MASONIC LODGE HONORS DR. LEE ON HIS 89TH BIRTHDAY

Members of the Cisco Masonic lodge paid tribute to Dr. W. P. Lee on the occasion of his 89th birthday at their regular stated meeting last Thursday night. As gift, they presented him with a handsome leather-bound Bible. In a short talk, Blair Clark, worshipful master, said that Dr. Lee had been a member of the lodge since April 11, 1903. Frank Leach presented the tribute to Dr. Lee in a brief ceremony in which he described him as a "good Mason, a good man and a good citizen."

In response, Dr. Lee expressed appreciation for the gift and honor. He pointed out that he had been a citizen of Cisco for 56 years and "I have always endeavored to live by the Golden Rule."

H. L. Jackson of Carbon was presented and he spoke briefly saying that he had known Dr. Lee for more than 50 years. Other speakers included Joe Collins of Island, district deputy grand master, who told the meeting that "Dr. Lee brought my mother into the world and we all appreciate the many contributions she has made to the community." Some 65 members and visitors

attended the meeting to pay tribute to Dr. Lee. Among those present were two sons, Fielding Lee of Colorado City and Dudley Lee of Cisco. A daughter, Miss Theresa Lee of San Antonio, arrived Saturday to spend the week-end.

Cisco service clubs honored Dr. Lee on the occasion of his 88th birthday last year and paid him high tribute for his many contributions to the city and community.

Tax Collections Ahead of Last Year

City of Cisco taxpayers apparently were taking advantage of the three per cent discount allowed for early payment as a report Saturday showed that some 60 per cent of 1950 taxes already have been paid.

Tax collections through Friday amounted to \$46,712.64 or 60% on the total to be collected. This compared with \$42,915.18 on the same date in 1949.

The three per cent discount is offered through October.

Cisco Pilot's B-26 Breaks Up Big Red Convoy On His 20th Mission

AN AIR BASE IN JAPAN, Oct. 26 — A lone B-26, flying an attack mission in North Korea recently, wrecked a 11-truck enemy convoy and destroyed a locomotive in a hectic, air-to-ground battle that raged for over an hour.

Flying low over Anju during pre-dawn hours, the U. S. Far East Air Forces light bomber was looking for communist prey. The pilot, Major Walter S. King, Rt. 4, Cisco, Texas, flying his 20th mission of the Korean war, spotted four sets of headlights coming over a ridge. He made a strafing run and two sets of the lights disappeared. The vehicles' personnel apparently did not hear the B-26.

The bomber continued to harass the convoy until daylight, then concentrated automatic weapons fire was thrown up by the North Koreans. A slug ripped through the left main tank, permitting fuel to pour out. King turned to Capt. John G. Bilson, Patterson, N. J., flying his 32nd mission as a B-26 navigator.

"Are you worried?" the pilot asked.

"No," shouted Bilson. "Let's get 'em."

Returning to finish off the vehicles, the plane spotted three trucks under a bridge. Zooming in low, it skipped a bomb under the center truck and blasted all three into a mass of twisted wreckage.

As they pulled up, a shell ripped a 12-inch hole close to tail gunner Sgt. Voorhees S. Root, Jr., Huntsville, Ala., a veteran of nearly 100 missions covering two wars. Root calmly blasted away with his turret guns.

Of the 11 trucks in the convoy, nine were destroyed and two badly damaged.

About 10 miles south, a locomotive was spotted. The B-26 headed in for the kill, spitting bullets and bomb-bay doors opening. Two direct bomb hits were scored.

Landing safely at Taegu, the crippled B-26 was left for repairs while the crew hopped a ride back to their home base in Japan aboard a sister ship.

COOPER-HEMPHILL WELL SENDS OIL OVER TOP IN COMPLETION

The Cooper-Hemphill No. 1 Carlisle, which represents a half-mile northwest extension for the Owens Pool five miles northeast of Cisco, gave every indication of being one of the area's best oil wells Friday when it flowed oil some 150 feet into the air as the climax of completion work.

The cement plug was drilled out Friday morning. Shortly before noon, a swabbing operation was begun. The swab made one trip and started to go in the hole again when it kicked off, blowing oil over the derrick.

After flowing some 15 minutes, the well stopped for a few minutes, and then commenced again. Highway patrolmen were summoned to direct traffic around the area due to danger of fire. During the afternoon, the flow was diverted into tanks.

Operators ran tubing in the hole Friday night. Saturday casing pressure was 550 pounds with tubing pressure at 200. The oil was coming from the Lake sand from about 3,367 feet. The well was shuttin until more storage tanks could be built.

Cooper and Hemphill expected to decide in the next few days as to further developments of their 80-acre lease.

No. 6 Clark Down Bankline Oil Company's No. 6 A. V. Clark was awaiting completion Saturday in the prolific Lake sand of the Owens Pool. Drilling stopped at 3,300 feet after coring 28 feet of the pay section. Oil men said "the picture looks very good."

Pipe was to be set for completion by Illaliburton's hydraulic treatment early this week.

Choate Drilling Co., contractors for the Bankline wells, was moving equipment to the No. 11 A. V. Clark location.

Phillips Stakes Offset A mile and a half northwest of the Owens Pool, where the B. F. Phillips No. 1 V. M. Smith is awaiting completion, it was reported that the Gladewater operator has staked location for an offset well.

The offset will be near the No. 1 Smith, it was understood.

According to reports, efforts were being made Saturday to complete the Smith well in the Duffer lime. If the Duffer fails to respond to the acid treatment, completion will be attempted in the Ranter lime or the Lake sand where good shows were reported.

Lynn Finishes No. 3 J. J. Lynn et al. No. 3 Keyes was completed last week in the Lake sand in an Owens Pool operation. Potential tests showed 168 barrels in 24 hours with 420 pounds of casing pressure and 210 pounds on the tubing. This well is in Section 48, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Another "How Well" W. W. Bradley completed his No. 5 Courtney in the Strawn sand some four miles east of Cisco. Potential showed 70.04 barrels per day with 150 pounds of casing pressure and 87 pounds on the tubing.

Total depth was 1,650 feet. Location is in Section 41, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Elsewhere In Area Bankline Oil Company's No. 1 Samimmel was drilling below 2,500 feet early Saturday. The wildcard is located ten miles north of Cisco.

South of Cisco in the Nimrod community, Oil Associates, Inc., was drilling at about 2,750 in the No. 1 Chambers, a deep test. Two drill stem tests in the Caddo produced slight oil and gas shows, it was reported.

Nine miles southwest, the Elliott and Feed No. 1 W. D. Hopper, a deep wildcat test, was drilling at about 1,500 feet with cable tools.

Jesse Cleveland Is Aboard Carrier

Lt. Jesse S. Cleveland, USN, of Cisco, who is now aboard the giant aircraft carrier USS Midway, is becoming well acquainted with the peoples and customs of countries which border the Mediterranean Sea.

During the month of September the Midway visited the ports of Palermo, Sicily; Algiers, Algeria; Cagliari, Sardinia and Augusta, Sicily.

Other ports in which the carrier has dropped anchor since it began its present cruise include Gibraltar; Athens, Greece; Famagusta, on the Island of Cyprus; Beirut, Lebanon; the Island of Crete, and the French Riviera. While the ship was anchored near Cannes, on the French Riviera, some of the Midway's personnel took guided tours to Paris, France and Switzerland.

Construction of 50 housing units to cost approximately \$450,000 under the Federal Housing Administration's low-cost program was a step nearer for Cisco Saturday, Chairman S. H. Nance reported.

Mr. Nance announced that all preliminary plans for the Cisco project have been approved. His Housing Authority of the City of Cisco will meet Monday afternoon to take steps toward executing the final phase of the project.

Every effort is being made, Mr. Nance said, to have actual construction work under way by the end of the year.

Members of the Cisco authority include Chairman Nance, N. C. Huston, R. L. Ponsler, Charles S. Sandler and J. W. Sitton.

Loboes Trim Indians 46-13 In Last Half Power Display

Jackson and Johnson Score on Long Runs in Conference Game

The Loboes of Cisco High School staged the finest power display of the season here Friday night to erase a half-time deficit and triumph over the Comanche high Indians by a score of 46 to 13 in a District 8-A conference game.

With Quarterback Robert Jackson and Halfback Doug Johnson scoring five touchdowns in rapid fire order, the Loboes took command of a fairly even game almost from the beginning of the third period. Jackson scored three touchdowns on runs of 25, 35 and 70 yards. Johnson scored twice, once on a 75-yard punt return and again on a 17-yard off-tackle jaunt. A 45-yard touchdown run by Johnson was called back due to a penalty.

While Jackson and Johnson were leading the offensive scoring the Lobo line performed creditably. The work of Gene Voss, Leo Farmer, J. C. Suggs, Irvin Brunkenhoefer, Donald S. Watts, Herbert Coats and others made it possible for the long broken field runs. And the Lobo defense was outstanding, particularly in the last half.

The Loboes took the lead after the opening kickoff. David Pippen kicked off and fell on the ball just over the Comanche goal for a touchdown. Watts kicked the extra point.

The Loboes kicked off again and Comanche took over on their 37 yard line. After two plays failed, Turner passed and Jackson intercepted. Taking over on the Comanche 37, Jackson got 8 yards and Johnson 4, and Pippen and Jackson drove to the Comanche 12. Johnson passed to

Jim Webb for six yards and three line plays let the ball go over on the 3.

Comanche kicked out to their 31. The Indians promptly intercepted a Lobo pass on their 45. The Loboes drew a 5-yard setback and two Indian backs netted a first down. Here the drive ended and the Indians punted to the Cisco 13. Jackson and Pippen made a first down on their 25 and the Loboes drew a 15-yard penalty as the period ended.

Two Lobo passes failed and King intercepted a Cisco pass and ran 30 yards for a touchdown. The point was not good.

Doc Dawson took the kickoff and was downed on the Cisco 25. The Loboes drew a 15 yard penalty and Johnson made 12 yards before Suggs punted to the Comanche 35. Three Indian plays failed and the Loboes took a punt on their 35. Johnson and Jackson picked up a first down before penalty forced the Loboes to punt, and the punt was blocked on the Cisco 32. Turner connected with King for a first down on the Lobo 16. Three plays later, King passed to Lochridge for a touchdown. The extra point was good.

Webb brought the kickoff back to the Lobo 44. Johnson passed to Jackson for 36 yards as the half ended.

Third Period Dawson brought the kickoff back to the Lobo 42. Johnson made 5 yards, Jackson got through for 36 yards and Johnson ran the end for 17 yards and a touchdown. Watts converted.

Cisco kicked off and held. Johnson took Turner's punt on his 25 yard line and ran 75 yards for a touchdown. Watts missed the point.

Cisco kicked off again and

and forced a punt, taking over on their 33. Jackson made 6 yards and Johnson drove to the 47.

Pippen lost 10 yards, Johnson made 3 and Jackson got through for 20 yards. Sublett made 2 and the Loboes drew a 5-yard penalty. Jackson hit the line for 8 yards twice and then went through for 25 yards and a touchdown. Watts missed the uprights.

Comanche took over on their 43. A pass netted 8 yards, and Watts intercepted a pass on the Indian 35 to open the final period. Jackson promptly went off tackle and broke loose for a touchdown. Watts kicked goal.

Comanche took over on their 20 and two passes drove to the Cisco 42 where Reo Evans recovered a fumble. Jackson made 7 yds. and Watts took a lateral pass for a first down on the 46. A line buck lost 1 and the Loboes drew a 15-yard penalty. Jackson went over guard and ran 70 yards for a touchdown. Watts missed the point.

Comanche got the kickoff on their 34. Bobby Cleveland intercepted a pass on the 40 and ran to Comanche's 14. Pippen, Smith and Black made 4 yards and Sublett passed to Smith for a touchdown. Farmer kicked the extra point. The Indians took the kickoff on their 14 and were held as the game ended.

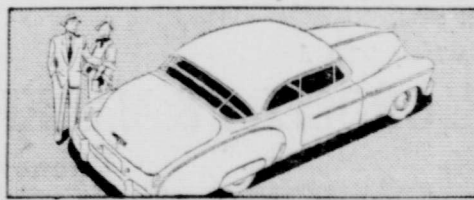

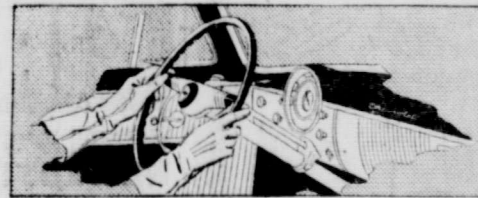

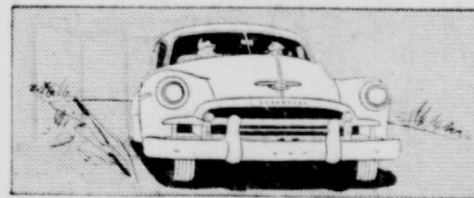
