N. D. GALLAGHER, PROMINENT IN CITY, DIES EARLY THURSDAY

Funeral services for Norval Douglas Gallagher, 61, prominent Cisco oil man and civic leader, will be held at the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Eastland at 2 p. m. Friday.

Mr. Gallagher's death was caused by a paralytic stroke suffered shortly before his death. He had been confined to his home for several months due to ill health. At noon Wednesday, Mrs. Gallagher returned to her home from her job as secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce.

Mr. Gallagher came to Cisco in 1934 from Desdemona and had been a resident of the city and area since that time. He was born in Butler County, Penn. on May 5, 1889, and prior to moving to Texas was in the oil business in Pennsylvania, Kansas, West Virginia and Oklahoma.

Shortly before World War I he formed a partnership with O. G. Lawson and in 1919 the two came to Texas to develop interests in the Ranger field. From Ranger they moved to Desdemona when oil was discovered there. In 1934 Gallagher and Lawson moved to Cisco where they operated as a partnership until 1940.

Mr. Gallagher was a 32nd degree Mason and was active in civic and church affairs. He was a member of the Episcopal church. He served as president of the Desdemona School Board for 14 years and in Cisco was a director of the Chamber of Commerce for several years.

Survivors include his wife, the former Peggy Donica; two daughters, Mrs. R. H. Cutting of Fort Worth and Mrs. Clifton McNeely of Pampa, one son, N. D. Gallagher, Jr., Cisco, and one grandson, Hank Cutting of Fort Worth.

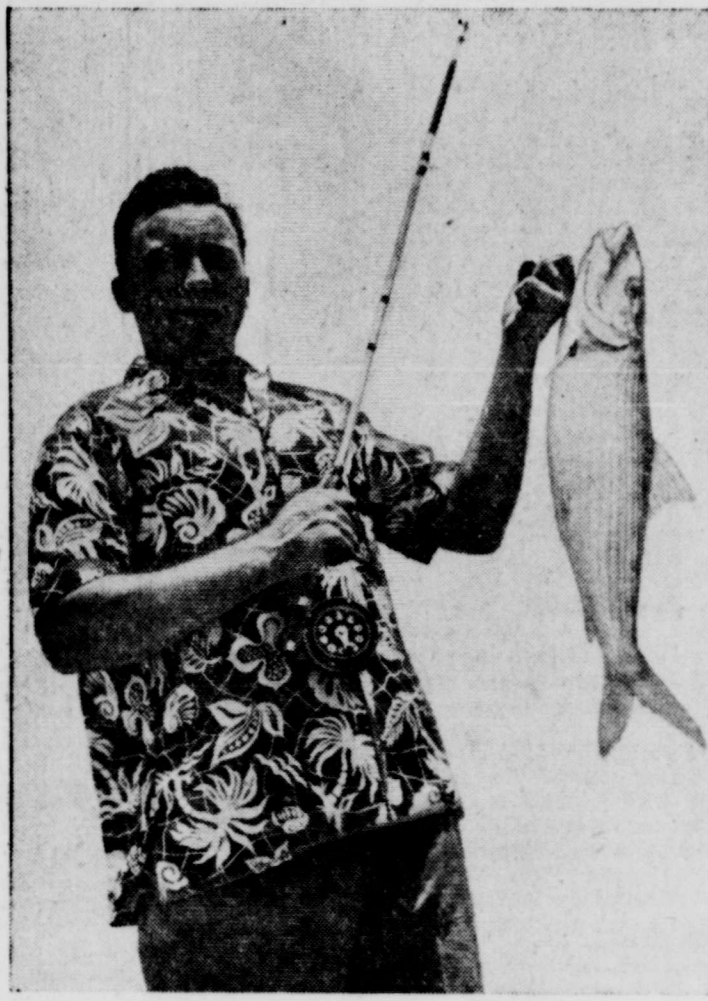

Brother Of Mrs. Williams Dies

The last living mate survivor of James Marlin, pioneer homesteader after whom the city of Marlin is named, died in a Marlin hospital on Sunday, November 5, 1950.

He was Eugene Marlin, age 68, a prominent Falls county ranchman, stock raiser and farmer during his life time. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Sam H. Marlin. He was born near Reagan on February 6, 1882. He lived during most of his lifetime at the old Marlin homestead about 2 miles north of Reagan.

This homestead was given to the Marlin family in recognition of the services of the pioneer James Marlin in frontier fighting. The Marlin cabin, which was burned in 1932, was built of lumber brought overland from Houston in the old days. It was pegged together, no nails being used in its construction.

The funeral will be Tuesday at 10:30 a. m. at the Adams Funeral Home chapel in Marlin. Rev. F. P. Goddard of the St. John's Episcopal Church officiating. Burial will be in Calvary Cemetery.

Pallbearers will be Dick Peacock, John Tomlinson, J. M. Carter, T. C. Williams, Jr., M. V. Nance, D. H. Moore and Gene Pruett Moore. All but Mr. Peacock and Mr. Tomlinson are nephews.

The deceased was never married. Survivors are two sisters, three nieces, two nephews and three great-nephews. The sisters are Mrs. Shirley M. Carter of Waco and Mrs. T. C. Williams of Cisco. The nieces are Mrs. M. V. Nance, Fort Worth; Mrs. D. H. Moore, Fort Worth; and Mrs. Sadie Largent, California. — Marlin Democrat.

Growing Season Stops As Freeze Hits Large Area

The 1950 growing season was abruptly stopped by freezing temperatures over the northwestern third of the state on Nov. 2 and 3 as the dry north roared across the state. Light to heavy frost was reported over most of the Edwards Plateau and as far south as Eagle Pass. Light showers in eastern counties were helpful but general rains were still needed in that area as well as the remainder of Texas.

In the northwest rain was needed to settle soil around plants so wheat fields might be pastured. In most other areas growth was at a standstill as intensity of the drought increased. Cotton and grain sorghum harvest in northwest areas may now be pressed to completion. With growing stopped cotton bolls will pop open and moisture content of grain sorghums will be lowered.

Cotton harvest made good progress in north west areas following the midweek freeze and will soon reach peak activity on the High Plains. Harvest continued active in Low Rolling Plains and Trans-Pecos areas. Weather conditions have been ideal for maturity and harvest of the crop. Corn was mostly out of fields in all areas. Grain sorghum harvest was nearing completion except on the High Plains.

Combining of crops there was continued during the week and will be greatly speeded up following the freeze. Most of the crop was mature and the freeze was needed to stop growth and reduce moisture content of grain. Sweet potato digging was well advanced and progress of peanut harvest in the northern commercial areas was favorable. Rice combining was nearly completed.

Cured range feed continued in plentiful supply over the northern half of Texas. Rain, however, would greatly benefit the winter wheat pasture prospects in that area. Wheat has been retarded by insufficient moisture to develop root systems that will withstand grazing. Livestock in this area are carrying good flesh. The range feed situation was becoming more critical in the extreme southern and coastal counties as rain is urgently needed.

Feeding of hay and concentrate was being continued to hold loss in weight to a minimum. Cattle are being moved from this critical drought area to more favorable pastures. Rain was needed throughout the state to stimulate winter vegetation and improve winter feed prospects.

C-C Directors Attend Meeting

Directors of the Cisco Chamber of Commerce, holding a semi-monthly business meeting Wednesday afternoon, heard reports from various committees and attended to routine business.

It was announced that a meeting of the committee in charge of Jersey heifers given to some 20 club boys last year will meet here on November 16 to study the results of the project and to plan the distribution of the first crop of calves.

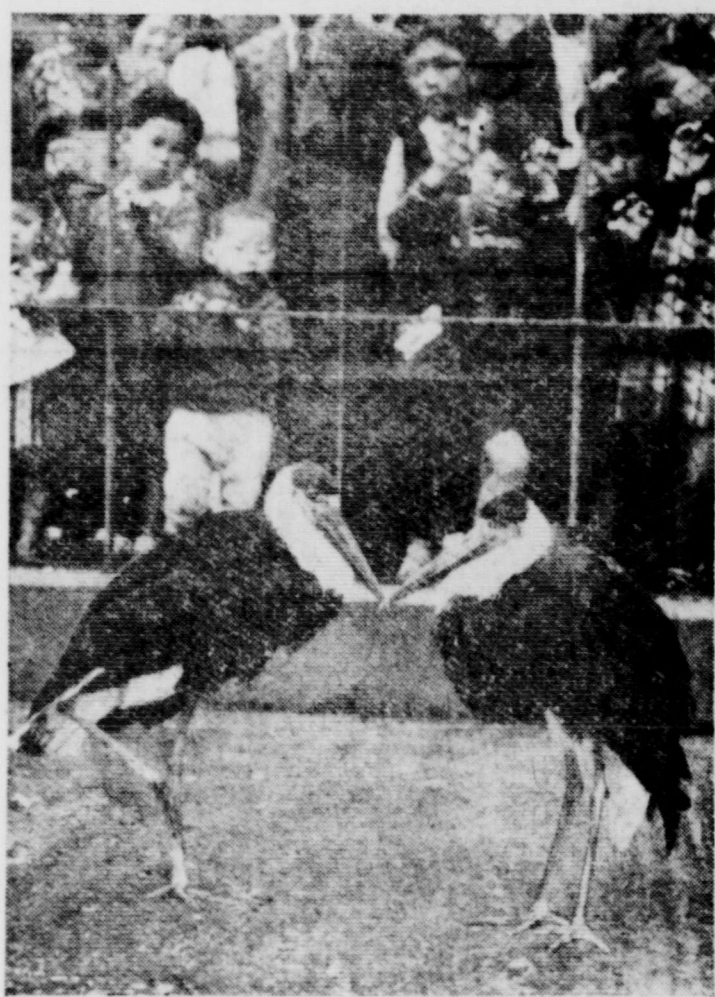
Art Week Observed

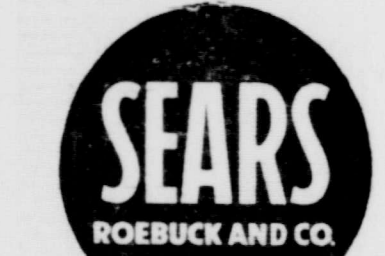

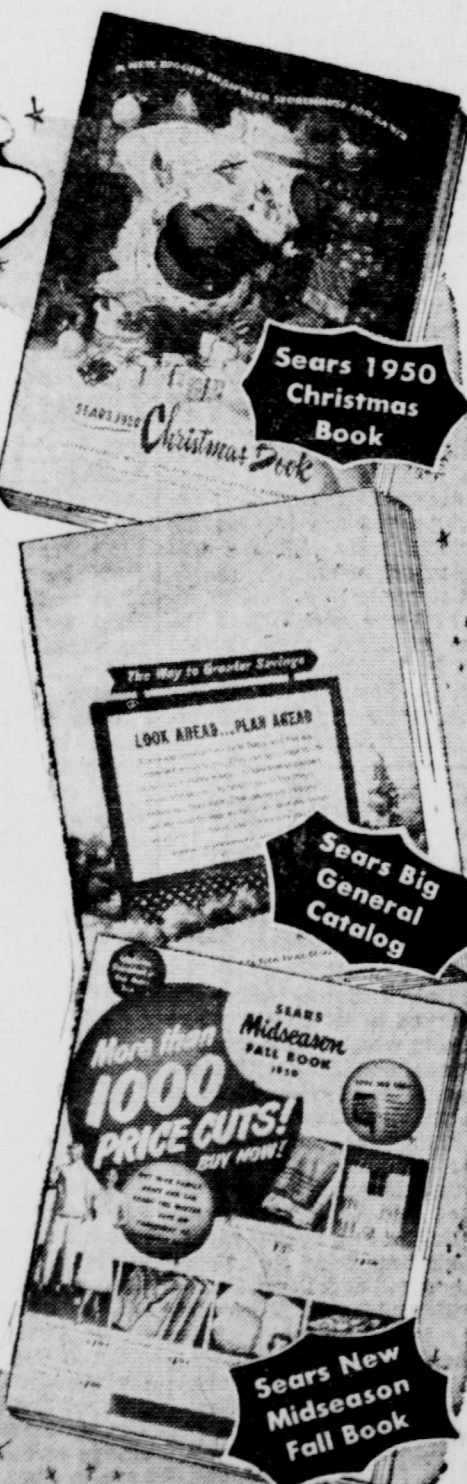

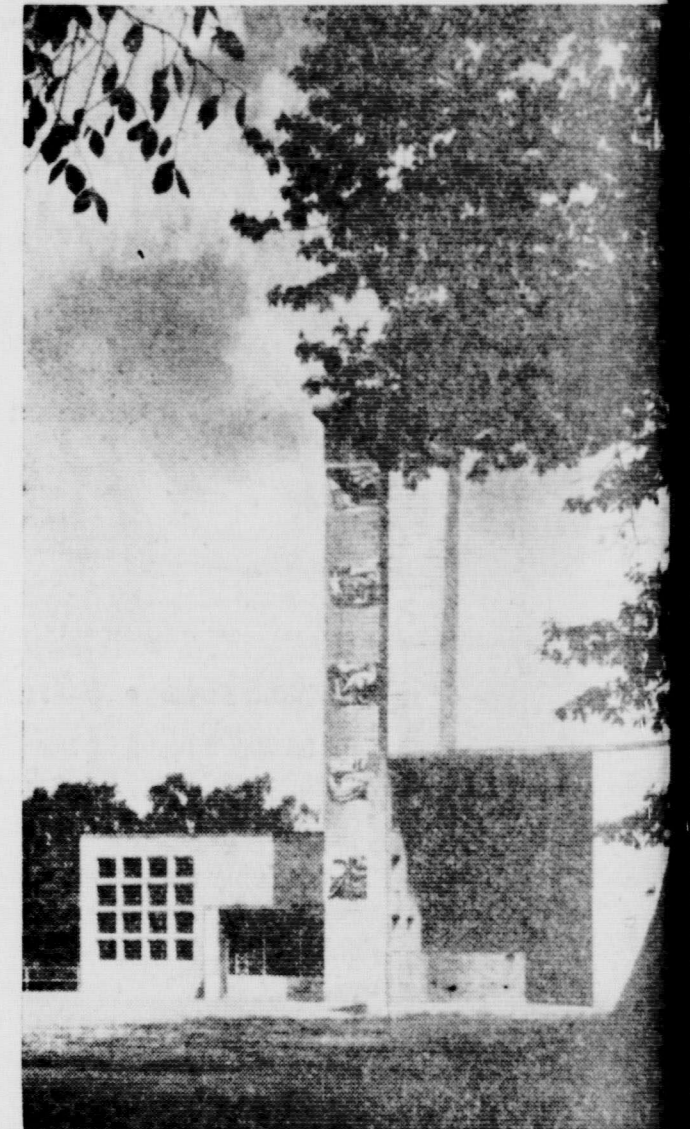

### New Drugs Are Not To Treat Colds, Cox Says

AUSTIN, Nov. 9 — "The wide advertising of antihistamines for the prevention of colds should not persuade people to place too much confidence in these drugs as a treatment for colds," Dr. G. W. Cox, state health officer, has said in warning to the citizens of Texas. "Those who decide to

take any of the antihistamine pills should realize it is highly important for them to follow exactly the directions," Dr. Cox said.

"Regardless of the effectiveness of these new products it remains desirable to take the ordinary precautions against contracting a cold — adequate sleep, well balanced diet, moderate outdoor exercise and avoidance of unnecessary contacts with those already suffering from colds. Extra rest and the drinking of large amounts of fruit juice are still

important aids to physical well-being and cure if a cold occurs. Unfavorable reactions such as dizziness, drowsiness, and temporary loss of muscle control sometimes occur after taking this drug. Everyone is strongly advised against driving an automobile or working around machinery while taking the pills.

"Some readers of advertise-

ments may get the idea that taking small doses of antihistamines every day will prevent colds. Such use of drugs should be discouraged. Antihistamines are still new and largely unproved drugs. Physicians have not yet determined what effect these products may have upon the human system if taken over a long period of time."
