A brief program in which all phases of the new Community Chest proposition were explained preceded the beginning of the actual canvass for a budget of \$5,-Mr. Flint presided at the

Manager B. A. Butler of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce and Rev. Leslie Seymour, chairman of the board of directors of the Chest organization, were speakers at the breakfast meeting.

They both pointed out the needs for the organization and urged a speedy and to the drive.

"A Day's Pay for the Community Clest" is the slogan for the drive in which funas will be raised to support the Boy Scout and Girl Scout mevements, the Cisco Welfare Association and the ABC Club. The budget provides \$1,-500 for each of the Scout organizations, \$1,000 for each of the ABC and the Cisco Welfare Association, and \$500 for a reserve fund.

Supplier for use in the campaign were passed out to the workers by Mrs. Don Choate chairman of the women's residential canvass teams, and Dr. C. E. Paul, director of work in the business district. Some 75 workers attended the breakfast. They were asked to turn in their funds at the office of C. E. Higginbotham, treasurer for the Chest.

The announcement of national quotas follows the Navy's recent report on status of recall of its reservists. It also lists Waves and non-rated men to be called during

the first quarter of next year. The national quota includes about of the 31,000 reserves required during the first six months of 1951, the Nav. said.

It is evenly divided between petty officers and non-rated personnel, and includes 16 chief petty officer ratings and 29 specialities in lower petty officer rat-

Exact numbers in ratings for the remaining three quarters of 1951 have not been specified, the Navy said. But the general pattern for the second quarter is expected to be similar to first quarter recalls.

After July 1, 1951, recalls will be composed of about 5000 nonrated men per month, chiefly those with less than six months of prior active service, and rel-

ative'y few petty officers. The Navy pointed out that recalls would effect both volunteer

and organized reservists.



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
