





Combine onion, egg, salt, Worcestershire sauce, pepper, bread crumbs, and milk. Let stand 5 minutes. Add beef and mix lightly. Form into 10 small cakes. Melt fat in skillet. Add meat cakes and brown lightly on

Meanwhile, combine rice, 1½ cups water, and ½ teaspoon salt in saucepan. Mix just until all rice is moistened. Bring quickly to a boil over high heat, uncovered, fluffing rice gently once or twice with a fork. (Do not stir.) Cover and remove from heat. Let stand 10 minutes.

When meat cakes are browned remove from skillet and keep hot. Add flour to fat remaining in skillet, blending well. Add 1½ cups water gradually, stirring constantly. Dissolve meat paste in hot water and add to mixture in skillet. Bring to a boil.

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
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
