## The Gay Philosopher

DROVE OUT the new Highway 80 to Baird the other day. And it is a beautiful road, indeed. Something we can't understand is the fact that the Callahan County part of the road is some eight feet wider than the Eastland County section. Guess there's a reason for it, however.

THERE WAS ONE thing that made our blood boil. A big truck, obviously overloaded, lumbered down the new road, leaving its ruts in the brand-new pavement. You can still see the marks of the truck's wheels. The state law says that trucks can't carry a load in excess of 18,000 pounds per wheel or axle. If a truck violates the law and gets caught — there were some 650 truckers caught with overloads last month in Texas — it pays a fine of some \$35. But the revenue from the overload makes his trip worthwhile, regardless of the fact that he has to pay a fine.

THESE OVERLOADED trucks are costing you and other automobile drivers big money in taxes. Auto traffic wouldn't wear a highway out in 25 years. But overloaded trucks can wear them out in a few months. This problem is not local by any means. It's a nationwide problem.

AS FAR AS we can see, there are two possible solutions to the problem. The various states can pass a law that will have enough teeth to make truckers respect the highway weight limits. Or they could make the truck operators do what the railroads have done — build their own roads.

THE RAILROADS have had their own roads from the beginning. They do as they please about the weight they haul, because they aren't hurting the public by running overloaded trains.

If the truckers who insist on hauling overloads would build their own highways, they could tear them up as fast as they wanted to. But until they do — or until they comply with every letter of the law — we believe every man who owns an automobile or who pays highway taxes has a duty and a responsibility to stand up and yell.

THE TRUCK we saw with the obvious overload had an out-of-state license. As a general rule, the overloaded trucks are the huge vehicles with some 14 tires.

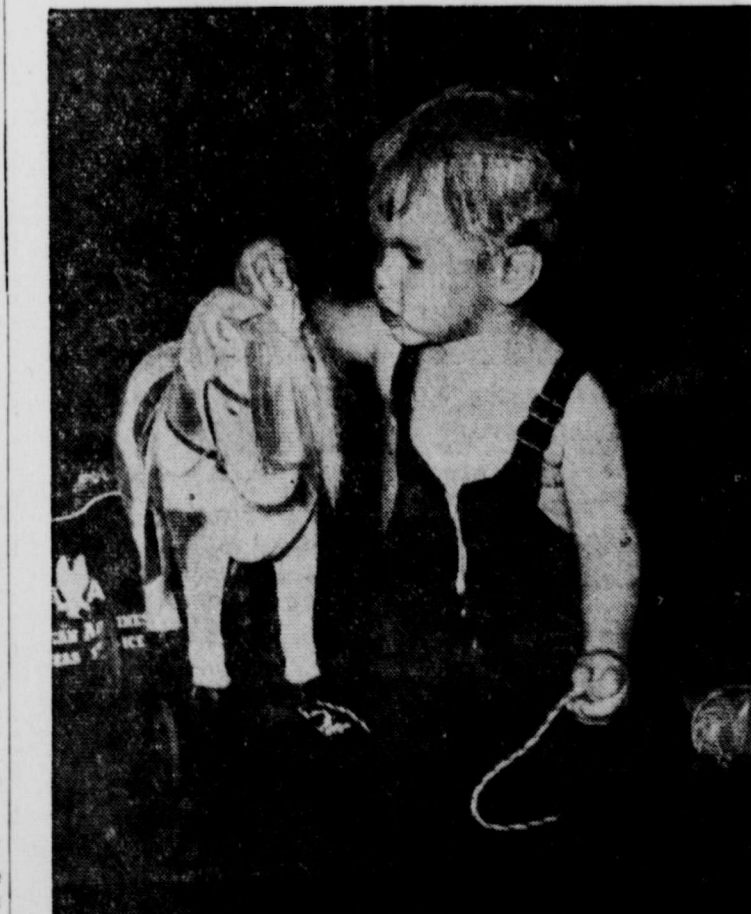

## B. Reagan Dies At Big Spring

Burney Reagan, 82, pioneer banker, educator and civic leader, died Monday at his home in Big Spring, and funeral services were to be held there at 3 p. m. Tuesday. He was the brother of Will Reagan and Mrs. J. E. Elkins of Cisco.

He was a native of Lancaster, Dallas County, and went to Big Spring in 1898. He drafted the first curriculum for the Big Spring Independent School District in 1901, organized the first Boy Scout troop there, and served as postmaster for five years. He was prominent in Chamber of Commerce work. He was prominent in banking circles.

## Lions Crippled Children's Plan Will Be Started

AUSTIN, Sept. 26 — A membership campaign for the Texas Lions League for Crippled Children will be launched here Thursday, Sept. 28 at 4:30 p. m. with a statewide broadcast over the Lone Star Chain.

Gov. Allan Shivers and International Lions President Herb Peary of Carrizo Springs will be the principal speakers. There will be other Lions Club dignitaries on hand for the occasion, including Jack Wiech, Brownsville attorney, who is president of the League.

The 30-minute program will be broadcast from the studios of station KTBC here.

Lions Club presidents in Texas have been urged to notify their club members to hear this official launching of a program which is being sponsored by the state's 35,000 Lions. Goal for the campaign is \$500,000.

The Texas Lions League for Crippled Children is a state-wide non-profit organization, representing the state's 621 Lions clubs. It was created for the purpose of establishing and maintaining a rehabilitation camp at Legion, near Kerrville, for the state's crippled children. It will be open to crippled children from the ages of 7 to 16. There will be no admission fee, all costs and expenses to be borne by the League.

This will be the first camp of its kind in the state of Texas, and present plans call for its opening during the summer of 1951.

## Radar Specialists To Be Employed

Age limits will be waived for persons entitled to veterans preference.

FOR ESSENTIAL PUBLIC SERVICE

BY MRS. CHARLEY WARD State Vice-Chairman Texas Economy Commission

(Editor's Note: This is the third in a series of articles on the Texas Economy Commission.)

The Texas state government needs to be reorganized to bring spending of tax money down to the level of essential public service.

The government needs to be reorganized so that this service can be rendered effectively and economically.

You learned these two basic facts in earlier articles in this series.

You also learned that the Economy Commission plans to enlist the advice, criticism, and labor of every thinking Texan in its work. The reason is simple: Without public understanding of the need for reform in our government, there can be no reform. Only with an informed public behind it will the legislature take practical action.

Here is how the Texas Economy Commission is bringing citizens into the picture:

The original 600 members of the TEC were appointed by Gov. Allan Shivers to sponsor a program of intricate research into every phase of the 200 agencies that make up the government of Texas. These 600 citizens are headed by a board of directors, one from each of the 31 state Senatorial Districts, and nine at lar-

The top officers of the TEC are John Redditt of Lufkin, chairman; the writer, Mrs. Charley Ward of Louise, vice-chairman; John Ben Shepperd of Gladewater, secretary; and E. P. Cravens of Austin, treasurer.

Each director of a district sees to it that every county in that district organizes a county branch of the TEC. The county branch consists of all the Governor-appointed TEC members residing in the county, plus all the contributors of from one dollar up to \$100, plus any other interested citizens, whether or not they contribute.

The contributors and interested citizens are associate members of TEC. The county branch elects a permanent county chairman and com-

mittees on speakers, publicity, finance, and study clubs.

The speakers' committee furnishes speakers on the work of the Economy Commission to any civic group that requests a speaker. The Austin office of the TEC supplies factual material for the speakers.

The publicity committee keeps the county informed on activities of the speakers, and on activities of the other groups of the county branch.

The finance committee raises the county's share in a state-wide quota of \$75,000 to finance the TEC researches into the state government.

The study clubs committee conducts periodic informal sessions on why efficient, economical reorganization of the state government is necessary, and on how the TEC is going about its work.

The permanent county chairman takes part in the work of as many of these committees as he has time for. And he is the general administrative head of the county branch.

This may sound far more complicated than it really is. There are a great many Texans who do not have to be "sold" on the need for good government, efficient government. In some cases, there will be little work for one county committee but a great deal for another. In these cases, members of the study club committee, for example, can help the finance group, or any other group needing help.

Each county has its own peculiar local situation, its own special problems to meet, and its own special approach to make.

The primary goals before every member of every branch are: "Economy, efficiency, better public service."

The next article in this series will include comments by editors of Texas newspapers and quotes from outstanding citizens on the work of the Texas Economy Commission.

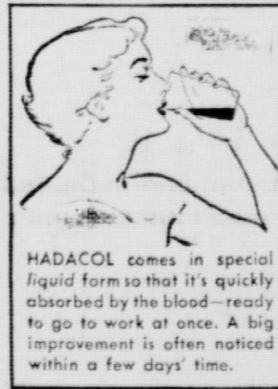

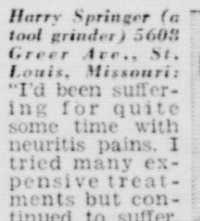

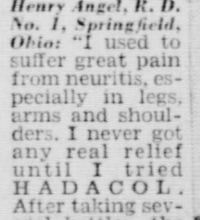
