## Moran News . . . Locals Will Play Baird Friday

Moran will play another conference game Friday night on the home field, after losing the second in district competition to Wylie last week. The Bulldogs journeyed to Wylie and met a team much more powerful than their own.

Wylie kicked off to Moran to begin the game. After an exchange of punts, Wylie started a steady advance from their 40 that reached pay dirt midway in the first quarter. Unable to sustain a march after kickoff, Moran punted to the Wylie 30, from which they ground out a 70-yard drive to lead 14-0 as the quarter ended.

Moran advanced to the enemy 25 in the second quarter before being the ball on downs. A series of wide end sweeps raised Wylie's halftime lead to 21-0.

Moran showed more fight in the second half. After Wylie had made a 50-yard drive for their final touchdown in the third quarter Moran marched down to their opponents' three-yard line as the game ended.

The Moran Quarterback Club reported good sale of tickets for tomorrow night's game here with Baird. The remainder of Moran's games this year will be played at home.

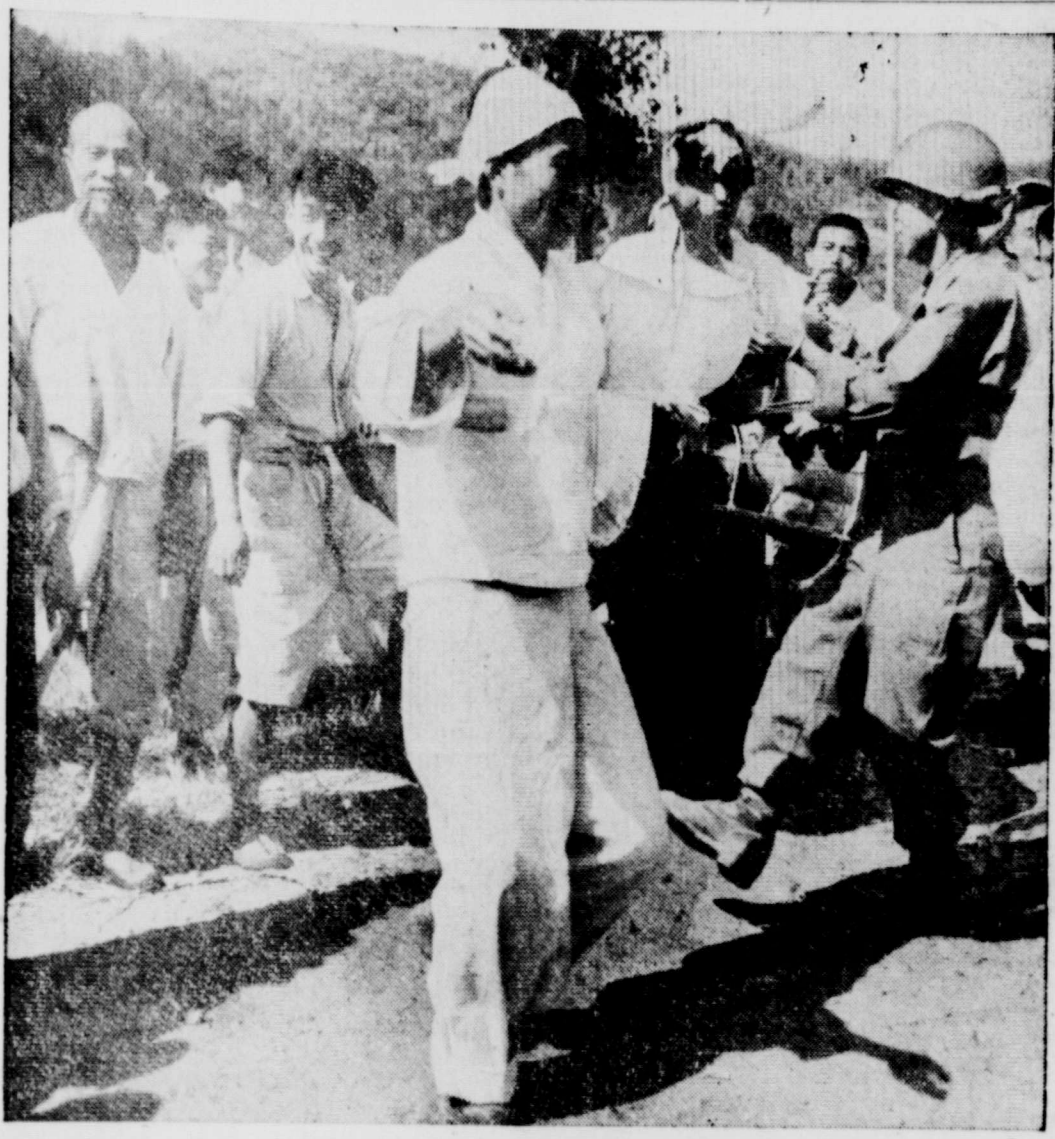
## Services Announced

## Lions Club Will Handle Finance Drive for Agency

Plans for Cisco's first annual Community Chest drive were nearing completion today after the Lions Club voted Wednesday to handle the financial campaign to raise the initial budget of \$5,500.

Final details of the campaign, including appointing a director of the drive, were to be worked out at a meeting of civic leaders on Thursday afternoon. Rev. Leslie Seymour, chairman of the community chest board of directors, outlined the project at the Lions luncheon Wednesday, and the club voted to handle the first budget drive.

The budget committee recommended that funds be raised for the following: ABC Club, \$1,000; Boy Scouts, \$1,500; Girl Scouts, \$1,550; welfare, \$1,000; and for chest contingencies, \$500.

The community chest directorate had to leave out any drive for the Red Cross or the March of Dimes funds because these organizations are prohibited by their governing laws from taking part, and the directors could not legally set a budget for them, Mr. Seymour explained.

It is hoped that future drives can include these agencies, he added.

The ABC Club's chief function here is a summer athletic program for children. The Girl Scout fund would be for the agency's local work for about one and a half years, and the Boy Scout budget is for the coming year. The welfare fund is handled by a special agency set up here some time ago to take care of community needs.

## Harvest Of Crops In Full Swing In Most Of Texas

Pulling and picking cotton, binding and combining grain sorghums, threshing peanuts, baling hay and harvest of other crops again moved at high speed during ideal harvest weather in Texas as the past week. Wheat seeding was practically completed in the northwest and was well along in northern counties. Dry conditions which have prevailed in southern and southeastern counties were expanding northward and westward. Dry soil in southern, central and southeastern counties was delaying seeding of winter legumes and small grains for pasture.

Cotton matured rapidly in all late areas and harvest of open cotton made good progress under ideal weather conditions. Fields were mostly clean and stalks were being plowed under in southwestern and southern counties. Harvest neared completion in central Texas.

Combining of sorghums continued active in the southern High Plains and Low Rolling Plains. High moisture content and excessive suckering further delayed harvest in the northern High Plains and some crops were being out with binders for later threshing. Corn harvest was being rushed to completion in north-central and northeast Texas. Peanut harvest was active in north-central and areas where good yields were being realized. Digging of east Texas sweetpotatoes made good progress, but much of the crop was going into storage due to price declines. Early pecan harvest was started in northern areas.

Range and pasture food was maturing and curing over the northern half of the State in the open fall weather. General rains however, were urgently needed in southern and southeastern counties to bring on new food, and in central counties where growth has been checked by spreading droughty conditions.

Just looking at some figures that we found. Noted that California with a 50% gain and Florida with a 44.1% gain in population were the two fastest growing states found in the latest census.

Yet Texas has a mild climate that in many ways is better than that of either California or Florida. And Texas has had a tremendous industrial growth, too. The population growth of Texas has been great, too, but with all its advantages it lags behind California and Florida.

winter vacationists — swimming, fishing, and boating in the Gulf or many lakes and rivers; Big Bend International Park; 38 state parks; beautiful mountains; missions and other historic places.

Questionnaires returned by the tourists declared "Texans go out of the way to make visitors feel at home." Yet the tourists hurried on.

And just to add a bit more — while the state of Texas was gaining 1 1/4 millions in population in the last 10 years (19.7%) it was losing half of its rural population to the cities.

We'd better start asking why, to all those oddities. Someone recently suggested that Texas needs a magazine of the type of "Arizona Highways." That would be no easy job, for there is one of the best edited, finest printed, and most outstanding advertising mediums for a state that we have ever seen. But if Arizona can do it, Texas can — and it would help.

Someone else said we don't advertise as a state sufficiently, and

our advertising is not well planned. And that may be true, for there certainly should be ways in a state this large, to keep tourists interested long enough to spend more than an average of \$30.

Areas like Marfa can give California plenty of handicap and run off with any weather sweepstakes. Yet the oldsters are going to California and Florida, to retire, not here. Advertising is the only answer.

It really does look as if the state's program and policy on national advertising should be taken out, brushed up, and completely refurbished, ready to go to work on the sort of job that should be done and can be done with the possibilities that exist in this great state. —Big Bend Sentinel, Marfa.

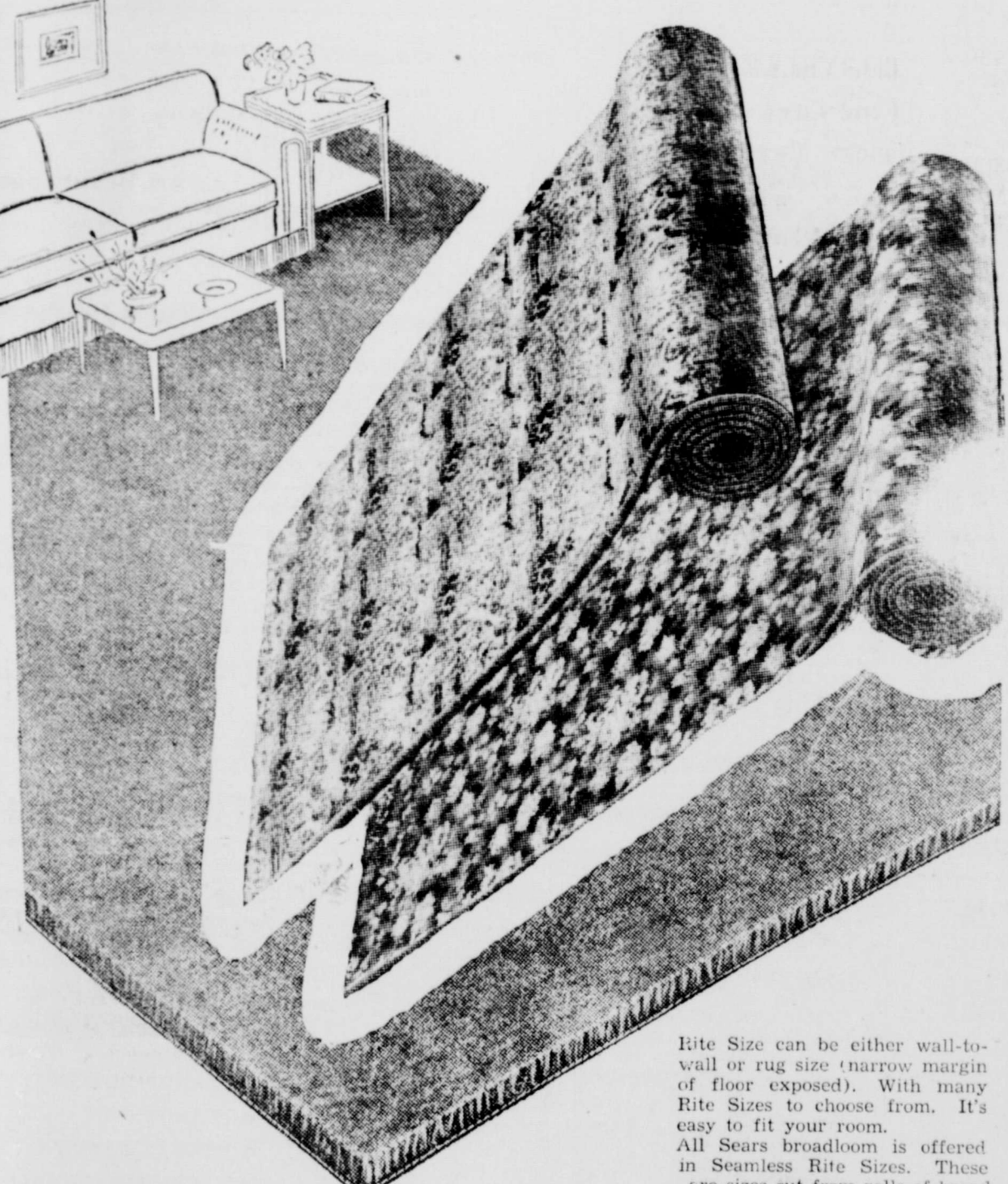

No matter how sweet a tooth you have, once in a while your taste buds appreciate tartness. Cranberries are tart but here we supplement them with pineapple for a Cranberry Pineapple Pie. The amount of sugar added isn't enough to make the filling sweet. Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 2 tbsps. flour, 3/4 tsp. salt. Add 1 lb. can whole cranberry sauce and 1 1/2-cup can (1 cup) crushed pineapple. Mix well. Pour into pastry-lined pie plate, dot with 1 tsp. butter or margarine. Cover with remaining pastry and don't forget to slit the pastry top. Bake in a hot gas oven (425° F.) for 30 mins. Yield: 1 9-inch pie.
