### The Gay Philosopher By J. W. S.

Dear Gay Philosopher:

Just recently my father, Lee Lieske, had the Cisco Daily Press sent to us here in the Panama Canal Zone. I can truly say that I have never enjoyed the home town paper so much. There are always bits of news about friends and neighbors which we enjoy. The papers arrive once a week by boat. They are usually ten days or two weeks old when we get them, but nevertheless, they are always welcome.

Before coming to Panama, I expected to find a very hot climate, but was surprised to find a moderately warm climate, with wonderfully cool nights. We have no winter or fall or spring here at all. But we do have summer all the time. July the Fourth and Christmas are the same temperature. In fact, parts of our living quarters have no windows - just the screens.

We live 20 miles from the Pacific Ocean and 30 miles from the Atlantic - high in the hills completely surrounded by thick, dense jungle. There are wild animals of all kinds living in these jungles, such as monkeys, tapirs, deer, jaguar, sloths, panthers, alligators, anteaters, snakes and

Quit often large boa constrictors are killed in the nearby area. Only this morning, a very poisonous coral snake was killed a few blocks from our living quarters.

There are three sets of locks within the canal; they are used for raising or lowering the ships to certain water levels, depending on the direction in which the ship is traveling. It takes approximately eight hours for a ship to pass through the entire canal.

This is truly the crossroads of the world, for ships from practically every country transit the Panama Canal.

Eastland County's voting boxes indicated today that J. Frank Tucker was the winner by 109 votes over incumbent J. B. Williams in the sheriff's runoff in Saturday's second primary election. The vote was 2,740 to 2,631. In the county judge's race, the

only other contest on the countv-wide ballot, John B. Hart was the apparent winner over incumbent P. L. Crossley by a margin of 741 votes. The unofficial count was 3,062 to 2,321

The official vote will be determined when returns of the election are canvassed in the early future by the county commissioner's court. The county cast some 5,-400 votes in the primary, and this was regarded as a comparatively heavy vote for a runoff

In the Eastland county commissioners' runoff, Ed Castleberry received 1,5,16 votes over Henry Davenport's 1,154 votes

### Ranger Tot Is In Serious Condition From Severe Burns

Four-year-old Clyde Fisher, son of Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Fisher of Ranger, was in serious condition Monday night, suffering with what was believed to be third degree burns.

Doctors at Hendrick Memorial Hospital in Abilene reported that the boy received burns about the face, chest and arms.

The accident occured about 3:45 p. m. Monday when the boys father accidently tossed a bucket of flaming gasoline on his body while attempting to prime a stailed car. Clad in a sun suit, the tot had been playing about the Westel Garage, 1009 Oak St., when he received the injuries.

Physicians stated that although 30 per cent of the child's body was covered with burns, they still had hopes for his recovery.


