Advance Noted In Texas Farm Income

AUSTIN, Nov. 7 — Texas farm cash income advanced 36% from August to total an estimated \$180,061,000 in September, the U. S. Texas Bureau of Business Research reported today.

September income was down 31% from September, 1949.

NORTHER IS DUE

The week's second cold wave was due to hit this central Texas area Wednesday night and a forecast of 35 degrees has been predicted for early Thursday morning. There was no rain in prospect in connection with the new cold blast.

OVER 30 TONS OF PEAS ARE RAISED IN COUNTY THIS YEAR

Over 30 tons of blackeyed and other varieties of dried peas have been purchased in Gorman during the past three months to complete marketing of the new cash crop for the sandy land area of that section, Boyd Hilley, manager of a Gorman store and buyer of the peas told J. M. Cooper, County Agricultural Agent recently.

The peas averaged between 400 and 500 pounds per acre and were grown on around fifty different farms, principally around Gorman, Hilley said. Growers were fairly well pleased with the prices paid. Peas of the black-eyed variety brought 6c per lb. whereas the price for the stock peas were a little lower.

Fully 75% of the peas grown were of the black-eyed variety with the other 25% being several varieties of stock peas.

Black-eyed peas will pay better on sandy land farms than will feed crops at the present price of both crops believes Cooper, instrumental in getting the new cash crop started.

"I expect that we will have a much larger increase in the acreage of this new crop next year—especially if the price holds up," commented Hilley.

Hilley was the buying agent of the new crop for the L. R. Barron Co., Athens, Texas, long time buyers of black-eyed peas in the state. Barron was in Gorman recently and was well pleased with the tonnage of peas bought, it was said.

Bankline Moving To Reynolds Land For New Oil Try

Bankline Oil Co. was moving in today to drill their No. 1 J. H. Reynolds as a northwest offset to the No. 11 A. V. Clark in the Owens pool five miles northeast of Cisco. The No. 11 Clark was bottomed at 3,342 feet after coring 26 feet of the area's prolific Lake sand.

Completion work on the new Clark well was due to begin as soon as pipe is cemented. Work will begin later in the week on the Reynolds location.

Bankline's No. 1 Sam Kimmell, a wildcat 10 miles north of Cisco, was drilling at 3,789 feet. It will continue to the Ellenberger lime. No oil or gas shows of consequence had been reported.

South of Cisco, the Elliott and Reed No. 1 W. D. Hopper was drilling at 2,280 feet with cable tools. This is a deep wildcat test.

Discharge Policy Changes Are Made For Army Men

AUSTIN, Nov. 8 — The Dept. of the Army has broadened its policy of discharging enlisted members of the civilian components having four or more dependents, Col. Clarence M. Culp, chief of the Texas Military District, announced today.

Under the new policy all enlisted men of the Organized Reserve Corps, whether on active duty or to be called to active duty as individuals or as members of units, are entitled to discharge if they meet dependency eligibility requirements. Enlisted members of civilian components now serving overseas will be returned to the U. S. for discharge.

Generally enlisted ORC members relieved from active duty for reason of dependency will be discharged from the Reserve. But there are three types of enlisted reservists who may be relieved from active duty but will be kept in the Organized Reserve. These are: Those retired from the Regular Army with less than 30 years service; Reservists who enlisted in the Regular Army for one year; and those inducted under the Selective Service Act of 1948.

The original Army policy, announced Oct. 16, 1950, applied only to enlisted members of the Organized Reserve Corps who had been ordered to active duty as individuals. Provisions for discharge under that policy did not apply to personnel on active duty overseas.

County Offices Will Be Closed Saturday

County Judge P. L. Crossley announced today that the various offices in the Eastland County Courthouse will be closed Saturday in observance of Armistice Day. The first floor lobby, however, will remain open.

For a large part of Cisco, it will be business as usual. Planning to close are a group of grocery stores, the post office, the First National Bank, local washateria, and possibly others.

LEGION COMMANDER URGES ALL TO BUY POPPIES ON SATURDAY

"Wear a poppy in memory of our departed comrades."

This was the message of the commander of the J. W. Butts Post of the American Legion, to all Legion members as preparations were being completed for observance of annual Poppy Day here Saturday.

Memorial poppies will be distributed on the streets throughout the day by members of the American Legion Auxiliary who will receive in exchange contributions for the welfare of disabled war veterans and needy children of veterans.

In his Poppy Day message, the commander said: "Veterans of two world wars should be the first to put on poppies on Poppy Day. The poppy is our memorial flower, showing that we have not forgotten those comrades of ours who fell on battlefields throughout the world in defense of our country. I am calling upon all members of the American Legion to wear a poppy in their honored memory."

"And while honoring the dead, we should also remember those other comrades who are still suffering from the effects of their war service. We should think, too, of the children of veterans who are without a father's support. The funds contributed for the poppies mean help and hope for these living victims of the wars, so be as generous as you can afford when you put on your poppy."

"We who have served side by side with the men whose sacrifice of life is commemorated by the poppy should set an example of patriotic remembrance for all citizens. Put on a poppy early in the morning on Poppy Day and wear it all day."

Ranger Juniors Trim Midgets In Grid Game Here

The Ranger Junior High School grid team wound up its season with a clean slate by scoring a touchdown and kicking the extra point at Chesley Field Tuesday night to down a fighting Tuscollo Midget eleven by a 7-0 score.

The Midgets gave away a tremendous weight advantage but held the Ranger team scoreless for three quarters. The only Midget threat came in the fourth quarter when passes and runs by Gallegos and Miller worked the ball deep into Ranger territory. The threat was killed when Ranger intercepted a pass and returned the ball deep into Midget territory. Fast footwork on the part of Bill Miller saved a touchdown when he overtook the runner on his own 25 yard line. After one running play time ran out to wind up the season for both teams.

N. D. Gallagher, prominent Cisco business man and rancher, was in a critical condition Wednesday afternoon after suffering a paralytic stroke at his home shortly after noon. Mr. Gallagher has been in ill health for several months.

State Allocates \$100,000 for Use In County Work

The extension of the Farm-to-Market road from Cisco to Scranton will receive top priority when the highway committee of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce meets with County Commissioners and State Highway Department engineers soon to consider the expenditure of some \$100,000 allotted to Eastland County for farm highways during 1951 and 1952.

Word of the allotment was received by County Judge P. L. Crossley this week. Mr. Crossley stated that the authorization would allow some 12 miles of road to be built in the county during the next two years or five to six miles per year.

Second on the state for Cisco when funds are made available is a proposed paved road to the Cisco Hydrocarbon Co. plant north of Cisco. The plans call for connection with the pavement on State Highway 283 north of Lake Cisco and extending to the Stephens County line. Stephens County officials were working with Eastland County officials and the Cisco Chamber of Commerce in an effort to get the road approved. The two counties are also working together in getting the Stephens County portion of the road paved to connect with Highway 6 from Albany to Breckenridge.

Already approved and set for bids soon is the Farm-to-Market road connecting the Nimrod area to Cisco. Plans call for the use of the present pavement in that area and extending from there.

Civil Service To Hold Exams

The United States Civil Service Commission had announced today an examination to fill social worker positions paying from \$3,825 to \$5,400 a year. The positions are located in hospitals and regional offices of the Veterans Administration in Washington, D. C., throughout the United States, and in Puerto Rico.

To qualify, applicants must have completed graduate study equivalent to all the requirements for the master's degree or diploma of graduation from an accredited school of social work. This study must have included courses in case work and in psychiatric and medical information.

In addition, applicants must have had experience in the social work program of a health or welfare agency or in the armed forces subsequent to the completion of at least 1 year of their graduate study. Applicants for positions paying \$3,825 will not be required to show this experience provided their graduate study in social work included 3 quarters or 2 semesters of supervising field work in case work. For positions paying \$4,200 and above, the applicant's experience must have included or been supplemented by case work experience in a hospital or clinic. For positions paying \$4,600 and \$5,400, supervisory or administrative experience in a case work program also must be shown.

At least a year of the required experience must have been obtained within the 10-year period immediately preceding the date of application.

The age limits, 18 to 62 years, will be waived for persons entitled to veteran preference. Full information and application forms may be secured from the Commission's Local Secretary Sam E. King located at Cisco Post Office.

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Through a good many of the talks at the First Annual Texas Livestock Roundup in Fort Worth

On November 2 and 3 ran the advice, Watch Washington. The reason it was suggested that Washington be watched is the fear that more controls and restrictions are being brewed up for the livestock industry. Stockmen want none of it. During the late war they were able to get by without many, but they know that there is considerable thinking outside the industry which would try to impose strict regulations on the marketing of meat animals.

A corn belt feeder, Ed. Hollenbeck of Sterling, Illinois, who feeds a lot of Texas calves, says folks in his section find Texas stock does better than calves from other sections. They are smoother, he says, and put on gain faster. He took a critical view of the compressed type of beef calf and favors larger animals, but advised against going all out the other way. "Regardless of the size of the animal," he said, "it's the smooth ones that sell best." True D. Moresse, president of the Doane Agricultural Service, St. Louis, says there is a demand for farms now because people fear inflation and that prices will go higher. He regards the imminent threat of inflation as one of our gravest dangers.

The grass demonstration staged by 4-H club members Lee Wolf and Ray Luke of Cook County, and their county agent, B. T. Haws, went over big with the crowd of over a thousand who attended the Texas Livestock Roundup. Another favorite was the report by young Bivin Dunklin, Hamilton County 4-H'er, and County Agent E. R. Lawrence on their beef cattle feeding project. Hubertus Urbanczyk, young editor of the Agricultural Weekly in

Munich, Germany, has been here as guest of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture lately. He is studying ways of handling farm news and getting agricultural information to farmers in an effective way. He says Germans have failed to do that satisfactorily. A sharp young fellow, he speaks almost perfect English, learned in the five months he has been in the U. S. He has received numerous requests for public appearances before luncheon groups and schools here. He plans to return to Germany after attending the National 4-H club Congress in Chicago next month. Being accustomed to farming from his front porch anyway, it was fairly easy for Channing to do this by remote control.



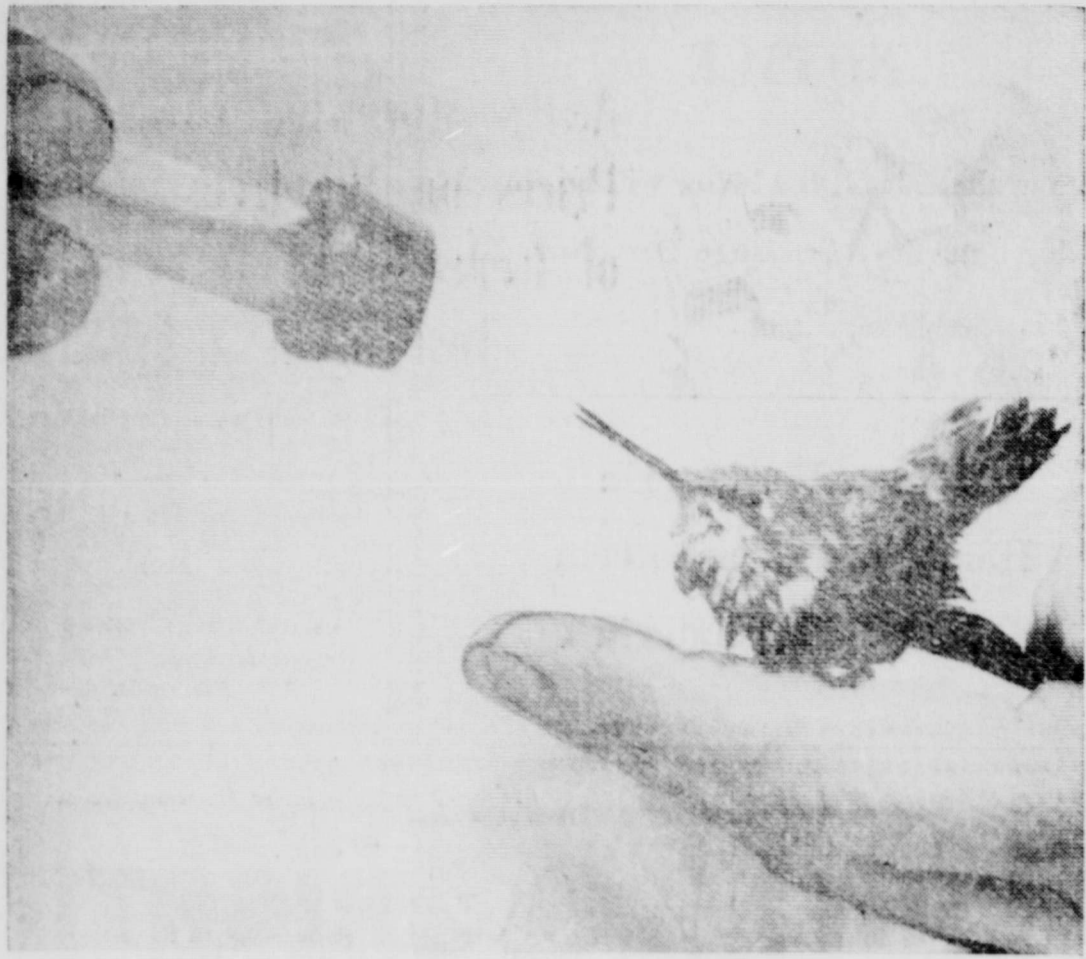

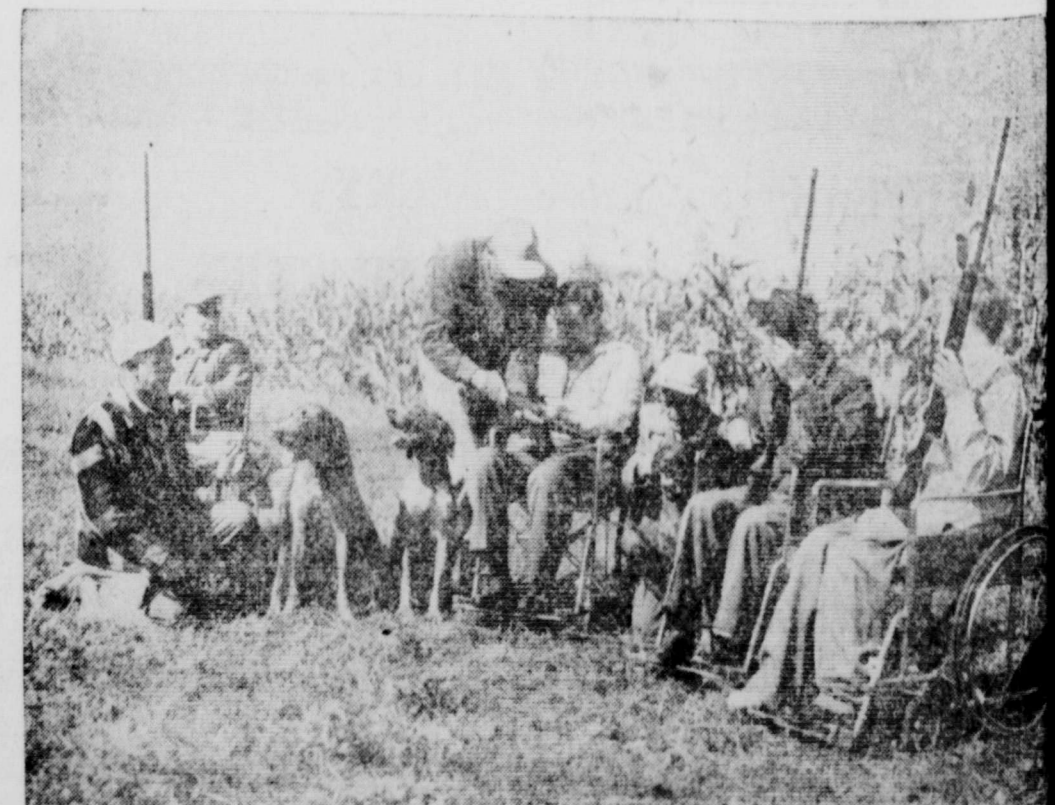
