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German Girl Students At Texas Tech Give Views On U. S. Customs

LUBBOCK, Nov. 15.—"Americans marry so young! In Germany you do not get married until you are about 30."
That is how Christine Sauer-mann expressed one difference in American and German customs. Christine is one of nine German girls taking Home Economics at Texas Technological College.

They are taking a year of training as part of the general reorganization and reorientation program of German education. The students now studying at Texas Tech under supervision of Dr. Mina Lamb are the only group in the United States at this time doing Home Economics work under the plan.

Speaking of the state fair at Dallas, the girls said, "The people were always so polite, even when there was a large crowd. Seeing the air view of the campus at the Tech exhibit made us feel like we were home again."
They expressed surprise that so many phases were covered in one fair, since Germany each exposition deals with one subject, such as automobiles or home appliances. The girls also attended "South Pacific" and compared it favorable with the modern German opera.

FARM AND RANCH CHATTER

If you saw that story in some of the papers recently about how it had been discovered that turkeys can be carriers of parrot fever, don't get jumpy about turkeys.

They're no more likely to be diseased than they ever were. And parrot fever (psittacosis) is pretty rare.

The disease itself is a form of virus pneumonia and the newer drugs like aureomycin and penicillin are reported to be effective in its treatment.

Doctors have known all along that chickens and ducks can carry this disease, just like lots of livestock and meats can carry diseases that affect humans.

There are around eighty diseases which livestock have which can be transmitted to humans.

But we still go on eating meat. So the new disclosure that turkeys can carry some disease or other doesn't mean that it is necessarily going to.

And we have heard of no outbreak of parrot fever in a long time. There was a case several months ago in Texas of a person who raises parrots coming down with the disease, but that person got well.

It was unfortunate that the routine announcements by a scientist at a meeting of public health officials was made into a news story that sounded sensational.

More and more success stories of cotton farmers who follow the insect control practices, crop rotation, winter legumes, a stalk plow under and other recommendations included in the famous Seven-Step Cotton program for Texas, indicate to us that these recommendations are the real McCoy.

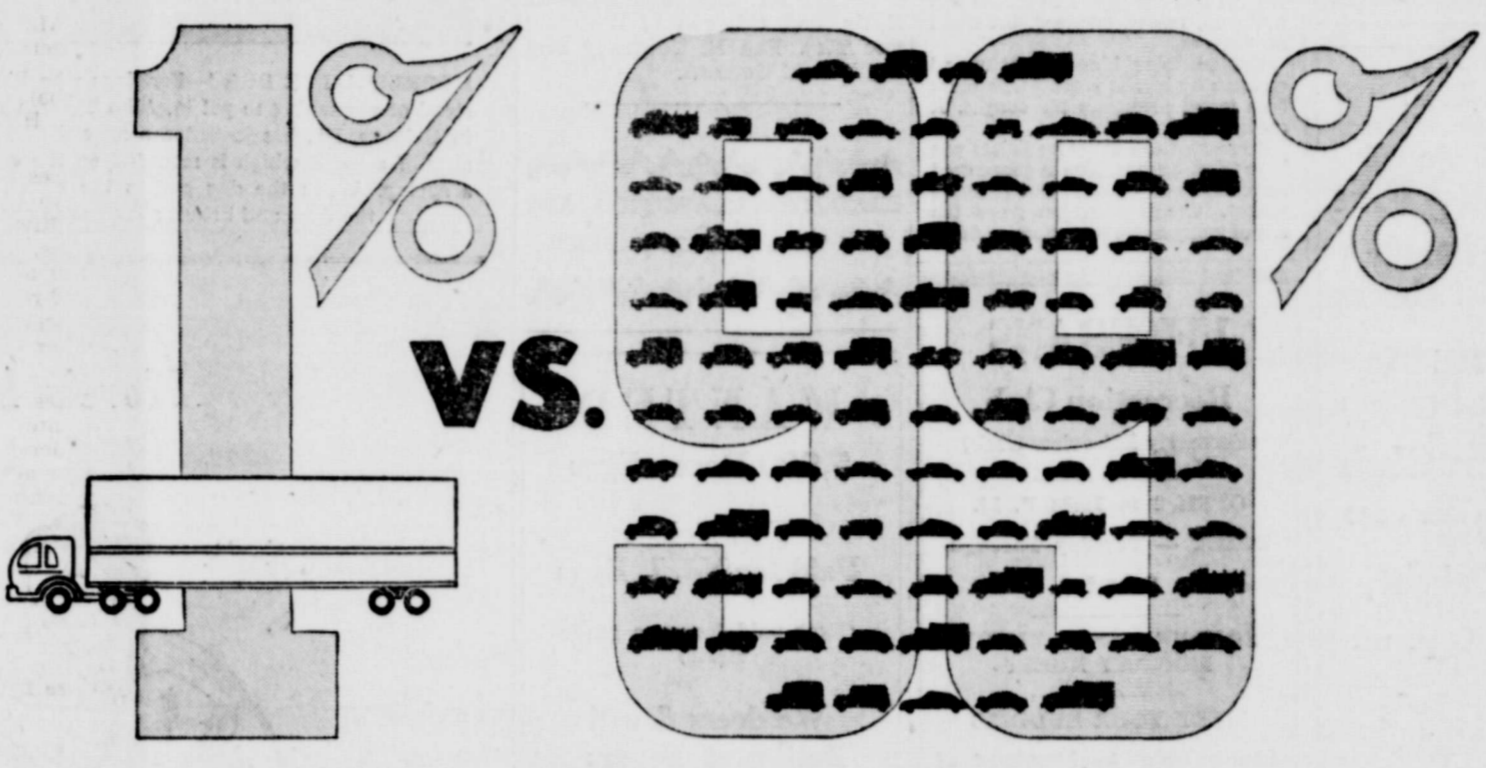
