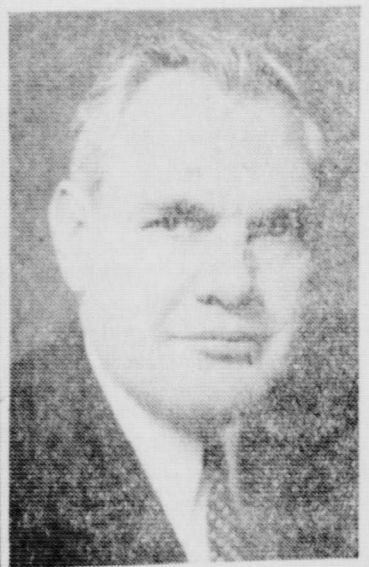

## Game Is Played In 20 Degree Weather

With the temperature hovering  
just above the 20-degree mark,  
the Cisco High School Loboes  
played one of their best games of  
the season here Friday night to  
topple undefeated Hamilton High  
School from the District 8-A  
leadership by a score of 14 to 7.

Charging hard and playing  
heads up football, the Loboes  
used a pass interception and a  
clocked punt to pave the way  
to an apparently easy win. Ham-  
ilton's highly regarded offensive  
attack was kept well in check ex-  
cept for a brief period in the third  
quarter.

The victory for Cisco left Ham-  
ilton, Ranger and Dublin tied for  
the district crown.

The Loboes came through the  
game in fair shape despite the  
cold weather that made ball  
handling difficult and pass catch-  
ing next to impossible. The Lo-  
boes scored midway in the first  
period and held on to the lead  
throughout the game.

Robert Jackson and Doug  
Johnson were the offensive stand-  
outs for the Loboes. Each turned  
in several creditable runs, and  
Johnson's long punt returns were  
an important contribution to the  
victory.

The whole Lobo line was out-  
standing on the defense. Sopho-  
more Jimmy Webb, who played  
little until the past three games,  
turned in the best game of his  
career. He and Red Evans and  
Irvin Brunkenhoefer gave Hamil-  
ton Passer Billy Tennyson the  
bum's rush that threw him for  
frequent losses and made his  
shooting inaccurate. Jackson and  
Don Watts, as line backers, were  
outstanding.

Tackles Gene Voss and Leo  
Farmer were defensive stars, and  
the punting of J. C. Suggs was an  
important factor. Most of the  
Loboes played a full 48 minutes.

Cisco's first touchdown came  
when Jackson intercepted a Hamil-  
ton pass in the field. He was  
run out of bounds on the Bulldog  
one. On the third power play,  
Doug Johnson dived over the  
goal and Center Don Watts con-  
verted to put the Loboes out  
front, 7 to 0. The half ended  
that way.

Near the end of the third peri-  
od, Hamilton recovered a Lobo  
fumble on their 38. Cisco slashed  
to trap Tennyson for a 12 yard  
loss. Tennyson, attempting a  
quick kick, had his punt blocked  
by Doc Dawson on the Bulldog  
16 and Irvin Brunkenhoefer grab-  
bed the ball and ran about 12  
yards for a touchdown. Watts  
converted again.

The Loboes kicked off and  
Hamilton promptly marched 75  
yards to a touchdown. Tennyson  
hit Brann for 19 yards, two line  
backs carried to the Cisco 46, and

play on the Lobo five. Phippen  
played a fine defensive game.

The Lobos decided to hold on  
to the ball and made two first  
downs before punting. Johnson  
promptly intercepted a pass and  
ran it back 33 yards to the Ham-  
ilton 32. A penalty forced the Lo-  
boes to punt on fourth down.  
Hamilton then completed one 20  
yard pass and were held for  
downs. The Loboes then played  
a delaying action to hold the ball  
until the final whistle.

The first quarter was without  
a serious threat except when  
Johnson got loose for 24 yards  
and a touchdown, only to have it  
called back for a clipping penalty.  
As the period ended, Jackson got  
through for a 30 yard run that  
was one of the game's longest  
from scrimmage.

Johnson apparently received a  
brother nose in the game. And

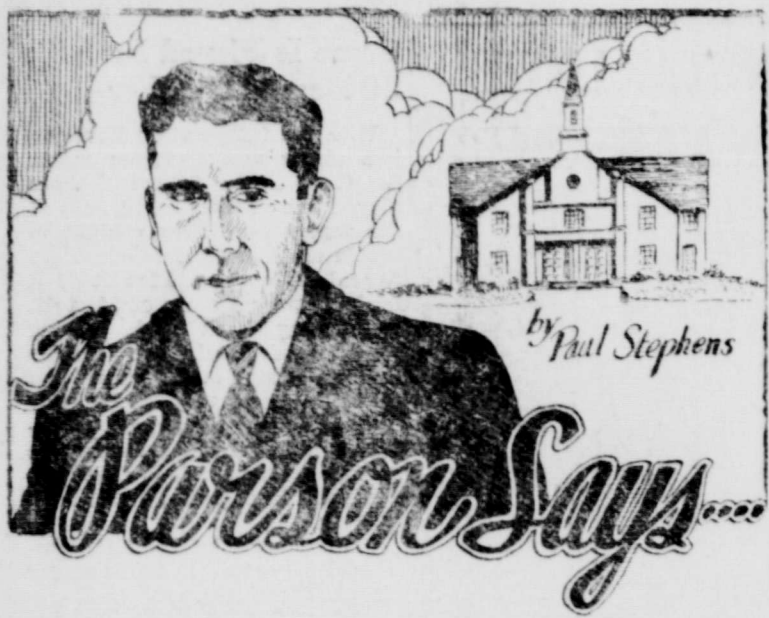

We spent Monday through Thursday of last week attending the Baptist General Convention of Texas in Fort Worth. Outstanding speakers on the program included Senator Tom Connally, Congressman Brooks Hays, General Dwight D. Eisenhower, Dr. Robert G. Lee, and Evangelist Billy Graham.

Senator Connally compared Christianity and communism when he spoke before the Brotherhood convention Monday night. The Senator said he expected Christianity to still be on the march when Communism is a dim, dark memory in the world's history. Several times in his message he used the phrase, "...for our King, the Lord Jesus Christ, Whom we serve willingly and gladly."

The 32-year-old evangelist who was born in North Carolina now General Eisenhower began his

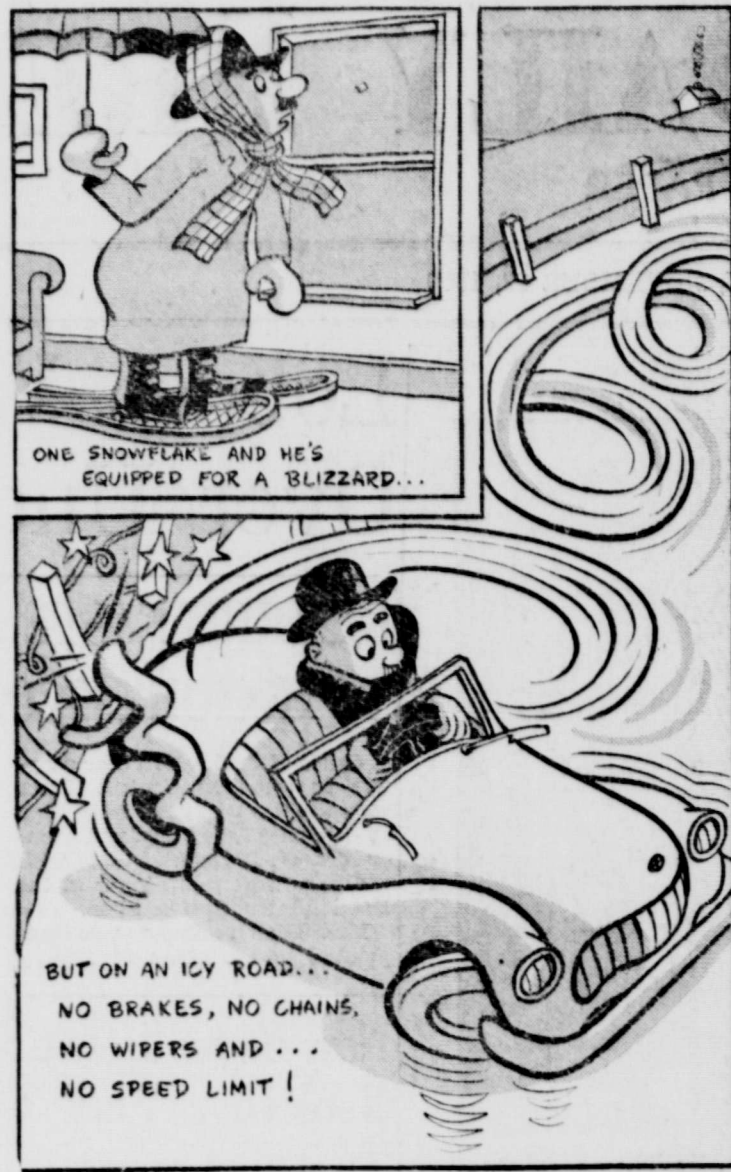
brief speech by saying, "It is rather paradoxical that I, an old soldier, should have this opportunity of speaking to you who have gathered in the Name of 'the Prince of Peace.'" The general declared that the only answer for the present world crisis is a real moral and spiritual revival.

Five years ago, in San Antonio's First Baptist Church, several hundred young people gathered on a Saturday night to hear a young preacher by the name of Billy Graham. I had the privilege of hearing Graham twice in his younger days and he was worth hearing then. Thursday night, as we heard him speak to nearly 33,000 in the packed Will Rogers Coliseum, it was not hard to understand why he has skyrocketed to fame in recent years.

While at the convention, we saw several former Ciscoans. These included C. K. Roberts of Shallowater, Otis Strickland of Decatur, T. J. Sparkman of DeLeon, Russell Dennis of Brownwood, Judson Prince of Fort Worth, Nugent Baldrace of Putnam, Roy Shahan of Memphis.

Ten miles north of Cisco, Bankline's No. 1 Sam Kimmell was drilling below 3,800 in the Duffer lime. An oil show was reported and it was understood that a drill stem test was planned Saturday afternoon.

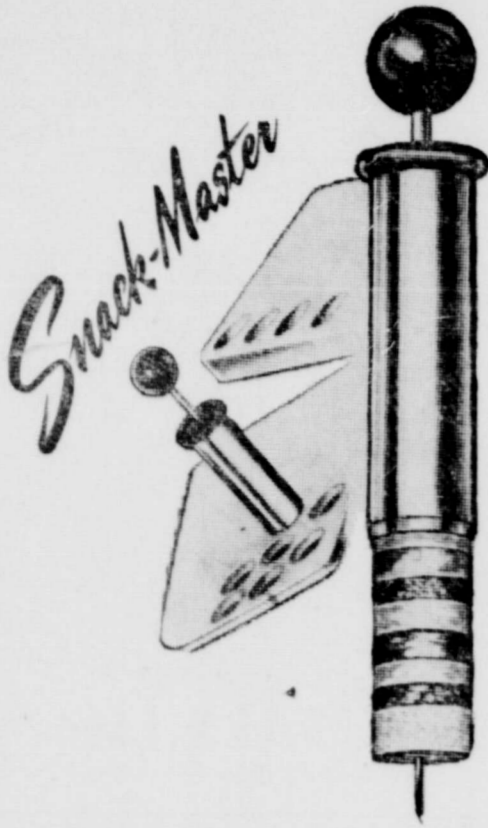
