days, seven days a week! What's more, this sum is spent ully controlled means. It is spent out of more than 230 separate, disconnected checking acounts. Many of these accounts ere earmarked for special purposes and no other purposes. Thus, if some accounts should have a surplus while other accounts are exhausted, more taxes nust be raised to replinish the exhausted accounts. That's silly, know. But, that's how it is.

We know that a new structure of efficiency and economical pubic service, provided through inelligent taxation, cannot be erected without the public's understanding of its need.

The people of Texas, through this series of newspaper articles, through public discussion and lebate, through their local branches of the Economy Commisson, will be advised of and take part in every stage of the Econmy Commission's work. If you don't like a certain recommenlation that has been submitted to you, and if you come up with better suggestion, the substiution can be made.

Then, the revised recommendations will truly be your recommendation. You will know what s needed. The Legislature will know what you want, and you, by your own effort and understanding, will succeed.
