Phillips Well Is Expected To Be Field Extension

Business was brisk in the oil areas some five miles northeast of Cisco today as development activities went forward in the new Owens pool and in the shallow Courtney field. Considerable new development was planned in the new Strawn area uncovered recently in the Courtney

According to reports, W. W. Bradley, Gladewater operator who opened the Strawn pool in a farm-out arrangements with British-American Oil Company, plans to sink five more shallow wells in the area. The pool is a mile northeast of Lake Sand production in the Owens field.

Bradley's Courtney well flowed at the rate of 100 barrels per day after hydrafrac treatment, producing from 1,700 feet. The new Strawn tests are to be drilled with rolary equipment. Permits call for the Nos. 5, 6, 7, 8 and 9 Courtney. They are located in Section 4., Block 4, H&TC

A one and a half mile southwest extension to the Owens pool is expected when the B. F. Phillips No. 1 V. M. Smith is completed. According to reports, the well showed excellent prospects in the Lake Sand. Some 22 feet of sand was cored. It was reported that Phillips decided to explore further before compleion. This exploration was expected to include the Ranger lime.

The Phillips well is located in the northeast quarter of Section 60, Block 4, H & IC Survey.



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


