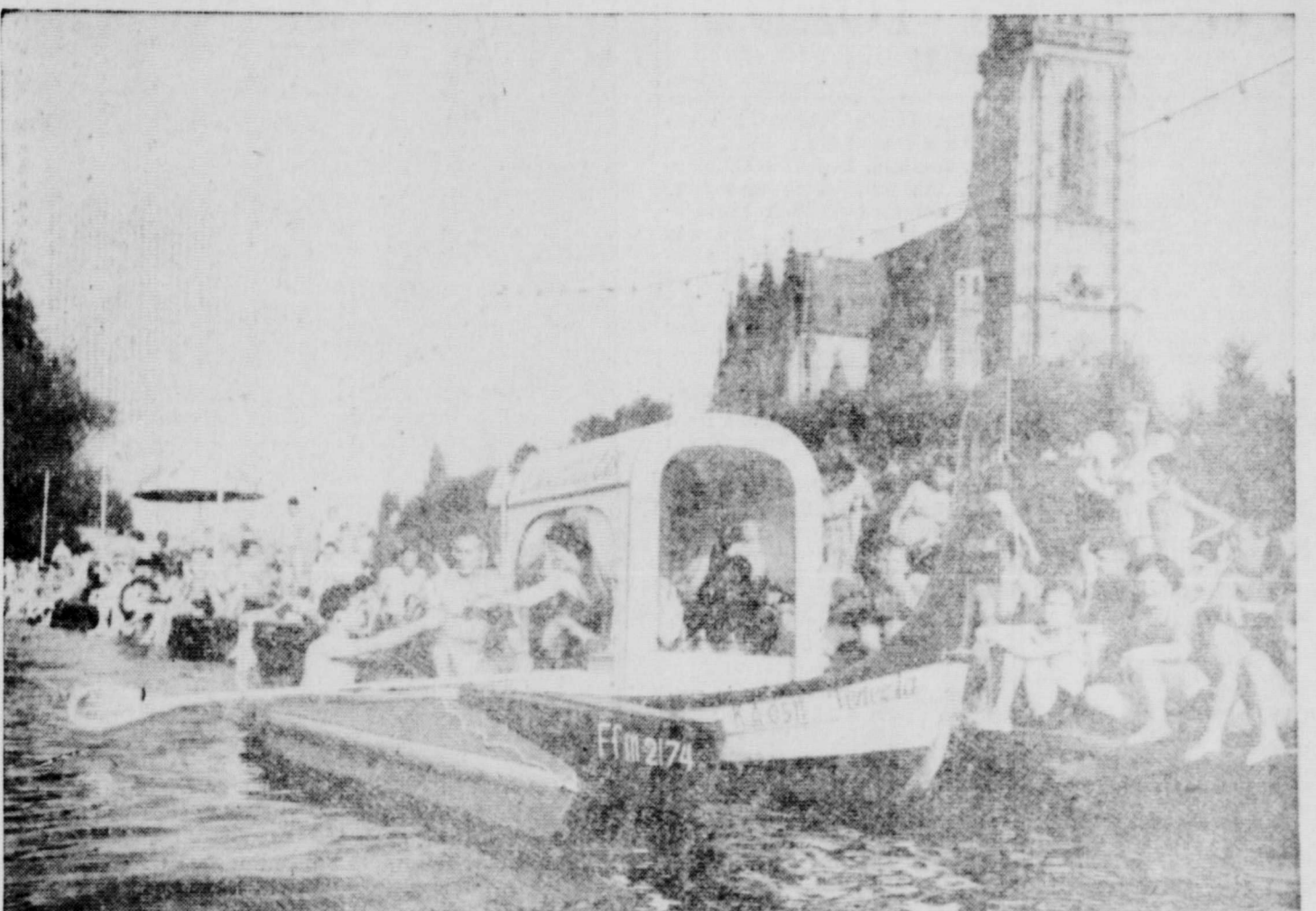

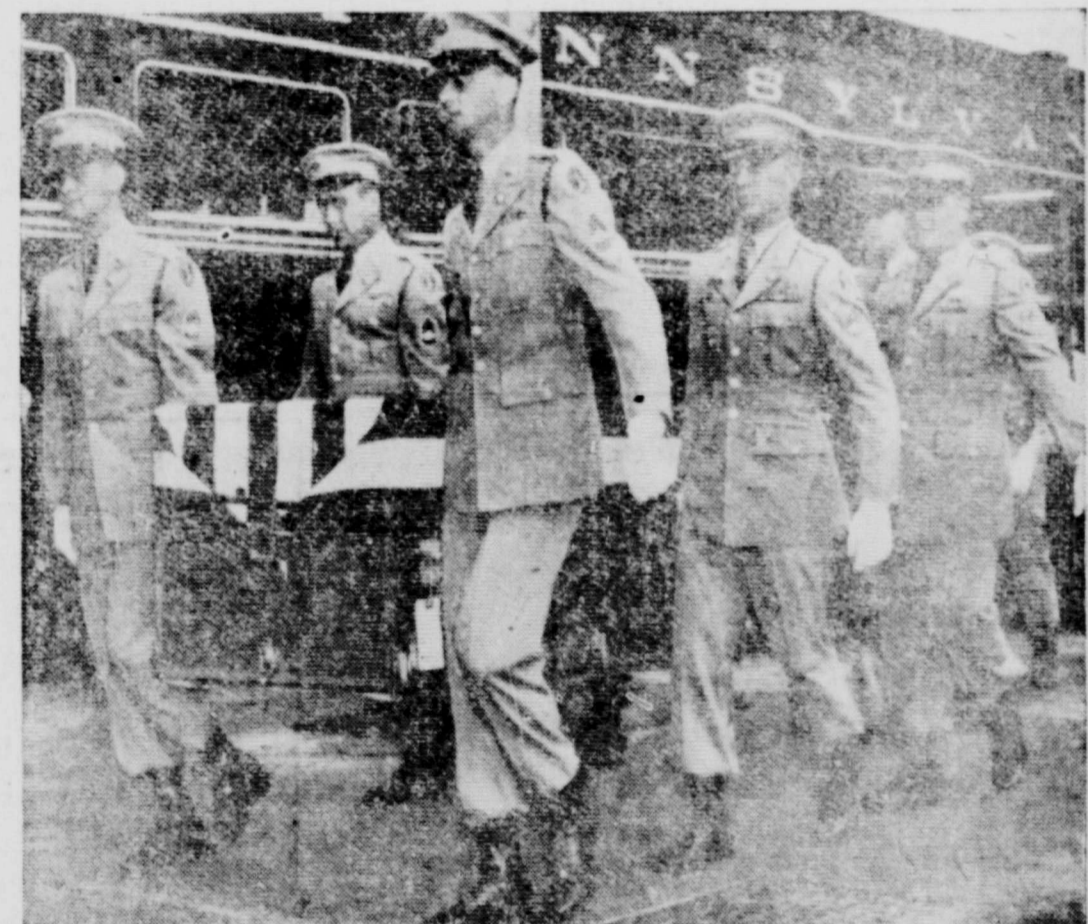

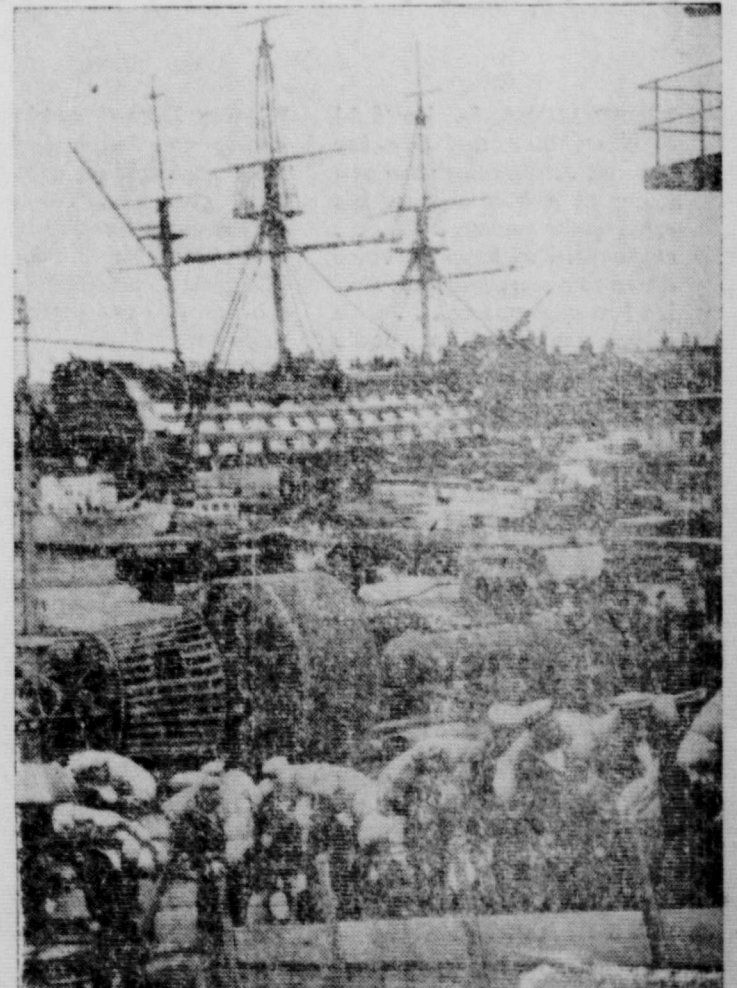

KITCHEN MEMO BY JEAN CLARKE

COMPLETE oven meals cook automatically while the cook is out of the kitchen. An automatic clock control turns the gas on and off at whatever time you decide. A hearty oven meal with all dishes baking at the same time and temperature of 350° F. for 1½ hours includes Stuffed Pork Chops, Succotash, Sweet Potato Pudding and a Cherry Cobbler for dessert. **Sweet Potato Pudding:** mix 2 beaten eggs, ½ cup sugar, 1 cup milk. Add to 2½ cups grated raw sweet potato. Then add 1 tsp. nutmeg, 2 tbsps. butter, ½ orange, sliced thin. **Succotash:** mix together 1 cup canned corn, 1 cup canned or cooked lima beans, 1 cup canned tomatoes, 1 tsp. salt, 1 tbsps. minced onion, ½ cup liquid from vegetables, 3 tbsps. butter. Cover both dishes before sliding into the oven with the Pork Chops and Cherry Cobbler.

Keep cooked rice in covered container in your gas refrigerator. Handy for stuffed peppers, rice puffs, any fruit desserts using rice.

It saves time and gas to separate light weight fabrics from heavier clothes when drying them in the automatic gas dryer because the lighter laundry dries faster.

Cheese keeps fresh longer if it's wrapped in cloth that has been sprinkled with vinegar, dipped in water and wrung out. When cloth dries out, repeat vinegar and water treatment.

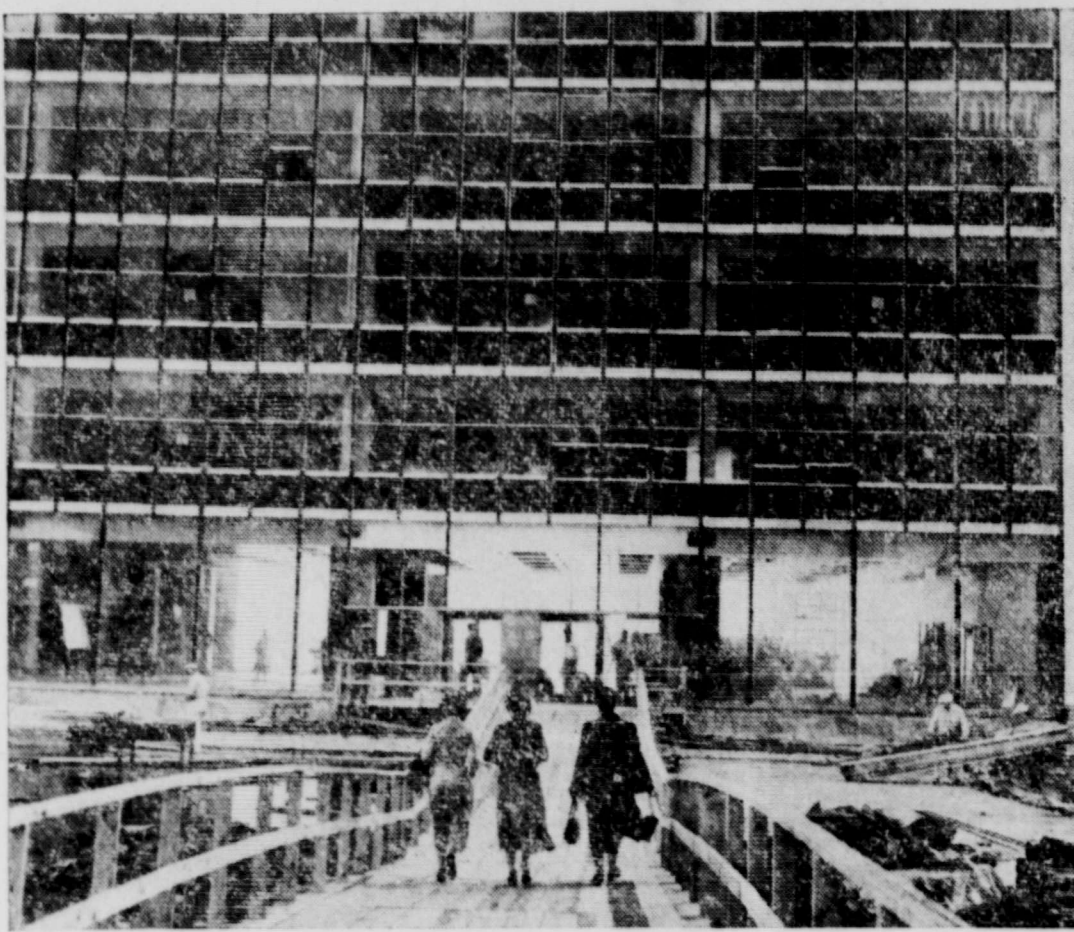
