On the offense, Crosby handled the ball on every down except two in the first half as the Wranglers took to the air and stayed there. Occasionally, Crosby ran the ball, and he did the punting.

Although he was badly rushed and knocked down on every pass, Crosby's 40 passing attempts were good for 20 completions that netted the Cisco eleven 13 first downs, two touchdowns and a total of 236 yards.

Social Security Changes Due To Make 300 Jobs

About 300 jobs in the Bureau of Old-Age and Survivors Insurance, Federal Security agency, will be open to college graduates and others with social science backgrounds as a result of recent amendments to the Social Security Act which extended coverage of the Act to about 11,000, 000 persons, the Civil Service Commission said today.

The job titles are "field assistant" and "claims assistants." The jobs will be located throughout the country.

Many of these Federal positions will be filled through social science analyst examinations being announced by the Commission's regional offices before January 1951.

Turkey gobblers are legal game from Nov. 16 to Dec. 31. The limit is only three for the season.

Deer season coincides with the turkey season. Hunters with big game licenses may take two bucks per season.

LOBO BAND IS HONORED WITH SURPRISE PARTY LAST WEEK

After a short drill at the football field, members of the Cisco Lobo Band were honored with a surprise birthday party celebrating their sixth birthday, Oct. 26, at the band hall.

While the unsuspecting band was drilling, Mrs. Bethel Gallagher, Mrs. W. V. Gardenhire, and Mrs. Fred Scott were busy setting up a table on which the ice cream and the black and gold birthday cake was to be placed. The oblong cake was decorated with the words "Lobo Band." A measure of music with the treble clef and the four opening notes, of "Happy Birthday" were inscribed on it in black and gold.
